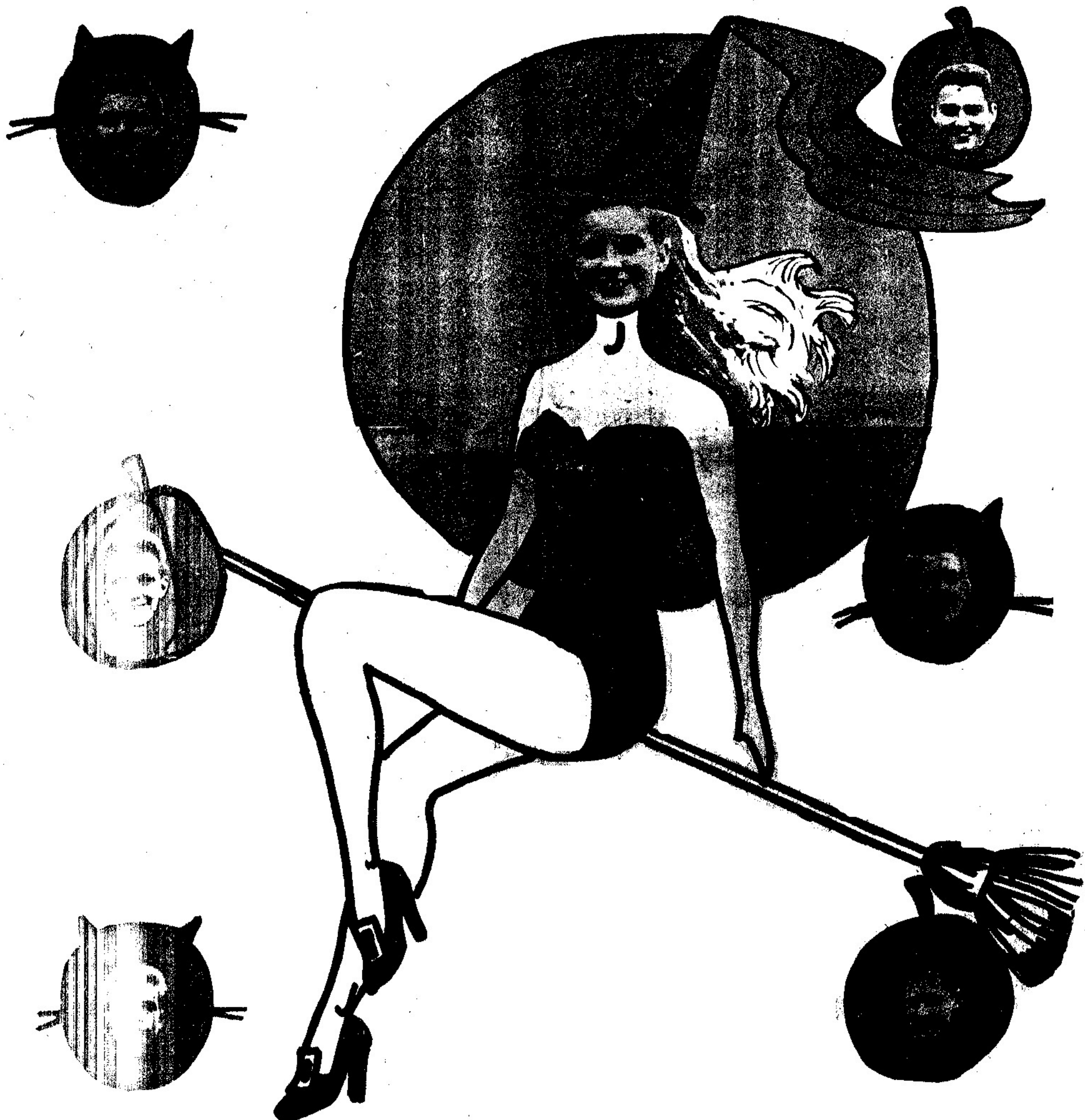

Features

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Today Halloween is a rollicking playtime but long ago it was a serious occasion. Originally called All Hallow's Eve because it fell on October 31, the eve of All Saints Day, the name was later shortened to Halloween.

As is often the case, Halloween recalls the taking over of a pagan festival and its modification to Christianity. Both the Romans and ancient Britains celebrated their autumn festival at this time. In Britain the festival was an occasion of feasting on food grown during the summer. Modern customs of decorating for Halloween parties with pumpkins, autumn leaves, and cornstalks came from the ancient festivals.

Irish superstitions also said that on the night of October 31, the dead could return to earth as witches, goblins, ghosts, black cats, etc. The date marked the end of the summer or the time when the sun retreated before the powers of darkness; and all the underworld characters then had their wicked carnival of triumph, when they engaged in all sorts of malicious mischief. Against them any kind of light was considered a protection. Hence there arose the custom of building great bonfires and carrying blazing torches. As this custom fell into disuse, candles replaced the fires and torches.

An old Scotch custom which is still perpetuated today in Halloween decorations was that witches - those who sold their souls to the devil - left in their beds on halloween night a stick, made by magic, to resemble themselves. Then they would fly up the chimney and off through the sky on a broomstick attended by black cats.

The use of apples and nuts is associated with the idea of harvest and the countless ways of telling Halloween fortunes are based on the superstition that magic powers are abroad and could be utilized for that one night.

As we all know, such fears and superstitions no longer exist and Halloween has now become a time for pranks and practical jokes. But in the United States in recent years these pranks have become not so harmless. Sheds have been overturned, trees cut down, windows broken and various other tricks. Police have found that the best way to prevent such damage is to hold parties for the "small and big fry" alike. At present the trend is moving toward playful parties rather than destructive ones.

POSTER CONTEST

The grand prize winner (grand prize three dollars (\$3.00)) will be announced, and the prize presented, by Colonel Ringler, Commanding Officer, Camp Yokohama in presence of appropriate PIO's and photographers 5 Dec. 1951. The separate school winners will receive a One (1) dollar prize.

Winners will be chosen on the basis of the following:

- Adherence to theme
- Originality of design
- General eye appeal
- Size of poster to be 18" by 30"

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SENIOR SCANDALS

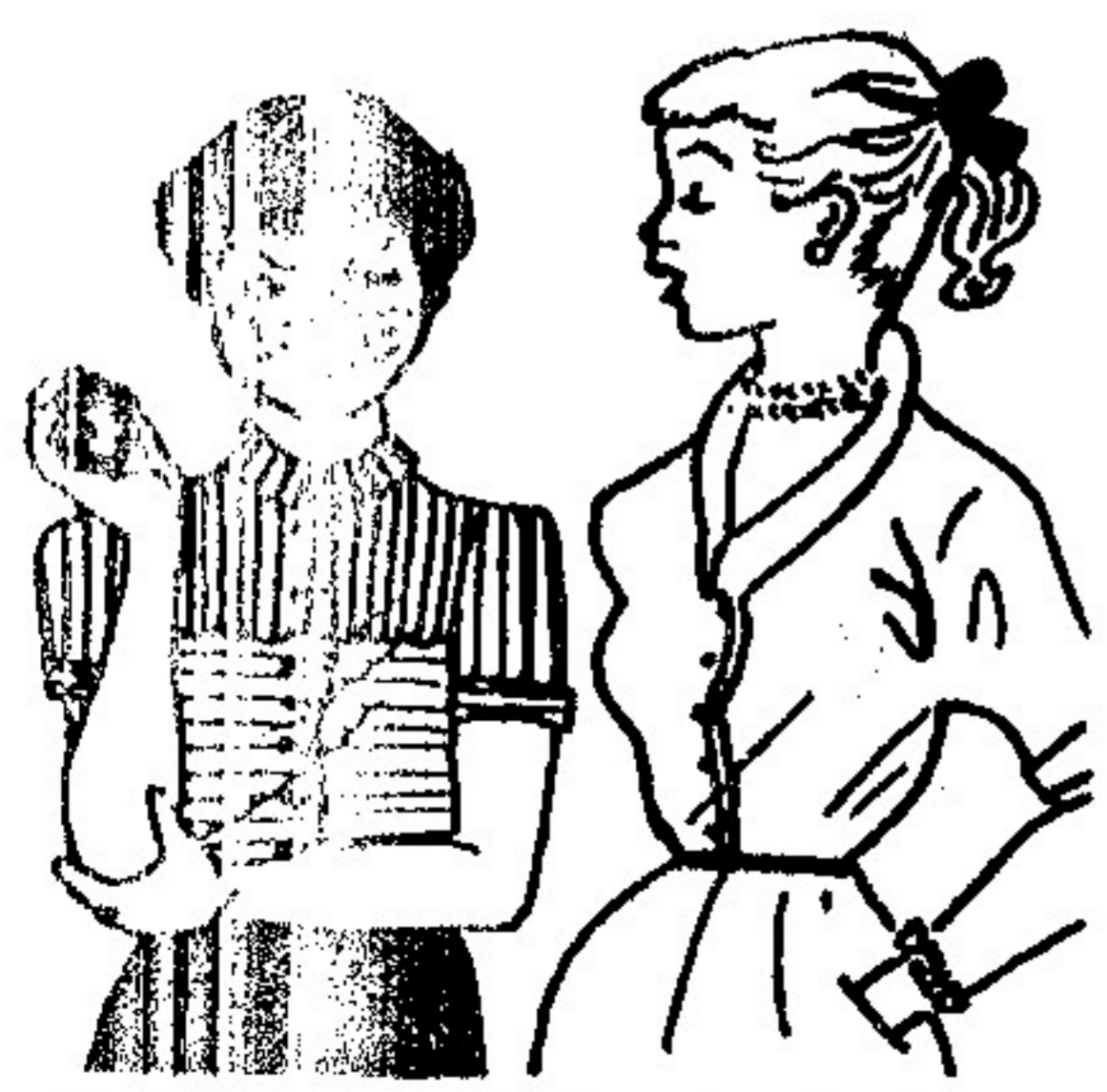

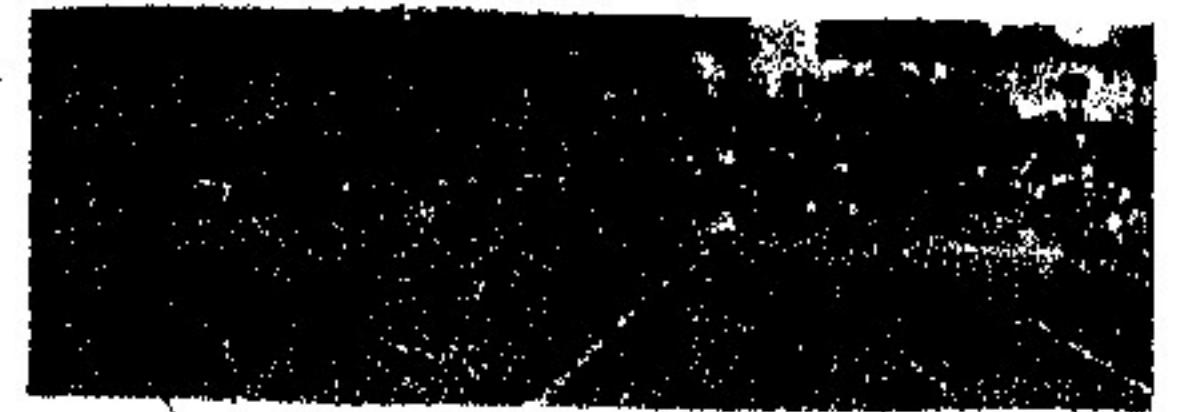
