## DRAGONS DEFEAT DEVILS 36-6

The Narimasu Dragons beat the Yokohama Red Devils for the third time this season to win the Far East Command Football Championship for the first time since 1952.

In the first half the game looked as if it would be a tough battle. Narimasu's Frank Wilson made the first score of the game on a 20 yard end run, but the conversion attempt failed. Then Everett Hawks of Yo-Hi got a pass off to Lars Barker, who then ran 15 yards dodging Narimasu players for the first and only Yo-Hi touchdown scored against Narimasu this season. With the conversion attempt failing the score stood, at the end of the first half, 6-6.

In the second half, the Devils seemed to have lost all their steam; Frank Wilson plowed across for the second Narimasu touchdown, and the conversion attempt was good. Then before Yo-Hi had a chance to do anything, the ball was literally stolen by Smokey Edwards, who romped 80 yards for the third Narimasu touchdown; the conversion attempt was unsuccessful. Narimasu's strong line and fleet backs set Frank Wilson up for two more touchdowns, and both conversion attempts were successful.

The game ended in another victory for Narimasu.

## NIHON U. EDGES YO-HI 24-22

The fast-moving Nihon University team beat the Yokohama eleven in a very exciting game, 24-22. Nihon U. (rated the best of the Japanese football clubs), piled up a lead of 18-0 early in the game with three spectacular touchdown runs. Late in the second quarter, the Devils finally began to show spark as Chuck Colby passed to Butch Shamburger, who ran the ball 25 yards for Yo-Hi's first touchdown; the conversion attempt was good, and the first half ended with Nihon 18, Yo-Hi 8.

In the early minutes of the third quarter, after a continuous advance, Hal Vanatta plowed through the Nihon line for Yo-Hi's second touchdown. With the score 18 to 14, Nihon quickly began pushing for another touchdown; soon the score was 24-14. The Devils then began to breathe fire, and, on a pass from Don Gay, Darold Howe romped 32 yards for Yo-Hi's third touchdown; the conversion was good, and the score was 24-22. The Devils finally got their steam up, but too late. The score was very close, and both teams played a terrific game.
