In his free time Art plays basketball and indulges himself in certain after dark activities at Yokosuka.


Flash a plate of spahgetti or hamburgers in front of Art and you can be sure his eyes will light up.

Born in Franklin, Louisiana, she boasts that she went to L.S.U. where football is at a peak.



The Red Devils got off to a good start by beating the Yamato 'High Warriors 19-0. The game started promptly at 2:00 o'clock on a beautiful day with both teams looking for their victory. In the first half the Red Devils dominated the ball, but were unable to score because of the enormous amount of penalties called against them, so the first half ended in a 0-0 stalemate. The Yo-Hi Red Devils came on the field in the second half, after a half time pep talk by coaches Radford and Fitzpatrick, with a new out look on life. The third quarter started and it proved that the second half was going to be a different ball game than The Red the first half. Devils were on the move, and tailback Ron Krausse carried the ball over for Yo-Hi's first T.D. of the day.
