HOMECOMING DATE SET

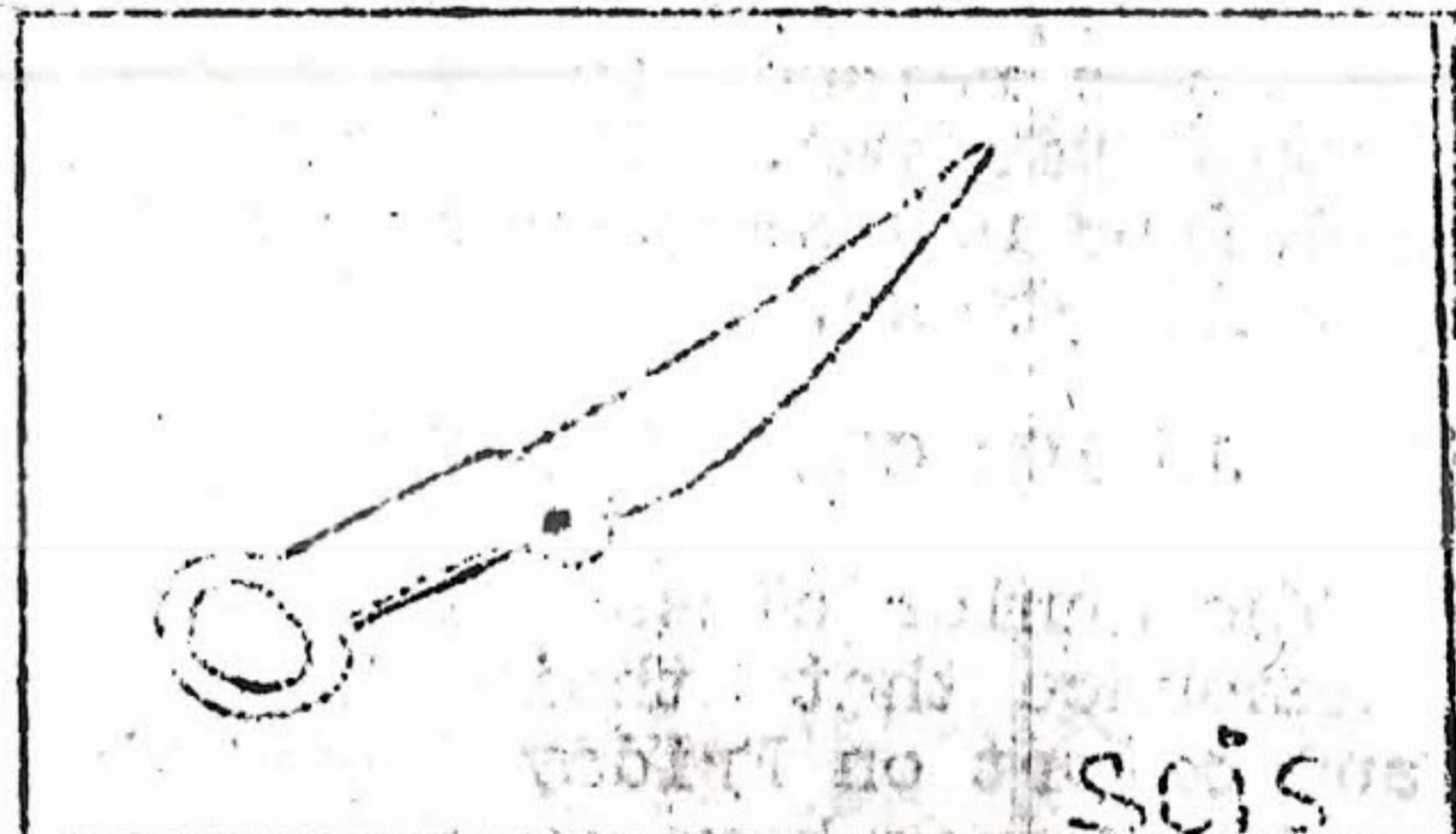
This year the annual homecoming festivities will take place on Friday, November 13. The dance will take place in the gym following the football game with Johnson High School.

YO-HI SMASHES YAMATO 32-6

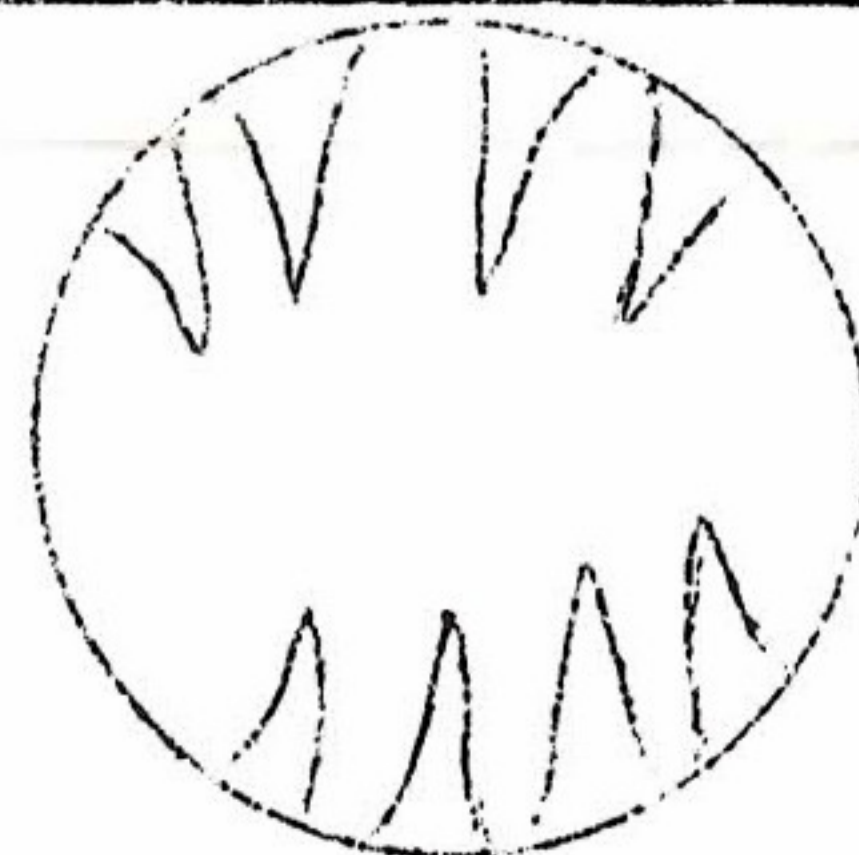


The Yo-Hi Red Devils rolled another game closer to a championship showdown with Narimasu last Friday by clobbering the Yamato Warriors for the second time this season. The Devils drew first blood in the opening minutes of the game when Back Lars Barker zigzagged through the middle of the Warrior line for the first touchdown. This was a prelude of the fine running that was to be displayed by Barker during the rest of the evening. Shortly before the quarter ended Barker cut around the end on a reverse play for the second TD and a 13-0 first quarter score. Turning in their best offensive effort of the season the Red Devils crossed the field to score again in the second quarter and were leading 19-0 by half-time. Actually the game was far more exciting than is indicated by the lopsided score. In the second half the Warriors started to gain yardage behind the accurate bullet passes of QB Ray Moore. Holding the Devils scoreless in the third they marched down the field for a touchdown and threatened to score on several other occasions as their passes continued to connect. The Warriors were forced to go home with a single marker however as the Devil backs repeatedly returned the ball from the danger zone with slashing around the end and thru the middle runs. Yo-Hi added another TD in the final fourth for the game ending 32-6 score.

The game offered an interesting contrast in offensive style as YO-HI relied on running while the Warriors played an aerial game. Both teams used the wing formation. Seldom are the fans treated to such fare in modern football.
