

NILE CLARKE KINNICK, Jr.

I believe this will answer most of your questions about the most recent personality around Yo-Hi. This person, as you all know, is Nile Clarke Kinnick, Jr.

Kinnick attended the University of Iowa and was in the top one percent of his law class there. He maintained a B+average throughout his years at the University. Because of his outstanding scholastic achievements, he was chosen to be a member of Phi Beta Kappa at the University of Iowa. Every year there are several four-year Nile Clarke Kinnick, Jr. scholarships given to Iowa's finest scholarathletes.

His achievements in the world of sports were no less meritorious than those in scholastics. Kinnick was voted Iowa's most valuable football player, elected to the Football Hall of Fame and selected "The Athlete of 1939". This fabulous gridiron player won every award of outstanding play in football. The Heisman, Maxwell and Camp trophies were awarded to Kinnick while he played for the University of Iowa. He helped push the Iowa Hawkeyes to victory in the 1939 Big Ten Conference.

In 1939 Iowa met Notre Dame and smashed the Irish with a score of 10 to 7. The last game between the two rivals had been in 1921 and the teams were ripe for another battle with the pigskin. The much awaited game started off with a scoreless quarter, and then the Hawkeyes recovered a fumble on Notre Dame's four-yard line. Still at the four-yard line on the fourth down, they shifted Kinnick from left half to right half and he carried the ball down field for Iowa's first touchdown. He drop-kicked for the extra point to set the Hawkeyes in the lead 7 to 0. The Irish pushed forward again and again only to be thrown back by Kinnick's punts. There was little scoring in the last half, though Notre Dame made a touchdown and Iowa scored three more points. During the entire game Kinnick punted sixteen times, the last of which traveled 68 yards and rolled out on Notre Dame's seven-yard line. Kinnick played 60 minutes of the triumphant game against the Irish of Notre Dame.

When the United States entered World War II, Kinnick left school to become a Navy fighter pilot. He died in the Caribbean when he was forced to land his plane in the ocean before the aircraft carrier crew could clear the flight deck for him to land. His plane sank before he had a chance to get clear of the cockpit.

Nile Clarke Kinnick, Jr. represents everything Yo-Hi stands for—tops in scholastics, athletics and service to his country. For this reason Nile Clarke Kinnick, Jr. was chosen as the official name for Yo-Hi and Beach School.
