✓ NEET NAC HISTORY

Most of the Yo-Hi students are familiar with the low, tan building behind the Navy Exchange. This is the Yokohama teen age home away from home--the Neet Nac Club. It sponsors dances, trips, and other activities as well offering students a place to eat their lunch. All this costs only fifty cents each month.

Although many people are familiar with the present Neet Nac Club, how many know anything about its background? It has quite a history. From 1884 to just before World War II, it was used as the British Golf Club. It belonged to the Japanese during the war, but the American Army took it over afterwards. From 1945-1947 it was the 5th Engineer Officers' Club. Under the Headquarters, 8th Army Command it became Yokohama Youth Center Neet Nac Canteen. Later the club was transferred to Headquarters, Yokohama Command, Special Services Section, Neet Nac Club. It remained under that authority until last summer when the Navy took control of it under Naval Housing Activity, Yokohama.

YO-HI BEATS NARIMASU (54-49)

The Devils faced the Narimasu Dragons in their second game of the Tournament. The Dragons and Devils are arch rivals from many past years so the game proved to be very exciting. The spirit was high on both sides. The game progressed with the Devils dominating the ball game and going on to win by 5 points after a last quarter rally by the Dragons. High point man was Ed Mach with 22 points followed by Rod Atteberry with 18.

KUBASAKI TRIPS DEVILS (59-46)

The mighty Devils tripped over by the little green Dragons from Okinawa. The small gard from Kubasaki, Shimizu, and Sear stole the ball continually from the big men from Yokohama. The Kubasaki score were led by Shimizu with 20, followed by Dash with 16. Yo-Hi's big guns were far below their average; Atteberry with 14, Howe with 12, and Mach with 6. Although Yo-Hi lost this game they won second place in the Far East Tournament and are still all Japan Champions.
