TWO YEAR RESIDENT COLLEGE PROGRAM PROPOSED

The graduates of the University of Maryland has proposed a two year resident college for the graduates of U.S. Forces Schools. The suggested site of the college is at Johnson Air Station, located in the outskirts of Tokyo. The purpose of this program would be to provide an opportunity for the children of U.S. Security Forces personnel to attend college classes in a campus atmosphere and attain as much as two-year college standing in the Far East. Included in the proposal are supervised recreational and dormitory facilities for students desiring to board at the college. If proposal is realized, the college could open in September, 1962.

The curriculum would cover the general requirements of the freshman and sophomore years leading to a Bachelor's degree and would include the following: English, American Government, American History, Foreign Language, Speech, Sociology, Psychology, and Philosophy. The total semester hours gained would be 24 per freshman year and 32 per sophomore year. Approximately 120 are required for graduation from most colleges in the United States.

Credits would be resident college credits and fully transferable as University of Maryland credit. On leaving the Far East, the student's records would be transmitted to the Registrar's Office of the University of Maryland, College Park, Maryland.

It is estimated that the tuition cost per semester would be approximately \$380. This would not include cost of textbooks, payments for room and board, laboratory fees, and recreational fees. The cost of room and board is estimated at \$200 per semester, with two semesters per school year.

Before this proposal can be realized, the opinions of those persons who would be directly concerned are needed. Therefore, a questionnaire will be circulated among seniors who would be interested in such an activity. They are asked to consider seriously such a venture, and to let their guidance counselor know if they might be interested.

A GOLDEN OPPORTUNITY

Applications for Kinnick High School seniors will be available today for the Navy's annual competitive examination for its nation-wide Regular N.R.O.T.C. college training program according to a recent announcement by Harold U. Cope, Principal. The mental examination is scheduled for 9 December, 1961, and is open to all high school seniors and graduates who can qualify.

Eligible young men may earn a commission in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps through the Regular N.R.O.T.C. Upon receipt of a baccalaureate degree and completion of naval science training N.R.O.T.C. students are appointed as career officers in the Navy or Marine Corps. Our modern Navy presents the young officer with many interesting and challenging duty assignments on, in or over the sea. Possible billets include duty in submarines or naval aviation, duty aboard ships in the technical fields of nucleonics, electronics or engineering; or duty with the Staff Corps of the Navy. The Marine Corps presents other varied facets of naval life.

Male citizens of the United States who are sincerely interested in careers in the naval service and who have reached their 17th birthday and have not passed their 21st birthday by 1 July, 1962, are eligible to apply for this program. Those contemplating a college course

which takes five years to complete must not have reached their 20th birthday by 1 July, 1962. Persons attaining a qualifying score will be given the Navy's rigid midshipman physical examination next February. Young men selected for the program will enroll in one of the 52 colleges of their choice where a N.R.O.T.C. unit is located.

The Regular N.R.O.T.C. is maintained for one purpose--to train and educate young men for ultimate commissioning as career officers in the Navy and Marine Corps. For those selected, all tuition, fees, and books, plus an annual retainer pay of \$600 will be furnished by the Navy for a period of not more than four years. The fifth year of a five-year course must be at the midshipman's own expense. In addition to the normal college curriculum, midshipmen in the Regular N.R.O.T.C. will study a planned course in naval science subjects and spend part of three summers on training cruises with various Fleet units.

The deadline date for receipt of applications is 17 November, 1961. Applications are available from the nearest U.S. Navy Recruiting Station or from Mr. Gornaley, Guidance Counselor, who has been provided with special information concerning the (cont. on next column.)

YO-HI BOWS TO YAMATO, 18 TO 8

The Yo-Hi Devils fought a desperate battle but lost at the hands of the Yamato Warriors and their star halfback, Carl Hardy, 18 to 8, to finish the first half of the football season without a win. The contest was held at Berkey field, Yokosuka, on Saturday, the 20th of October.

The fleet-footed Hardy scored all three touchdowns for Yamato in the first, second, and fourth quarters and gained more than 123 yards individually showing the one-man team a 3-1-0 record so far this season.

It took Yamato nine plays to get their first TD in the first period. In the second quarter Yo-Hi came 16 yards from paydirt, but Yamato then took over and made a TD in six plays to make the halftime score 12 to 0 in the Warriors' favor.

Beginning the second half Yo-Hi recovered a fumble on Yamato's thirteen-yard line. The T-team pushed across Yo-Hi's only TD and extra point. Quarterback Tim Pietsch made six points from the three-yard line and Jack Penniefiel ran around left end and dived into the end zone for the PAT.

The rest of the game was a comeback fight for the Devils. With two minutes remaining in the game, the Red team took to the air, but after two successful passes, a spiral by Arnold Long was intercepted by Hardy, and he ran 59 yards untouched to the TD that put the game on ice.

The Devils were bested in first downs 9 to 8 and in yardage 264 to 169 yards, but fought gamely to the gun. Joey Montoya, in his last varsity game for Yo-Hi, played brilliant defensive ball and stopped two PAT attempts by Yamato.

Game co-captains for Yo-Hi were Richie Edmunds and Mike McClendon.
