TRACK TEAM HAS FIRST ENCOUNTER

Yo-Hi's young track team entered its first meet. Saturday. April 7. It was a triangular meet With Zama and ASIJ on Zama's track A strong Zama team swept most of the events: Yo-Hi was close hehind ASIJ who finished well in the field events.

In the 100-yard dash Lew DePriest placed second with eleven seconds flat while Zama's sprinter had a 10.6 seconds time. In the 220 yard dush, Alva Cusick came in third with a 25.2 seconds and Zama's winning time was 24.7 Rod Wingate ran the 440 in 60 seconds to take third place Ray Greene come in a close fourth on the helf mile, finishing in 2 minutes and 21 seconds. ASIJ's winning time was 2:13.8.
