His full name is Nile Clarke Kinnick, Jr. He attended the University of Iowa where he was in the top one per cent of his law class. Also he maintained a top average during his years at the University. Because of his outstanding achievements he was chosen as a member of the University's Phi Beta Kappa Chapter.

While in college, Nile C. Kinnick was voted Iowa's best football player (most valuable) and was elected to their football Hall of Fame. He was selected as The Athlete of 1939 by sports writers of America.

When the United States entered World War II Nile left school to become a Navy fighter pilot. He died in the Caribbean when he was forced to land his plane in the ocean before his aircraft carrier crew could clear the flight deck for his landing.

Moral--Though modesty is a virtue, bashfulness is a vice.

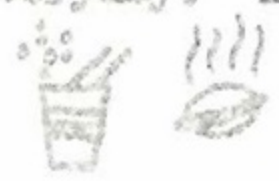
OPINION POLL

Military dependents make up most of the people to whom I refer. We try to force our way of life on the Japanese people. We think our society is the better.

Perhaps to Americans it is, but take a good look at present-day America. In what areas would others care to imitate us today? Faults that exist in the U.S. today may be found in other countries, but not in the same quantity as in the States. "America is great," we say. But riots and crime speak louder than words. Our actions show what kind of people we are.

In closing, I would like to quote Toru Matsumoto, Professor of English, Ferris College for Women, Yokohama: "That our English is terrible I readily admit. After all, English is a foreign language to us...May I emphasize the fact that Japan is a non-English-speaking country? We get along perfectly satisfactorily among ourselves by using one language, Japanese...All 100 million of us are self-sufficient in our mother tongue."

Japan's Culture

Have you ever realized the number of feet of ramps the Yo-Mi students and faculty have to climb every day?

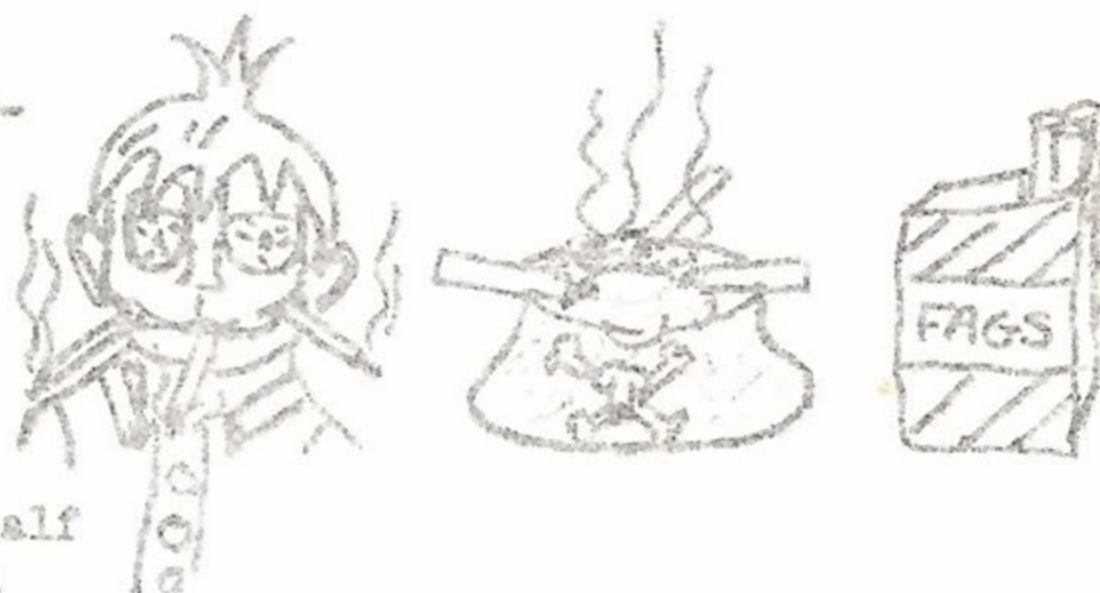

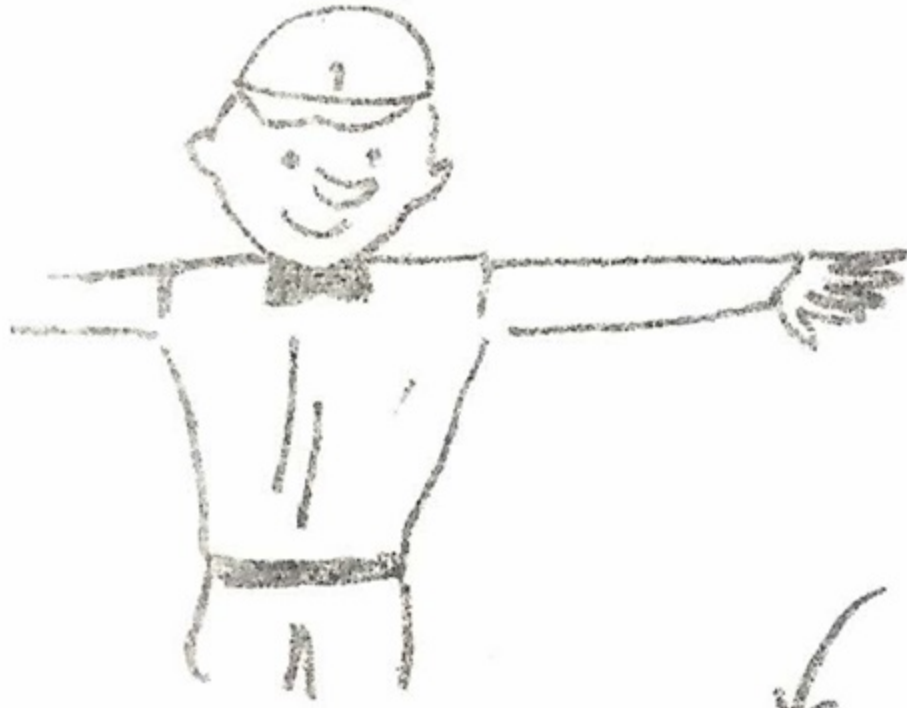

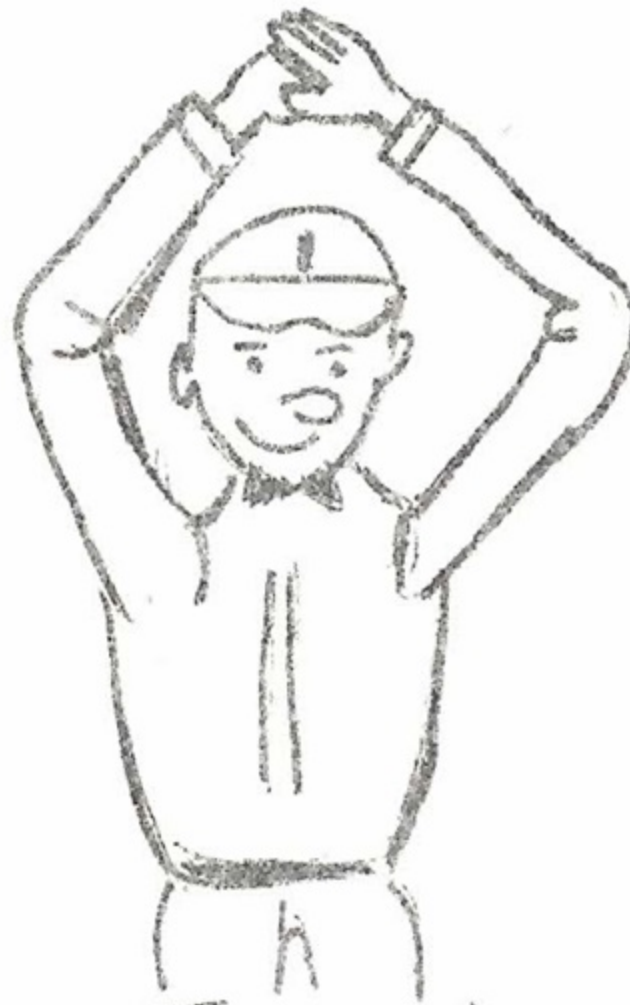
