Thanks to your help, the poverty of my family is somehow reduced.

On May 10, 1967 I was very happy to receive from you an amount of 950 VN piasters, a cake of soap, a saucepan, a raincoat, and a pen. My family and I thank you very much, Parents.

In taking a test, doodle on your test paper instead of putting down the answers (which you don't know anyway). Don't forget to crack the gum!

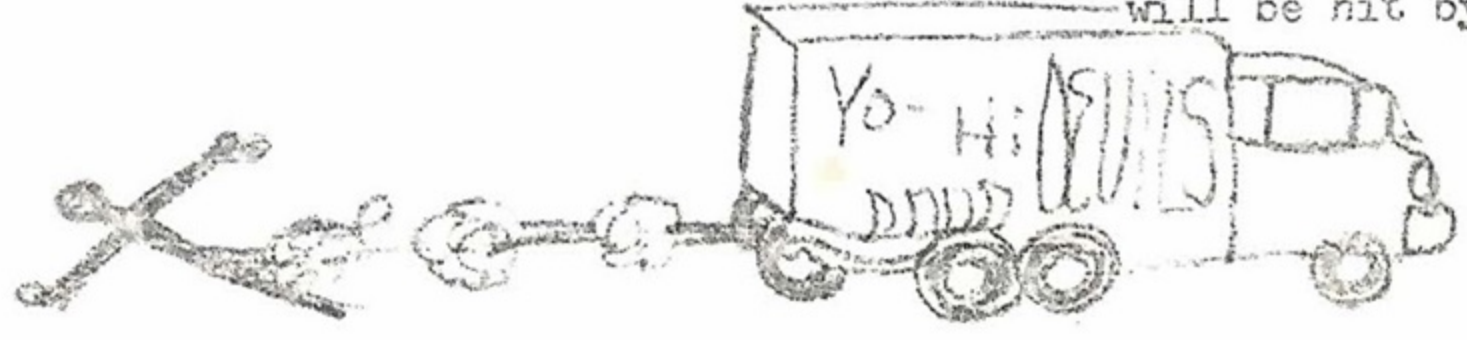

→ YO-HI SURVEY ON DRUGS ←

The results of the "Echoes" survey, involving 130 Yo-Hi students, concerning narcotics was informative as well as interesting. Though the survey showed a number of people uninformed about the dangers of narcotics, it showed also a large percentage of students who realize the more dangerous drugs from the less harmful ones. If everyone was answering truthfully, only 11.5% of the students have taken Naron or "pep pills" which is the least harmful drug of all. Only 50.8% realize that alcohol mixed with pep pills can be fatal. Looking at the survey overall--it's good to know that the majority of students have the sense and knowledge to stay away from narcotics. The results are as follows:

- Do you think marijuana is a physically damaging narcotic?
 Don't know 16.2% Yes 53.8% No 30%
- Do you think Naron pills are physically damaging?
 Don't know 36.1% Yes 47.7% No 16.2%
- Do you think heroin is a physically damaging drug?
 Don't know 16.2% Yes 79.2% No 4.6%
- Do you think smoking a "few" marijuana cigarettes could make one become addicted to drugs?
 Don't know 17.7% Yes 43.1% No 39.2%
- Have you ever taken a Naron pill or any form of "pep" pills?
 Yes 11.5% No 88.5%
- Do you think a "few" of the above pills and alcohol could kill you?
 Don't know 2.8% Yes 50.8% No 25.4%
- Do you have any desire to "try" a marijuana cigarette?
 Yes 19.2% No 80.8%
- Do you have any desire to "try" a Naron pill?
 Already have 7.8% Yes 6.7% No 86.1%
- Do you believe that you could ever become addicted to any form of narcotics?
 Yes 38.5% No 61.5%

A few of the reasons for experimenting with narcotics were as follows:

- I have because it got rid of my problems.
- Just to see what they are like--see if they are as great as everyone says--they're not.
- I have because everyone else has.
- Yes. Once my friend bought pot and we had a few joints and went to a dance. It really was no big deal and it didn't work real good, but I enjoyed it and would do it again.
- Because I was curious to see what I would feel like and what would happen and because "everyone" did it. But it was no good and I didn't take any more.

A few of the reasons for not experimenting with narcotics involved religion, education, and friends:

- I have never because these drugs put you out of your mind. I have no desire to have "kicks." Life is nice. I feel that I do not want to put "thrills in my life"
- My body is a temple of the Holy Spirit and I want to keep it clean.
- I have never because I've never had the chance to. If I were ever presented with the chance I probably would.
- I have never because I think it is a foolish and stupid thing to do. I think if some kids in school take it and call us squares, that the real squares are the people taking narcotics. It is damaging to chromosomes.
- Because it is absolutely stupid to endanger your life for an hour or two of fun. I could never take them because I know it's not right. Taking narcotics is a cheap way of ridding yourself of the world's problems. By cheap, I don't mean money-wise, I mean characterwise.
- I have never because I believe if you try something like Naron which is non-addictive it will lead to experimentation with more dangerous drugs like Heroin and LSD which is extremely damaging. Not enough people know the damage caused by narcotics. Even doctors won't say for sure what the consequences can be.

People who don't have journalism have no idea at all what a page editor goes through.

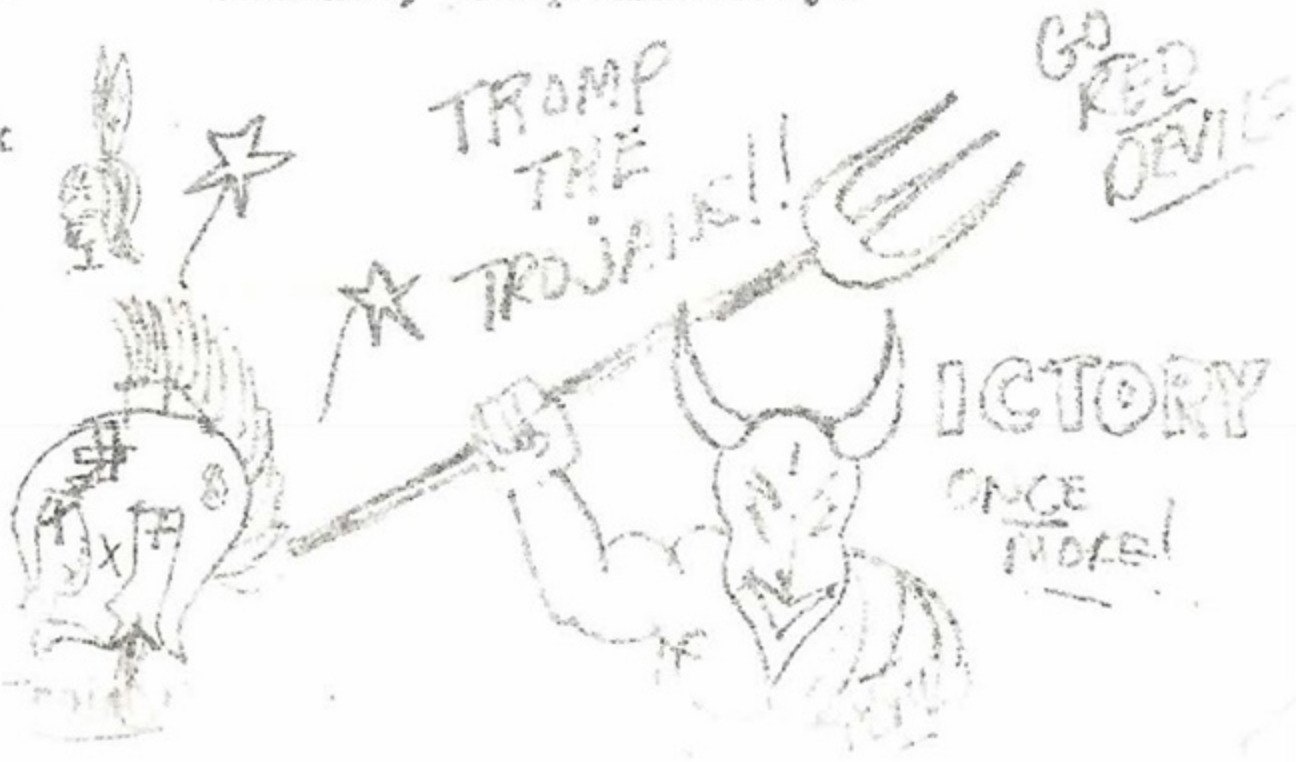

HOW WE COMPARE

Recently in this newspaper, an article was printed which gave information on some of the high schools in the States that some students at Yo-Hi attended. This week I'm going to give you information on a truly large school which is located in the city of Long Beach, California. I will try to compare it with Yo-Hi.

The name of this school (which I attended last year) is Lakewood Senior High School. Compared to that school Yo-Hi is a one-room school-house. For example, this year Lakewood has an enrollment of 4,400 students as compared to Yo-Hi's 550. Last year Lakewood had a graduating class of over 1,700 students.

Lakewood High School was built in 1956 at a cost of over six million dollars. Its facilities can be termed nothing less than excellent. Besides excellent classrooms the school has an auditorium which seats 4,500, three athletic fields, a gymnastic room, and two indoor heated pools.

Sports play a major role in the activities of Lakewood's student body as they do here in Yo-Hi. Lakewood competes with five other teams in her league in all of the sports we have at Yo-Hi, and in gymnastics, swimming, and water polo. A corps of over 200 cheerleaders and pepsters help arouse school spirit.

Lakewood's school colors are the same as ours, red and white. The emblem of that school is that of a Knight with a lance. (A student at Lakewood is called a Lancer.)

Though Lakewood does have many advantages in the way of facilities, there are some things which don't match the conditions here at Yo-Hi. Because of the enormous student body, one never really gets to know more than a handful of the students, and they are normally a handful who think and act exactly like one another. One doesn't, that is, get to know as many different kinds of people there as here. Also, people certainly aren't as friendly as they are here. This is just a natural thing caused by such an impersonal, large atmosphere. It's just my opinion, but I think Lakewood gives one a very sub-par education compared to the education here at Yo-Hi.

Others who have gone to large schools may disagree and I will welcome their criticism of my opinions.

 Jiroo-chan (child)

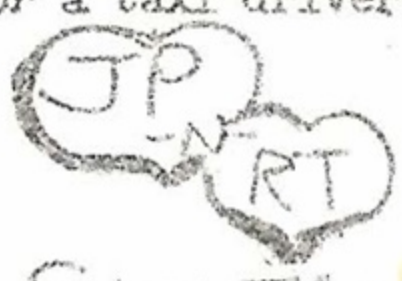
