

DURPRISE. SUPPRISE! On Monday, January 22, there was an assembly in which there were many surprises. Mr. Spaulding spoke on several subjects which were

The next quarter the students with gym three times a week will have it twice a week and those with gym twice a week will change to three times a week.

During the days in which a student does not have P.E., he will be

able to go to the snack bar, student lounge, or library.

Mr. Spaulding did note, however, that there was a problem. That is the problem of a few students shoplifting. He said that to make sure this system works, we should make sure that neither we nor others should become involved in shoplifting activities during our free periods.

Why do we have polls? To stick our noses in everyone else's business? To fill up space and give polltakers writers' cramps?

First of all, let's give a definition. Polls are surveys conducted to obtain a cross sample of public opinion. Just thirty years ago, George Gallup, with his Gallup Poll, introduced the idea that a small cross-section of opinion can accurately determine the opinion of the whole.

Since then, other polls have emerged, now headed by the World Association for

Public Opinion Research.

Polls are playing an increasingly vital role: the government uses them to evaluate the effectiveness of their programs; politicians use them to determine their popularity and predict voting results; manufacturers use polls to promote their products; other organizations use them to determine the general feeling on a particular issue and to act accordingly.

How much can one rely on public opinion? Three years ago, the Gallup Poll concluded that 1) the collective judgment of the people is amazingly sound, 2) the public is often willing to sacrifice public good for national good, 3) the will of the people sooner or later becomes law.

On the high school level, student opinion polls more or less represent the opinion of the whole student body. Both students and faculty can use poll results to determine a course of action based on the attitude of the majority, to change their own opinions after seeing both sides of an issue, or to understand some part of behavior better.

Although it is practically impossible to get a perfect cross-section of opinion, the "Echoes" tries its best to reach a variety of students for its polls. admit we have not always succeeded in our attempts, but progress is our key wordwe will never stop trying.





accomplishes nothing.


Next time try listening with an open mind instead of a predjudiced one and then openly speaking your mind.
