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TOURNAMENT NEWS
The Yo-Hi Red Devils have been officially disqualified from holding the
mampionship in the Far East Basketball
Tournament due to the misgivings of three
of the team's most valuable players. The
mames of the players and more detailed
information had been temporarily withheld while the matter was being further
investigated.

Bill Olson, a senior at Yo-Hi, Mike Wirsing, also a senior, and Darryl Welson, a junior, have been found guilty of possessing and using illegal drugs during the Tournament games. Nelson and Wirsing have been dropped from the list of all-star players in addition to dis-

qualifying their team.

The boys' caper was discovered after the championship game against Kubacaki Saturday night, the 9th of March. While pictures of the All-Tournament team were being taken, Nelson began to giggle. When asked for his views on the team,


the former coach said:
