This year school provides an easy time for students. School hours have been arranged differently from the past years. Class begins at 8:10 and ends at 2:50. Lunch hour is extended 10 minutes. Homeroom is eliminated and activities take part after school hours.

This school year YO-HI once again has split P.E. classes. This will be run similar to last year, with a few differences. One is that the classes are divided into freshmen-sophomore and junior-senior groups. Those coming on Tuesdays and Thursdays will have physical fitness while those coming on Monday-Wednesday-Friday will have a sport like baseball, soccer, or basketball.

The classes are being split in this way so that when it comes time to learn a sport, the upperclassmen, who already know the rules of the various games (or at least are supposed to) don't have to go over these for the third or fourth times.

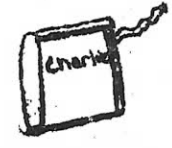
Shoes aren't as heavy or puritanical looking this year. The heels are higher and slimmer and the toes are a little rounder.

NEW Column This Year!

Let's play football! The season for the oldtime American game is here again and the "Echoes" sports staff wants to help you enjoy it as much as possible.

To do this we've decided to run a weekly feature to give you the facts of the game of football. We'll try to take you step by step through the game so that you'll know what's going on when you're cheering the Big Red.

Each team (composed of 11 players) must try to move the football across the opponents' goal line. The touchdown is the best method of gaining the most points (6 points). It can be obtained by either catching a pass, carrying the ball, or recovering a fumble behind the opponents' goal. Extra points may be accumulated after a touchdown by kicking the football over the goal posts (1 point), or carrying it over (2 points).

The game is extended by a 15 minute "half time" break and a one minute break between the first and second quarter and the third and fourth quarter.
