PARENT SURVEY

during As we all know, Mr. Spaulding, on Tuesday; gaverus as parents! survey to determine whether our parents agreed with the no-substitute-teacher program which was introduced into the school last Febru-There were two reasons, Mr. Spaulding stated, for ary. instituting the program. First, there were not sufficient substitutes to cover the classes when a teacher was absent, and, second, most substitutes were English-Social Studies teachers and, hence, not qualified to carry on class work in other subject areas. Therefore, substitutes were usually babysitters who saw to it that the students completed a written assignment during the teacher's absence. The classwork really began when the teacher returned.

During the monthly meeting of the School Board last Friday, two school Board Members questioned the no-substitute program. One of them requested that the program be re-evaluated and that the students be restricted to the school grounds with permission to go to the library or student lounge during the period when a teacher was absent. The second member disapproved of the entire program, stating that all students needed to be supervised during the entire school day. He insisted that when a teacher is absent, the students be confined to the classroom and be supervised.

The survey Mr. Spaulding gave us to take home briefly explained the background of the program and requested the parents to check one of the three following statements:

i. I believe my son/daughter is a responsible student who should be allowed to use his school time, during alternate PE days and when a teacher is absent, in the student lounge, school library, or the community center.

2. I believe my son/daughter is a responsible student who should be allowed to use his school time, during alternate FE days and when a teacher is absent, in the student lounge or school library only, not in the community center area.

3. I believe my son/daughter is a responsible student, but during alternate PE days or when a teacher is absent, I believe he should be supervised by an adult.

He explained that in order to accurately evaluate the no-substitute program, the view of the parents as well as the school was necessary.

As soon as the parents' survey has been tabulated and the school's evaluation has been completed, Mr. Spaulding will inform the "Echoes" of this evaluation. The next School Board Meeting is Oct. 18th here at the Kinnick High School. At that time, Mr. Spaulding will present this evaluation to them.

#### ON WAR

War is a marvelously romantic and spiritually uplifting endeavor.

Last week in one of those dark isolated villages in Viet-Nam, this was really brought out in one of the lives of a young GI, following the death of his buddies.

Lance Cpl. Joe Henderson and his small platoon of fourteen men were trudging through the swampy jungles to a small Vietnamese village on a rescue mission. It had been reported earlier that there had been a terrorist attack and Henderson's division was being sent to supply any necessary aid and protection.

Approaching the village the men noticed a forboding silence only to find weeping wives over their husbands' bodies and frightened children huddling

in dark corners.

The U.S. soldiers set up camp and immediately prepared to help the remaining villagers with first aid and food. As the night fell and the village was settling down for the night, the men took account of what supplies they had left and what was needed. main need-water.

Henderson was assigned to get the water. In the dark and all alone, he quietly made his way to the stream which he and his men had passed earlier that day. He took two barrels with him and proceeded back to the campsite

after filling them.

He crept alon, the familiar path towards the village and again the forboding silence of death was in the air. Upon entering the village camp he was confronted with sheer horror and disbelief. For there in front of him lay thirteen decapitated bodies of his fellow comrades.

The thought suddenly dawned on him that had he been there an hour ago the same would have happened to him. that moment he went berserk. Without a mind, he could not held back his tem-per and because of the shock he had just received, he unthinkingly grabbed nine hysterical children and drowned them mercilessly in a half empty well.

The marine lived and was found early Thursday morning, September 12, in the deserted village. He was flown to the States for psychiatric treat-

ment.

Denny Mclain, the Detroit Tigers righthander, has won his 30th game. minth-inding rally by his teammates saved the day and he became the major league's first thirty-game winner since Dizzy Dean won 30 in 1934 and the American League's eleventh pitcher to do so oince 1900.

Denny's thirtieth victory came in Detroit September 14, as the Tigers beat the Cakland Athletics 5-4. He struck out ten batters and walked one.

Bus Problem 10 Th

A very pressing problem is the transportation this school has. Day in and day out students are forced to stand in their buses because of overcrowding. I myself must frequently stand. The use of more buses to solve the overcrowding is not the answer. More effective use

of the buses already in use will solve it.

School bus drivers should check bus cards frequently to insure that only those who are assigned to a particular bus get on that bus.
