Last week in one of those dark isolated villages in Viet-Nam, this was really brought out in one of the lives of a young GI, following the death of his buddies.

Lance Cpl. Joe Henderson and his small platoon of fourteen men were trudging through the swampy jungles to a small Vietnamese village on a rescue mission. It had been reported earlier that there had been a terrorist attack and Henderson's division was being sent to supply any necessary aid and protection.

Approaching the village the men noticed a forboding silence only to find weeping wives over their husbands' bodies and frightened children huddling in dark corners.

The U.S. soldiers set up camp and immediately prepared to help the remaining villagers with first aid and food. As the night fell and the village was settling down for the night, the men took account of what supplies they had left and what was needed. Their main need—water.

Henderson was assigned to get the water. In the dark and all alone, he quietly made his way to the stream which he and his men had passed earlier that day. He took two barrels with him and proceeded back to the campsite after filling them.

He crept along the familiar path towards the village and again the forboding silence of death was in the air. Upon entering the village camp he was confronted with sheer horror and disbelief. For there in front of him lay thirteen decapitated bodies of his fellow comrades.

The thought suddenly dawned on him that had he been there an hour ago the same would have happened to him. At that moment he went berserk. Without a mind, he could not hold back his temper and because of the shock he had just received, he unthinkingly grabbed nine hysterical children and drowned them mercilessly in a half empty well.

The marine lived and was found early Thursday morning, September 12, in the deserted village. He was flown to the States for psychiatric treatment.

## SAFETY FIRST

Children are most likely to be seriously injured in minor accidents. A removable shield helps protect children in collision impacts. A car bed in the back seat is the best protection for infants.

### MAGIC THIRTY

Denny McLain, the Detroit Tigers righthander, has won his 30th game. A ninth-inning rally by his teammates saved the day and he became the major league's first thirty-game winner since Dizzy Dean won 30 in 1934 and the American League's eleventh pitcher to do so since 1900.

Denny's thirtieth victory came in Detroit September 14, as the Tigers beat the Oakland Athletics 5-4. He struck out ten batters and walked one.

The Tigers were ahead 3-2 at the end of the fourth inning. The Athletics scored one in both the fifth and sixth innings and led 4-3 until the ninth, when Detroit scored two and won 5-4.

Since 1900 the thirty-game mark has been reached twenty-one times, eleven times by the American League, and ten times by the National League. Christy Mathewson reached thirty victories four times and Grover Alexander reached it three times. Both were National League pitchers.

### UMPHMPH!

Many Americans are unable to watch Sumo Wrestling. The reason for this is of course because they are not familiar with the rules or the wrestlers.

Here are a few of the major rules which are very important to know.

A bout is won by forcing the opponent out of the inner circle or throwing him in the ring. To lose the match it is necessary to fall in the circle or to be pushed completely out. The wrestler who touches the ground with any part of his body, his knees, or even the tip of his fingers, loses the match.

Striking with fists, hair pulling, eye gouging, choking, and kicking in the stomach or chest, are prohibited. As there are no weight limits as in boxing or Greco-Roman wrestling it is possible for a wrestler to find himself against an opponent twice his own weight.

There are six Grand Tournaments a year. Three are held in Tokyo, and one each in Osaka, Nagoya, and Kyushu. A tournament winner is awarded the Emperor's Cup on the final day after the last match.

Sumo has started (September 15) and is being held in Tokyo. For those who want to see an exciting sport they can drive up and pay 400 yen for a good seat. For those who are lazy it's on television, channel 1, 3:30 to 5:30.

Yo-Hi! YO-HI BOOSTER CLUB! Yo-Hi

## Tennis

The game's history dates from December 1873, when Major Walter Clepton Wingfield introduced the sport to his guests at a garden party on his estate at Mantoloking, Wales. In 1874 Major Wingfield, an officer in the British Army, patented the game under the Greek name of Sphairistike. The court was shaped like an hourglass, measuring 60 ft. long 30 ft. wide at the base lines, and 21 ft. wide at the center, where a net was suspended. The net was 7 ft. high at the ends and sagged to 4 ft. 8 in.

Tennis was introduced to the United States in 1874 by Miss Mary Ewing Outerbridge. Her brother, A. Mallius Outerbridge, received permission to set up his net and mark off the court on the grounds of Staten Island Cricket and Baseball Club at St. George, Staten Island. Newport and Philadelphia became early centers of tennis, along with New York and Easton. The first important tournament was at Staten Island in 1880.

# Student Opinions:

## What happened to 9-B?

On Tuesday, September 10, the riders of bus 9-B to Yokosuka were given the word from Pete-san that there would be no more afternoon 9-B bus back to Yokosuka, and that all riders would have to ride 8-B. This is the latest deprivation to 9-B—a trend that started last year. Last year a few sophomores were placed on it. Then, to the horror and disgust of all, a pair of freshmen were stuck on it. Instead of its being a bus which underclassmen could look forward to someday riding, it was now the catch-all for all the people, regardless of what class they were in.

Then this year the administration dropped any pretense that the underclassmen riding 9-B were a hazard. They now made 9-B the bus for seniors, juniors, and sophomores. Their explanation, as we heard it, was that there was just not enough room on 8-B for the sophomores and freshmen. (We wondered among ourselves if they hadn't heard of adding another bus to the route. Apparently they hadn't, and, in fact, they thought they could afford to drop one, so they lowered the boom on 9-B again by cutting the afternoon run.)

We speculate that Pete-san came on the bus one afternoon when football practice was going strong, and, noting the empty seats, decided the run wasn't worth the cost. This he probably reported to Mr. Spaulding who duly told Public Works to cut the afternoon run.

What they failed to take into consideration was the fact that on some days the football players just don't have to practice which results in a sudden flood of people to 8-B. Now, then, stop here to remember that even on normal days with the average number of people sick there are no empty seats. Throw in ten or so more people and you have something closely akin to a sardine can, with a large amount of overflow.

Why can't the administration just put 9-B back into its proper place. This would entail just reinstating the afternoon run and putting the sophomores back on 8-B or a bus of their own, if there are so many of them. If the administration did do this they would receive the thanks of countless future riders of 9-B, the superior bus.

### KNOW YOUR CONSTITUTION

Section Seven: \*The Requirements for Officers (From the Yo-Hi Student Council Constitution)

a.
