It has been a month of changes in the political outlook of the Yo-Hi student body. Since our last poll, students opinions of candidates have changed a great deal. The most obvious switch has been the decline of McCarthy and the rise of Nixon. Whether this occured because of the "Battle of Chicago" or what we don't know. What we do know is that the Democrats are in serious trouble. While Nixon has shed the "Old Nixon" image and taken on the personality of a winner, Humphrey has the twin albatrosses of the Chicago riots and LBJ around his neck. Since McCarthy has publicly renounced any chance of running on a fourth-party ticket his support has dwindled as his supporters search for a candidate to take up the peace standard. Wallace's support has doubled, probably as a result of the Chicago riotsthe perfect launcher for his law and order bomb. While far behind Nixon, Wallace does prove a great threat to Humphrey.

As it stands now, Nixon is well out in the lead and would win if the election were held at Yo-Hi tomorrow. As a non-runner, McCarthy can't come from behind to steal it. Humphrey seems to be pretty much done for and will probably fall far short of the mark. Wallace, while rising, has a long way to go before he could put up serious competition.

JAPANESE GULTURE

OsaRa is Japan's bustling capital of industry and trade. It is also Japan's center of stage drama. Osaka attained this position when Japan's greatest dramatist, Chikamatsu Monzaemon, who was born in 1653, devoted his talents to writing exclusively for the Usaka stage. Besides the theaters that offer classical and modern kabuki drama, there are two that offer Noh classics and the famous Bunraku, the only real puppet theater in Japan.

There is also a castle that should not be missed. It was built by Hideyoshi Toyotomi in 1584, and remained a feudal fort until 1868 when it was almost totally destroyed by the retreating Tokugawa troops when they were forced out at the time of the Meiji Restoration. The castle was rebuilt and finally completed in 1931. It is now open to the public. On its upper peaks one has a very broad view of the city and its inhabitants.

There are a surprising number of cultural events in the city. There are excellent orchestras and singing groups coming in from Europe and the United States. Although Osaka is primarily an industrial city, a visit there would be well worthwhile, if only to see the attractions that I have mentioned.



The punitive action taken by the school to alleviate the bus problem shows that it doesn't really understand the causes and background of the problem. I said in my last article that the overcrowding of the busses precipitated more serious problems (fighting,

yelling, etc.)

Someone in the administration has obviously misconstrued this by believing that I was directing my criticism to the problems resulting from overcrowd-I was simply trying to expose the fact that there was overcrowding and gave suggestions as to how to end it. I said then, and I'll say it again, by checking bus cards the overcrowding problems would be solved and the problems resulting from it would likewise end.

The school has responded by segregating the busses, one for the boys and one for the girls. This does not solve the overcrowding and only compounds the problems which results from the overcrowding. That both sexes should be allowed to ride the same bus is a

healthy and normal thing.

When persons of the opposite sex are together there are social restrictions placed on each in what they would say and do in the presence of each other. When boys are segregated from the girls, these restrictions disintegrate, freeing them from saying or doing something that might offend someone from the opposite sex. Thus, segregating the busses not only doesn't end the parercrowding but also makes the problems resulting from overcrowding ten times worse.

I only hope that the school administration, through more careful consideration and probing of this problem, will reach the same conclusion.

Shifting his weight forward, he reaches high to strike the ball. Finally, he follows through by pivoting slightly to the left, keeping his eyes on the ball.

The forehand drive -- The player stands with his side to the net and with the racket held back. Watching the ball closely, he holds the racket level as he starts his swing. Next he strikes the ball as it comes opposite his hip. His body pivots at the hips and his weight is shifted to his forward foot. The follow through then carries the racket across his body.

The backhand stroke-The player stands with his right side to the net. The racket is held behind his left side. In the follow through, the racket is held well out from the body and brought beyond the shoulder.
