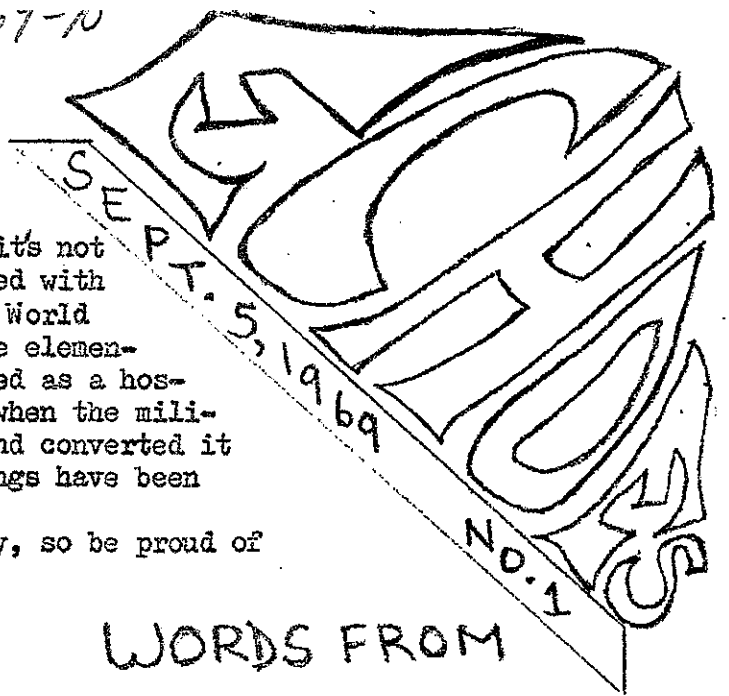

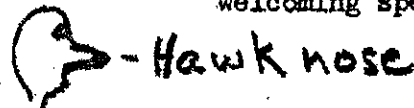

# JAPANESE CULTURE

In Japan only about 45% of the houses have baths in them. This means that the other 55% of the people must go to public baths. These public baths are located on almost every large street in Japan. The size of them varies a little, but the average size is about 60 by 90 feet.

When the Japanese go to the ofuro, they must provide for themselves a towel and some soap. At the large entrance there is a section to store shoes. There are two more smaller entrances, one for males and one for females. Upon entering you will find a large room where you are able to change and also pay your fare, 15¥ for children and 35¥ for adults. After changing you put your clothes in a small locker and go into the large ofuro. In this large ofuro there are about 50 places where a person can wash. At each section there is hot and cold water with a small stool and wash pan. After washing with soap and rinsing off the people go soak in the hot bath which is able to hold about 50 people at once. These baths are kept hot to satisfy the Japanese.

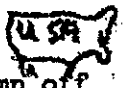

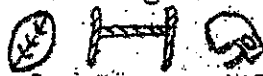
