BOOK FAIR OUT

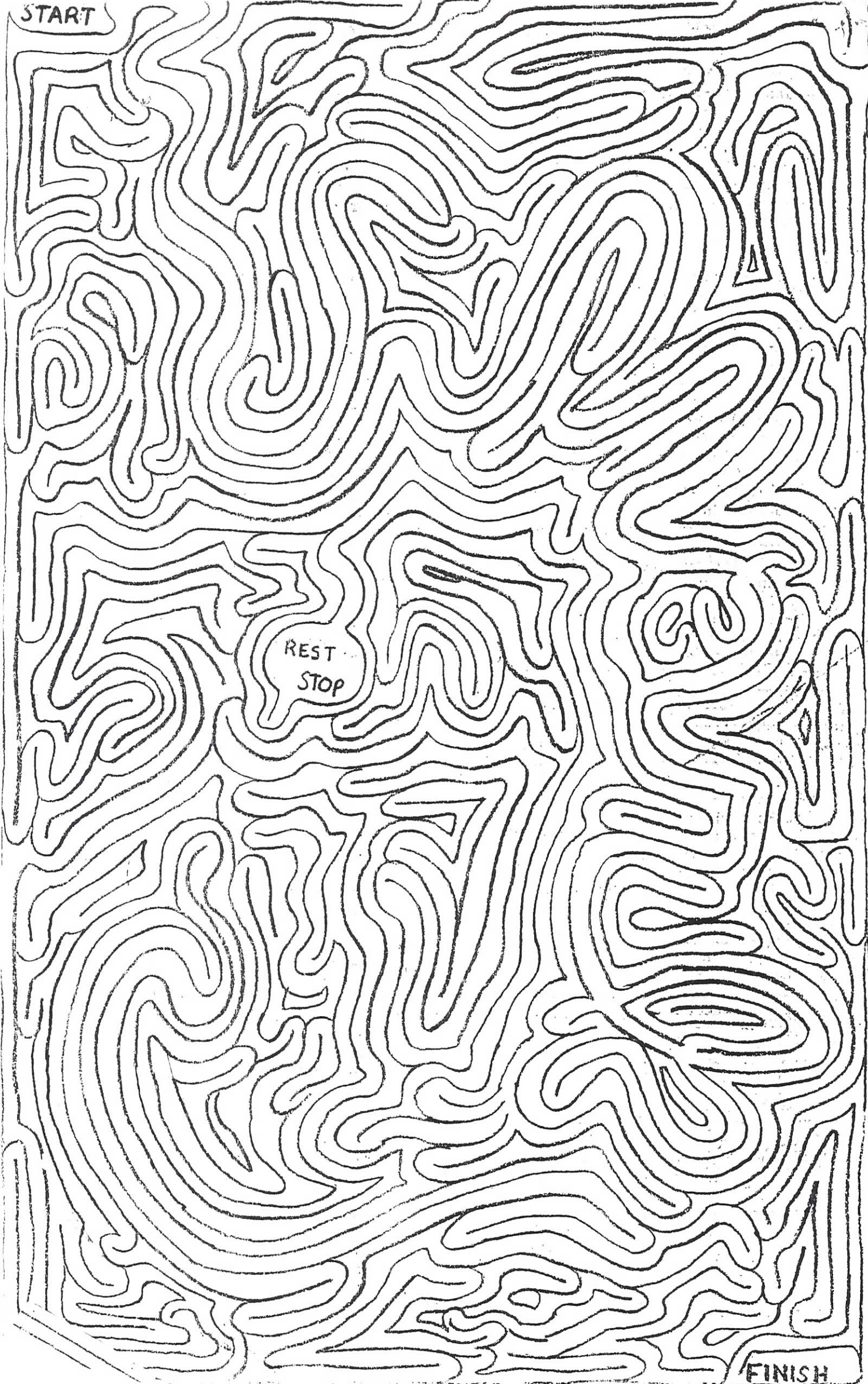
This article is for those who have been wondering when this year's book fair will be. We are sorry, but there will not be a book fair this year.

Of course, you wouldn't want your heart to stop, so from today, if you take this article and yourself seriously enough, be careful of what you eat. Fish, chicken, and vegetables—in fact any things that keep you away from a diet built just on red meats and oils—can help you avoid problems later in life. **He's everywhere, he's everywhere**

Last Friday night, our feared Yo-Hi Devils suffered a defeat at the hands of the Johnson Falcons. Although our boys played a hard game, mental errors and bad breaks kept them from taking the game. Johnson and Yo-Hi being fairly equal teams, every mistake dearly hurt us. Yo-Hi beat Johnson earlier in the season 20-18.

The first half saw the Red Devils outdistance the Falcons both in passing and on the ground. Yo-Hi had 91 yards rushing and 128 yards passing. Tim Traaen's four caught during the first half accounted for the 128 yards. Traaen took on in for the TD and Allen Archie made the PAT good. The score at the end of the first half found Yo-Hi in the lead 8-0.

During the second half the Falcons and the Devils battled on even terms. However, two bad breaks--an intercepted pass on the one-yard line and a long pass to Jim McCoy called back--caused Johnson to take the lead and the game 14-8 in the final seconds of the game. The Falcons' only scores came on a quarterback sneak from the one-yard line and a pass to Ron Coder with about 1 minute remaining in the game.

We would like to compliment Yo-Hi's front five on defense (Traaen, Degregio, Ross, Kishinami, and Rose) for holding Johnson to a minimum on the ground. Defensive stand-outs for this game were Shuler, Traaen, and Clark.

Johnson and Yo-Hi are now tied for second place both with 6-2 records. Chofu continues to lead the league with a 7-1 record. 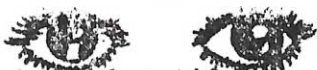

EYES



Your eyes were made to be beautiful. They sparkle like jewels with their own moisture. If they never expressed a thought or communicated an emotion, they would still be beautiful.

The pupil and lens adjust themselves instantly to the constant changes of light and distance. The muscles of the eyeballs, six of them for each eye, turn and adjust twin cameras without any effort on your part.

Since they are so sturdy, you may wonder why your eyes sometimes look and feel strained, why they lose their luster, why sometimes they seem smaller than usual and give a look of tension to your face. We human beings depend most on our vision. Our eyes need and deserve the best of care from the inside as well as the outside.

In all the body's mechanisms the eyes most need all types of vitamins.

The most apparent result of the lack of vitamin A is night blindness. Other results are loss of moisture and luster in the cornea and eye tissues.

The B vitamin lack results in the eyes becoming bloodshot, itchy, burning; they water frequently and are sensitive to light.

Without vitamin C, it seems that many people become troubled with the serious condition of cataracts, the clouding of the crystalline lens.

The sunshine vitamin D is the one which the body must have in order to make strong bones and teeth. Here is a curious fact that came from two experimental studies: a lack of vitamin D and calcium produced nearsightedness in puppies, and the addition of vitamin D to the diet of nearsighted children improved their vision or prevented it from getting worse.

One more point in this beauty-feeding of the eyes: It isn't enough to take food into your body. It must be distributed, and this means good circulation of the blood through exercise.

Here are two simple eye drills for every day: 1. Turn your head from side to side as if saying an emphatic "no." 2. Hold your index finger about ten inches away from your eyes. Look at its tip, then into the distance. Do both these exercises ten times.

Your eyes reflect the living spirit of you. If your spirit is alive and eager to drink in the world around you, your eyes will shine with that eagerness. They will grow wide and beautiful with your appetite for life.

One of the many public services of the Plant is the research on the problems of ecology and, in particular, air pollution. Penny Kittleson: I believe in it to a degree. Some women believe in both "ladies first" and "equality," which I cannot agree with.

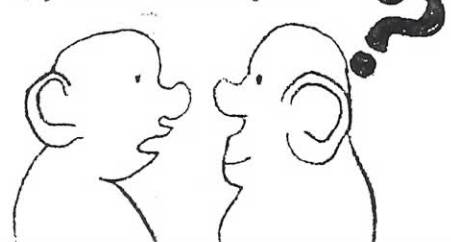
Patty Stokke: I think it's good but some of the things they do are quite dumb.

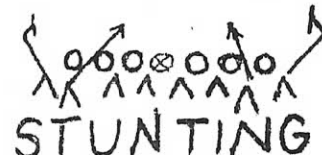
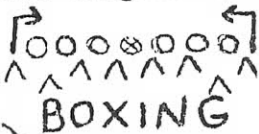

DEFENSIVE MAINSTAY

The defensive end is one of the main anchor-men of the whole defensive unit. The defensive unit is not worth a thing if the end cannot hold the offensive onslaught.

The defensive end has several options from which to choose. These options are boxing, the main job for a defensive end; crashing, this is usually used when it is a passing situation or when a punt is evident; or stunting with a linebacker, when he really wants to screw up an offense.

These are diagrams of the options:



The main duty for the end is to contain all sweeps and make them go to the inside where the interior linemen and linebackers can demolish the effort. If a swing pass is tried (in which the halfbacks come around the end looking for a pass), the defensive end must sense this and stick to the halfback and discourage him from getting the ball.

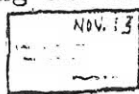
