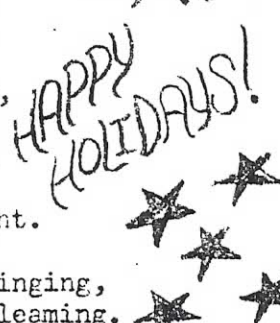

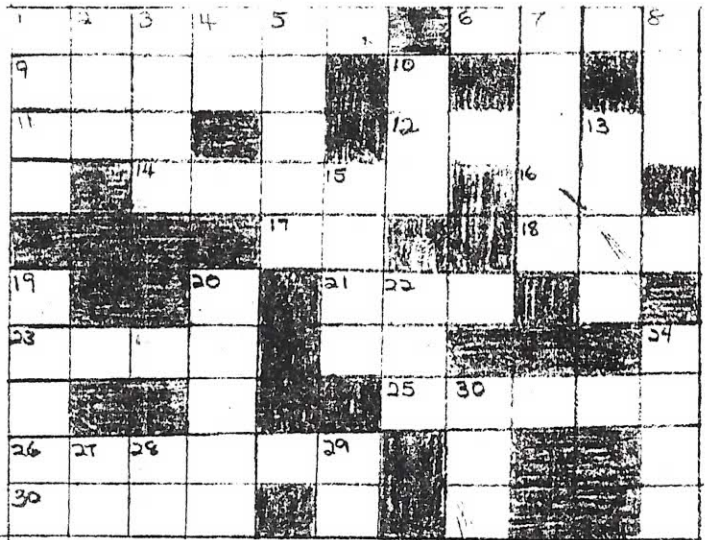

the rest of us, we can only contemplate, "on earth peace, good will to men."

AN ICHOFES EDITORIAL

With 36 percent of all American youths who die between the ages of 15 and 24 killed in automobile accidents, driver education should become a required high school course in all high schools--including YO-HI. This shocking toll--four times higher than that caused by the worst disease in this age group--indicates an epidemic of major proportions. Nevertheless, the only effective antidote thus far devised--driver education--in our school has never been adopted.

The standard driver education course provides for 30 mandatory hours of group instruction in the classroom, plus a minimum of six elective hours of individual instruction behind the wheel. In 1960, opponents of driver education tried to do away with the in-traffic training in Los Angeles, but a careful study of its merits revealed that schools should not only continue practice-driving but should expand it. Driver education is a program which does save lives and money and should be offered at Yo-Hi.

Perhaps the most meaningful proof of this fact was shown in an Illinois study released in September 1963. The study taken on 600,000 young drivers showed that untrained students (those possessing no high-school driving course) were involved in almost four times more accidents and twice as many violations as an equal group of trained students.

But the most convincing evidence that driver education is effective comes from insurance companies, whose rates are based on case-hardened actual experience. As most of you know, liability rates for young drivers are very high. Yet virtually all of the leading insurance firms grant discounts of 10 to 15 percent for boys and girls, 16 through 20 years of age, who have passed a high-school driving course meeting national standards.

If driver education has proven so effective, why is there so much widespread opposition, and why isn't driver education offered at Yo-Hi? Some of the strongest resistance comes from educators who feel that driving courses only add to the already backbreaking load of instruction and activities. But we say, as it is now, students and teachers find time for a whole range of nonacademic activities. Why not replace some of these with driver education?

Regular studies need not suffer. Students from Evanston Township High School, in Illinois, have won a high reputation for scholarship during the past twenty years, yet the school still finds time to give driver education in the classroom to all sophomores each year.

A more valid excuse at Yo-Hi would be the nonavailability of driving teachers. Obviously, the only answer to this problem is to get a teacher. Mr. Spaulding stated that Yo-Hi is not allowed a teacher for this course. He also added, however, that Tachikawa offers this course for $\frac{1}{4}$ credit. If Tachikawa is appropriated a teacher for this purpose, why isn't Yo-Hi?

New and ingenious mechanical aids are helping to provide better instruction. An exciting new device called a driving simulator now makes it possible for one instructor to handle 12 to 16 students simultaneously in a realistic simulation of actual driving. During the last school year, more than 500 schools used this device with excellent results. Although a typical classroom installation of 12 simulators costs around \$20,000, important economies result. Wichita, Kan., by investing \$40,000 in simulators, is now training 1600 students at an annual saving of \$21,000. If Yo-Hi adopts driver education, Special Services could provide the money for the simulators as they promised to do a few years ago.

Many states ease the financial burden on schools by collecting say \$2 for every fine of \$20 for moving traffic violations. Money is also collected by adding to the driver's license fee or to the cost of car licenses or by making the charge higher for the license examination. Although this could not be done overseas, a fee of \$5-\$25 perhaps could be required of students desiring to take the course.

Driver education must become mandatory in all our high schools, including Yo-Hi. In the meantime, we continue to pay more than is necessary both in money and in death on the highways.

HANUKKAH

When December comes, all of us think of Christmas. But also from the evening of the 25th of this month is the Jewish Feast of Lights called Hanukkah.

This holiday lasts for eight days, and each one is filled with songs, games, food, and the lighting of the Hanukkah Candle.

Like Christmas, Hanukkah is a joyous holiday. On the first night, Jewish families gather around the menorah, or eight-branched candlestick while one candle is lit, and so forth, until the eighth night. As these candles are lit every night two blessings are recited. The children will receive Hanukkah gifts, or presents of money, and play "dreidel" in a circle.

Dreidel is a game played with a tiny spinning top with a different Hebrew letter printed on each of its four sides. Each letter has a different value of money or nuts. When the spinning of the dreidel ceases, one letter faces up. The player with the most money or nuts at the end of the game wins.
