

Have you ever stopped to wonder what a day at Yo-Hi's really like? Let's recapture the story of an overyday "thing" at Yo-Hi.

At approximately 7:00 a.m., Yo-Hians roll in. Either on big, bad busses from Yokosuka or on foot from near-by areas. The sounds that come in these wee hours of the morning vary greatly. But, the kids leave their mark behindpapers, on the floor, writing on the walls, desks out of line and many other such rememberances.

The teachers sigh with relief. They are all one-track minded; they never think about the future. They never worry about what tomorrow will bring . . . They knowthe same herd of happy hearts.

I can't quarantee that you will really dig this, but I find it a great escape from the smog and filth of the City.

Remember what's happening, and take your chick to Kamakura, the place that's happening.

On Wednesday, January 27, 1971 a funny thing happened on the way home from school. I had with me two sour pickles and I only wanted one. This attitude of desire not only helps them but I, as their teacher, could overcome many of the problems that become apparent as a new program such as this develops. Other reasons for liking this type of teaching position are: 1. 





Can a high school counselor accurately predict a student's success in a chosen field from adolescent personality test profiles?

Yes, according to Project Talent reserchors William W. Colley of the University of Pittsburgh and Faul R. Lohnes of the State University of New York at Buffalo. In 1960, the Talent staff undertook a

massive, long-range effort to see whether educational and vocational choices-and achdevement in a chosen field-might be predicted from adolescent personality test profiles. They leveloped a battory of 100 tests to measure ability, achievement, interests, and other adolescent personality characteristics and administered them to almost half a million atudents.

From the follow-up interviews of students five years after high school graduation. Cooley and Lohnes were able to identify relationships between Project Talent test predictions and the educational patterm those students actually followed.

They found that there was a unique profile for mathematicians, and, in fact, one for each of the other major fields. The profiles were so accurate that they outguessed the students themselves in many cases. For example, high school sentors who had engineering profiles but planned to major in some other field were likely to have switched to engineering during the five years after high school.

A high school counseler will scon be able to tes, his students and, with histories of the Talent studies at hand, point out the paths that others with similar profiles have taken and the success they have had. The process of making comparisons is highly complex, and a Talent group at the American Institutes for Research is programing a computer to sid the counselor. Fowever, the idea is not be advise a student to become a doctor or a lawyer but to explain that he possesses general capabilities that

would prove useful in a variety of specific jobs. -taken from Today's Education, November 1970
