Yo-Hi to visit United Nations

Once again this year, Yo-Hi will participate in the annual Model United Nations day. This involves all nine of the high schools in the Kanto Plains. Details of the meeting this year are scarce, according to Mr. Edgerly, Yo-Hi's sponsor to the model U.N. At this point, we are unsure which nations Yo-Hi will represent, how many delegates we will have, or even where the event will be staged this year. Last year, you may remember, it was held at Chofu and the year before at A.S.I.J.

National Honor Society old-timers from last year were Beth Chambers, Jim Fulop, Alan Fujimoto, John Lowell, Marty Meyers, Jenny McMahan, Tina Walker, and Jean Watt. The new inductees were Jill Howard, Robert Rhodes, Joe Ross, Naomi Okawara, Arlyne Tamashiro, Leslie March, Linda Enga, Nancy Hutchinson, Marian Meyers, Judy Holmstrom, Steve Thomas, and Richard Christianson. The induction brought National Honor Society membership up to 20 here at Yo-Hi. After the assembly was dismissed, the National Honor Society held a reception in the Home Economics room for the members and their parents.

The painting of the slogan "Home of the Devils--Hell" on the gym wall was almost unanimously approved, and most students feel our school spirit is "Good to Fair."

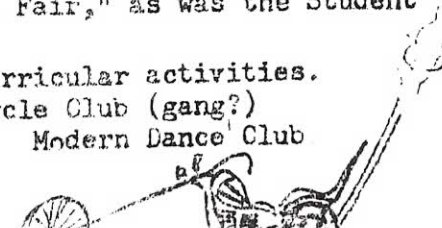
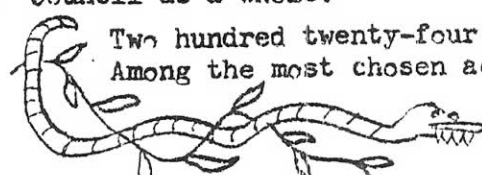
Many feel that our teams do not receive enough coverage, especially the minor sports.

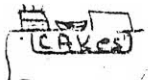

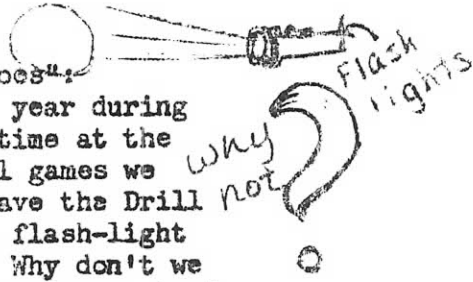

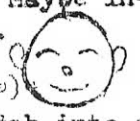

## U.S. POWER!

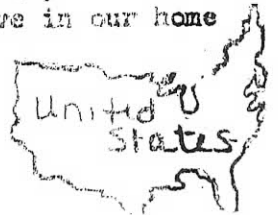

Only a few years ago when a person wanted a roll of film he usually ran down to the drugstore and had the choice of black and white or color film. Usually it was to be found in negative form of emulsion. Today, there are a multitude of different types of camera formats. Generally, the classes are two: Negative and positive reversal. Since there are too many types of films in the black and white, color, negative and

reversal types of films, today I will discuss only the black and white categories which are of the negative class and are readily available on the market today. Each type of film has its own particular characteristics in the way it picks up variations in the light spectrum. In B&W the "colors" are shown in black and white and shades of gray. If the film is negative, the result in the negative is opposite from the true color which is to be printed for the final result. A film's sensitivity is measured by a standardized measure called an ASA index rating. The ASA index is a set standard of how much light (gamma radiation) is needed for a good exposure and was set by the American Standard Association, similar to the West German Din Rating. Another thing to keep in mind is the type of lighting used when exposing the film. Practically all films, with the exception of those which are sensitive to infra-red are faster (more sensitive) with daylight than tungsten lamps. Therefore, when using tungsten lighting, a lower ASA index should be used.

As an example, we will take a few different Eastman Kodak negative B&W films and compare them to each other. Panatomic-X is regarded as a slow fine grain film and is good for scenics, landscapes and portraits. When this film is used outdoors, it is rated at ASA 32. When shot indoors with tungsten lighting, it's index becomes approximately ASA 25. This film is great for extreme enlargements although there is a need for a lot of light, either artificial or tungsten, electronic flash, etc.

A medium speed film is Kodak Plus-X pan film. It is good for average, everyday snapshots and is not too grainy for enlargements for pictures of the 10 X 12 inch size. It has a property of being quite contrasty and is good for special effects, although, it can sometimes be a headache when it is underexposed. Plus-X pan is an ideal film for non-adjustable cameras such as instamatics that have a set shutter speed of about 1/90th of a second at f/11.

Tri-X pan is considered a fast film which has a thick emulsion and backing and is very good for taking pictures where there is very poor lighting surrounding the subject. When enlargements of sizes of 10 X 12 inches are made, grain is noticeable and sometimes sharpness is not really "there." Although this film is not of the finest quality, many people use it for their standard film, using it all the time.

Once again, I stress the idea that every film is different, and each has it's own particular characteristics. By trying different types of brands and changing developing techniques, unusual effects can be found by experimenting with a few rolls of film.
