## DAVID MASON

TRIBUTE TO DAVID MASON

One of the most unknown and greatest musical masters of our age is most certainly alive and well, but still generally unrecognized. That man is Dave Mason. If you can remember that far back, he's the guy that was in TRAFFIC in the days before the short-lived BLIND FAITH. What most of you don't know is that a few songs you have dug and are probably still digging were written by this man. I was kind of looking through some records the other day and I came across TRAFFIC'S first and second albums and some of Dave Mason's songs. The first album contained two of Dave Mason's songs. Although he was associated with the band, he was not in it. However, in the second album he joined TRAFFIC and five of the ten songs in the album were his. Probably his biggest song was "Feeling Alright?" also recorded by THREE DOG NIGHT and JOE COCKER. The songs in this album are his greatest accomplishment. I suggest that you listen to it, although Winwood over-shadows Mason here, his brilliance shines through the whole album. Mason was also featured along with Eric Clapton on the DELANY AND BONNIE "On Tour" album. He has one song in that. Mason has also put out his own album. Unfortunately I have not heard it yet. Most likely he has tried to break away from the TRAFFIC influence and go into the thing Clapton and Harrison are in because I haven't heard too much of him recently. I could not recommend his solo album to you. But if you feel you need a change from SANTANA and GRAND FUNK, look to Dave Mason. See through your ears, the choice is yours...

The Seniors find it especially hard. Many of them have already been accepted to a college, so why should they study? Well, your records are sent to the college after you graduate and it looks good to keep your grades up.

For you underclassmen, why let this spring season ruin your report card? If you just give yourself that extra little push, you'll be helping your grades tremendously. It may be a little hard, but try and you will see the difference.

Last October Yo-Hi was examined by the North Central Accrediting Association evaluation team. The result of the evaluation is an extensive report completely plastering the first floor main bulletin board showcase. Those few that take time to glance over it can see that YO-Hi came out fairly well in the eyes of the investigators. On a whole, the report teems with lavish praise of Yo-Hi's administration, faculty, and student body which makes you wonder how much of the praise is standard procedure and how much of Yo-Hi is so highly commendable.

Many areas under study were found to be more than satisfactory "under the Circumstances" (i.e. foreign country, lack of funds, small school size, etc.).

But since we were rated so well in nearly everything except material needs, you know we do have something to be proud of "considering our situation." Most of the NCA team's criticism concerned the lack of needed material assets. Specific examples include: lack of space in the art department, lack of electric typewriters in the business department, poor repair of typewriters in typing and journalism rooms, unacceptable gym floor, unacceptable shop facilities, and science lab equipment shortages. Many of these shortcomings are only too obvious to us, but we welcome most of this criticism because many times it forces funds to be given to our school to correct them. Major examples of this type of action can be seen in our new gym floor, and the gymnastics room (from NCAA's last visit).

The curriculum at Yo-Hi was highly commended "under the circumstances" with almost every department receiving compliments, some dubious, some not.

Despite the moaning and groaning of many Yo-Hians, we were rated well "under the circumstances," and we will be accredited until North Central's next evaluation visit the year after next.

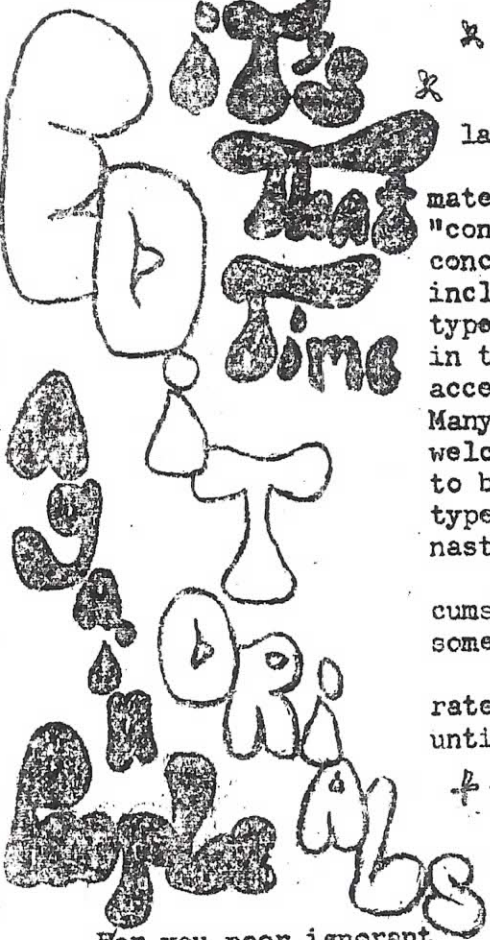
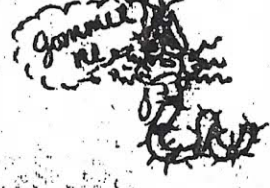

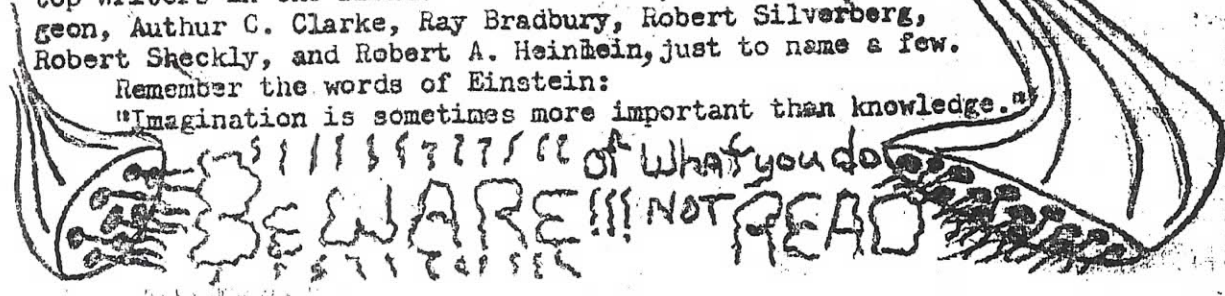


For you poor ignorant people out there who know nothing of science fiction, this informative editorial is for you.

Have you ever felt those sixth period cramps caused by an angry empty stomach? I, for one, have, the fault of my own ignorance.

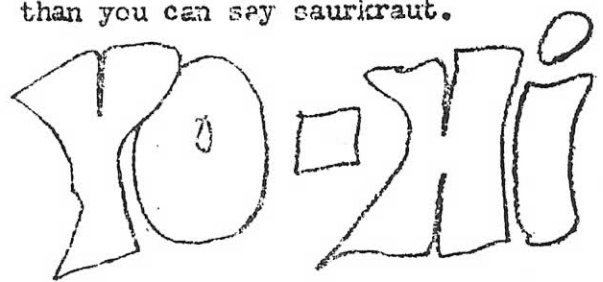

## Chaplain Brannan - WEEKLY MEDITATIONS

One of the greatest questions we face in our time is that of human relations, how to live together everyday. A Jewish philosopher, Martin Buber, wrote a book in 1923 that has become a classic in this field. It is entitled I and Thou. In this book Buber says there are two basic relationships that exist in the world the "I-Thou" and the "I-It" relationship. The difference is really simple. In one we relate as a person (I) with another person (Thou) and in the other we relate as a person (I) to an object (It).

Now all that is very philosophical but what does it mean practically in our relationships? Well, would you rather be treated as a person or an object? Think about it for a moment. In relating to objects we have nothing to consider but our own feelings. We can manipulate the "thing" any way we want because it has no feelings. We can break it, destroy it, use it or even revere it because we have control and it is just a thing. But what if you begin to treat persons that way--as objects--ITS--never considering their rights, freedoms, feelings, desires. What if we begin to try and manipulate them like we would a thing, just to satisfy our own desires and whims.

There are problems--hate, hurt, anger--all those things which separate us from each other. And that kind of thing goes on every day, on the street, in our homes, in the halls of KHS, people trying to use other people or treating them as just another obstacle to be kicked aside. The only relationship that is truly human is the I-Thou one which always treats the other person as one, with concern and the same rights as every other person. The simplest expression of this perhaps is the Biblical expression--"Love your neighbor as yourself." Do We?

# Places To Go

Hungry? Want Chinese Food? Japanese food? You name it and you can find it in downtown Yokohama on the north side of the train station. There are several department stores located here and each one has a floor with nothing but restaurants. Our favorite one is the fifth floor of Yokohama Station. The price range is varied, usually you can select what you want from their showcase and purchase your tickets as you enter.
