Mr. Spaulding informed us that there was no bomb in the school, but the administration was relatively sure of the voice that made the call. The penalty for someone who is found guilty of this charge is deportation and a jail term. The bussing that all of us went through was part of the bomb scare policy, which said that you must keep students a safe distance from the area that is in danger.

The search centered on the main building. All lockers were opened, and those locks which would not open with the school's master key were cut off. (Those students with cut locks can contact Pete-sar for reimbursment.) Mr. Spaulding said that even if a bomb scare was called everyday, the administration could not take the chance of having people in the school, and they would evacuate it. But, there would be no stops for lunch like the last time. The whole affair would be as unpleasant as could be for the students.

We asked Mr. Spaulding if the scare had anything to do with the writings on the walls. He said "The person that made the call was using the tension created by the walls incident as a good time to make a call, but we do not believe there was any real connection."
