This week the "Echoes" again had a press conference with Mr. Spaulding. This interview centered on the bomb scare of last week.

The first question that was asked was: "How was the school notified of the bomb threat?" Mr. Spaulding replied, "We were notified by a telephone call. The caller first asked for me but I was in conference--next Mrs. Cantrell, but she was in conference also. So, Pete-san received the call. The person told us that the bomb was in the main building--that's all." Mr. Spaulding then told us that there is a bomb scare policy in which certain things must be done and certain people notified:

- 1. Fire Department
- 2. Security Officers
- 3. Transportation
- 4. Schools Officer
- 5. Superintendent of all schools

The Fire Department of Yokohama and Yokosuka, Security Officers of Yokohama and Yokosuka, CID, and NISOJ all investigated and searched for the bomb. Also, Yokosuka sent some demolition men.

Mr. Spaulding informed us that there was no bomb in the school, but the administration was relatively sure of the voice that made the call. The penalty for someone who is found guilty of this charge is deportation and a jail term.

The bussing that all of us went through was part of the bomb scare policy, which said that you must keep students a safe distance from the area that is in danger.

The search centered on the main building. All lockers were opened, and those locks which would not open with the school's master key were cut off.

(Those students with cut locks can contact Pete-sar for reimbursment.) Mr. Spaulding said that even if a bomb scare was called everyday, the administration could not take the chance of having people in the school, and they would evacuate it. But, there would be no stops for lunch like the last time. The whole affair would be as unpleasant as could be for the students.

We asked Mr. Spaulding if the scare had anything to do with the writings on the walls. He said "The person that made the call was using the tension created by the walls incident as a good time to make a call, but we do not believe there was any real connection."

The "Echoes" would like to thank Mr. Spaulding for his time in answering our questions.

This past week and a half, the first period classes participated in a National Honor Society sponsored canned food drive. It was a miserable flop. For a school of 400 and some kids we managed to bring in a grand total of... (well it was less than one hundred anyway).

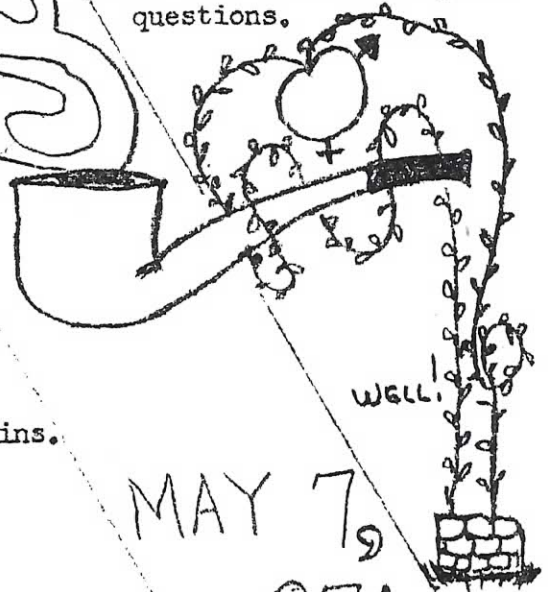
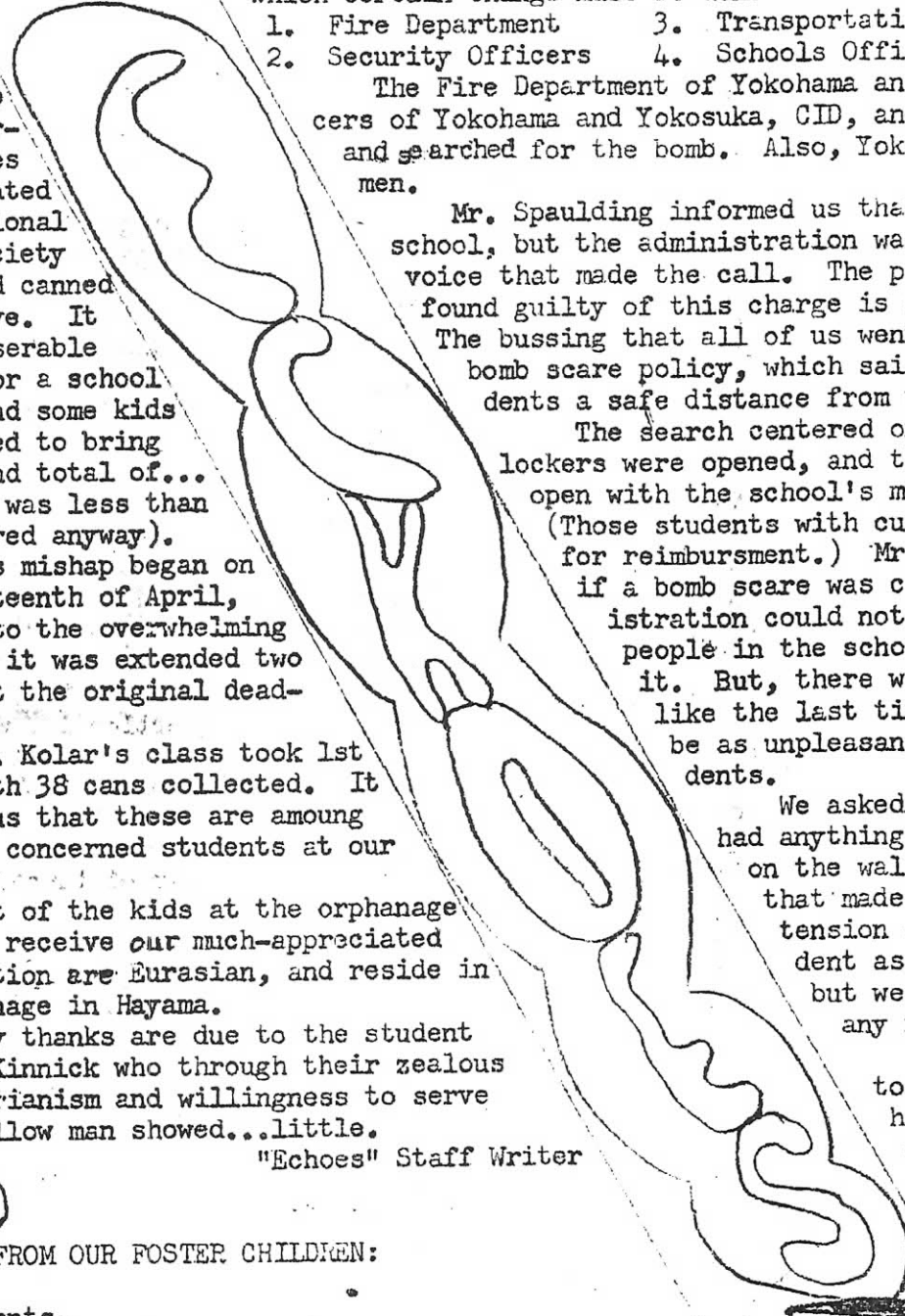
This mishap began on the nineteenth of April, and due to the overwhelming response it was extended two days past the original deadline.

LETTERS FROM OUR FOSTER CHILDREN:

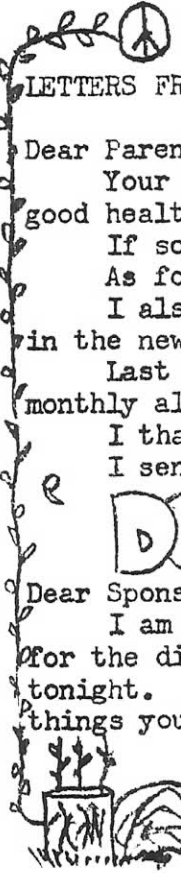
Dear Parents,

THE NEW YO-HI

On Wednesday the Japanese Government started to rip the innards out of the Marine Barracks in Yokosuka. All the floors will be taken out and rebuilt. All the plumbing, walls, ceiling and lighting will be torn out and replaced. All flammable walls and ceilings will become fire proof.

All this is to prepare for 700 students, grades 7-12, who will flood into Yo-Hi (Yokosuka High) next year.

Not all of the barracks will be used, however. The building is divided into nine parts, three on each floor. Only seven of these will be revamped. One will not have to be made over. Fortunately, this section is for the administration.

The new Yo-Hi students will have it better in other ways, too. They will get the Benny Decker Theater for band, drama, and chorus classes, as well as for assemblies. They will also use Thew Gym and the athletic field.

However, although the insides will be new, the outside will be as dull and dingy as ever. The refurbishing of the last two sections, the building of a quarter mile track, and the landscaping will come in the spring of '72.

Now what is this school coming to? Why should we let a handful of people spoil our freedom? If any more of this kind of "fun" happens, they will eventually put the reins on us.

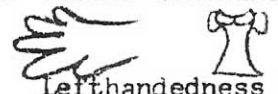
It's up to us if we want that or not. This is not just a harmless prank that kids do nowadays! It's a crime committed by some person who only thinks of himself and not what can happen to others.

To the student body of Yo-Hi:

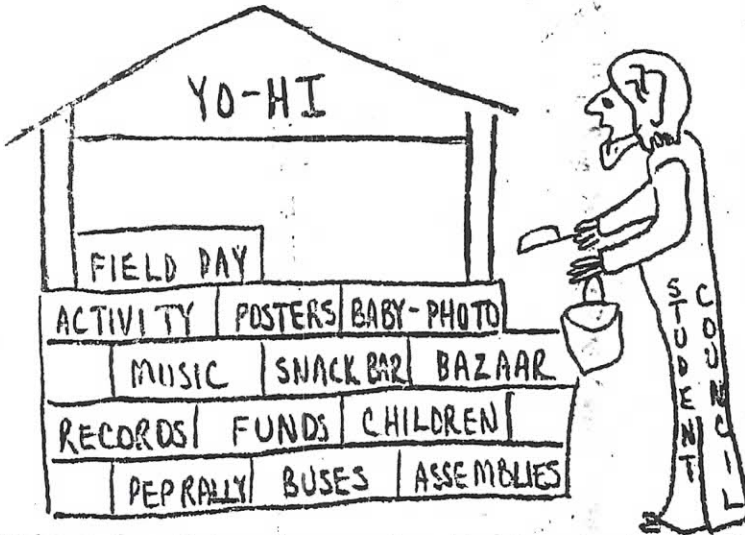

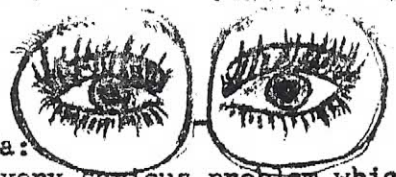
If this small change of having quarter finals in lieu of semester finals could be enacted, learning could become more effective and rewarding instead of damaging and useless to the mind.

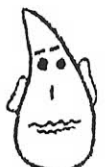

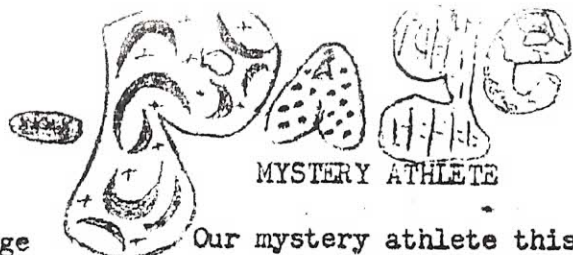
