# YOKOSUKA HAPPENINGS

When YO-Hi moves down to Yokosuka, students won't be allowed off base during school time. However, there's a lot to do on the big base. Many things that you won't be able to do off-base.

Special Service has a multitude of activities available to you if you have the initiative to go out and find them. To save you that trouble, this article will point out the interesting parts.

Both the tennis courts and the miniature golf course can be reached quickly from the school, as they are only a few blocks away. The tennis courts are in good condition but the miniature golf course leaves a lot to be desired. At the Rod & Gun facility, you can check out equipment for camping, hiking, or hunting. The archery range is next to the Rod & Gun facility, but you have to be 18 in order to use it.

The library is in "C" barracks for those who wish to study or do research. This library is better equipped than the one in Yokohama and much more enjoyable. You can also listen to records there at the library because it is equipped with stereo equipment. Then on the second floor of that building, there is the hobby shop, the wood shop and the Hi-fi shop. The third floor contains the recreation hall where you can go play pool and ping pong. Close to the NEX building, A-33, you can find the fleet lanes where you can go bowling or to the skating rink on the second floor.

If you're free on the weekend, you can go down to the Yacht basin to check out boats. You need a permission slip to take out the larger boats but you don't need any for the smaller boats (small sailboats, paddle boats, kayaks, and rowboats). They are available at a very minimal cost.

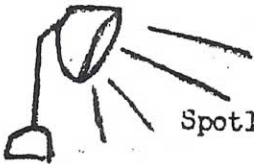

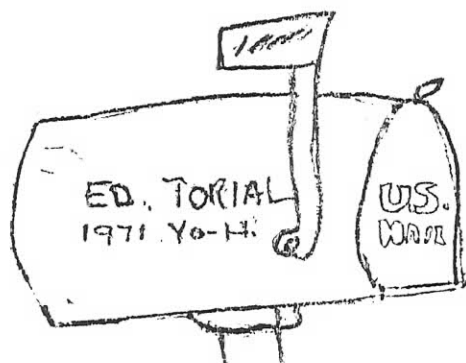
### The Value of the SAT

The Scholastic Aptitude Test is a very important and necessary tool in the rating of students who are applying for college enrollment.

SAT's are given at either the beginning or the middle of the senior year of high school. Most high schools, however, give a Preliminary SAT sometime during the junior year. Both of these SAT's help to compare and rank high school students of the same years with students all over the United States. For example, all of the juniors in the U.S. that took this standardized test are ranked.

Almost all colleges and universities require SAT scores. Correct complete, high school credits, helpful extracurricular activities, and good SAT scores help to get a student to college.

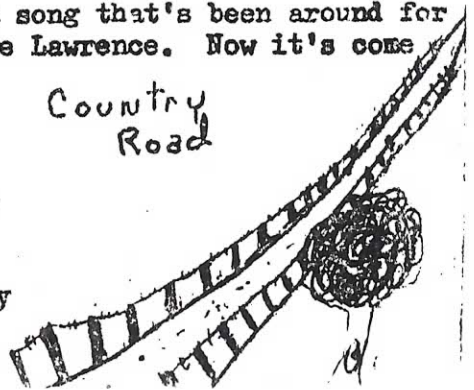
## TOPS IN POPS

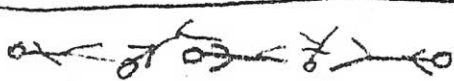
# DEVILS BLEW FIRST GAME

The co-defending champions of the Kanto Plains, our Yo-Hi Devils, kicked off their 1971 season playing host to the A.S.I.J. Mustangs last Friday night at 7:30. The A.S.I.J. Mustangs took the field wearing our last season's J.V. jerseys due to a mixup in their equipment. Things went against the Devils right from the start, with the Mustangs winning the toss of the coin. The Mustangs drew first blood when their left halfback scooted around our left end, broke into the clear, and raced some 68 yards for the score. The PAT was not good. It was downhill from then on for the Red Devils. With 2:47 of the 1st quarter remaining, the left halfback of the Mustangs again got around our left end for a score. The PAT was good. The score at the end of the first quarter was Mustangs 14, Yo-Hi 0.

At the beginning of the second quarter A.S.I.J. scored again for another six points. The PAT was no good. The Big Red Machine got moving midway through the second quarter, with Valdez connecting for a couple of passes to Gabriel but the Mustangs' defense rose to the occasion and held them, forcing the Devils to turn over the ball. 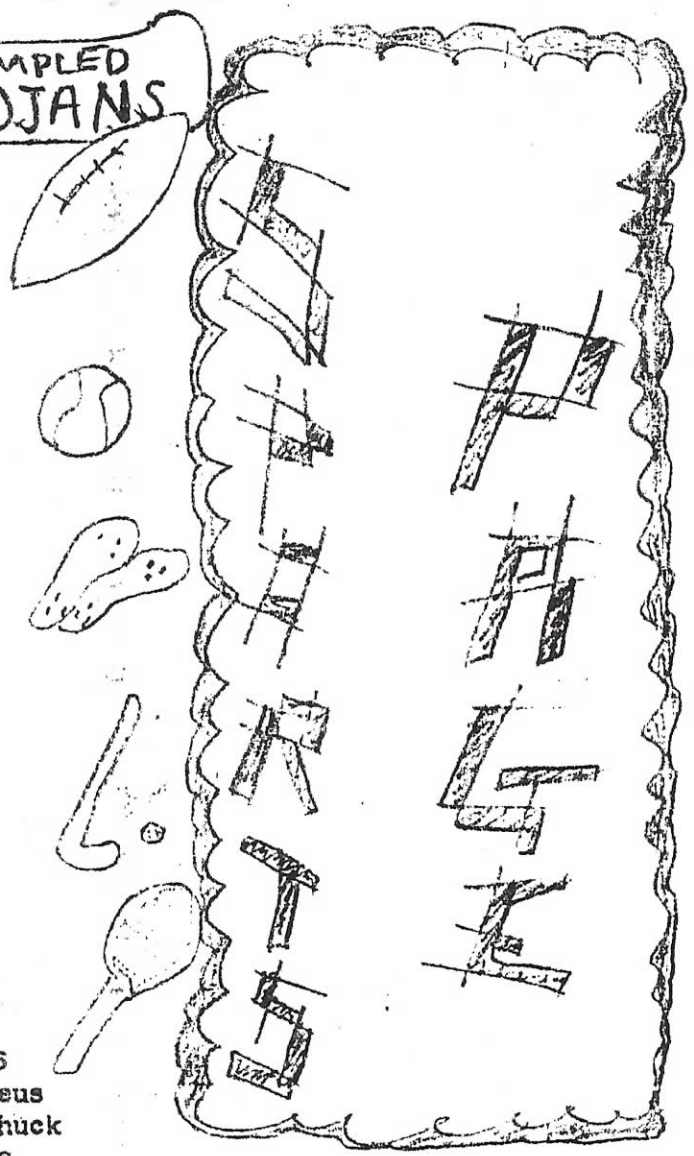
## C.C. - ers Needed

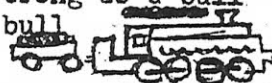

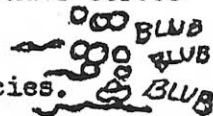

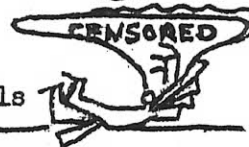
