
The Value of the SAT

The Scholastic Aptitude Test is a very important and necessary tool in the rating of students who are applying for college enrollment.

SAT's are given at either the beginning or the middle of the senior year of high school. Most high schools, however, give a Preliminary SAT sometime during the junior year. Both of these SAT's help to compare and rank high school students of the same years with students all over the United States. For example, all of the juniors in the U.S. that took this

standardized test are manked. Almost all colleges and universities require SAT scores. Correct complete, high school credits, helpful extracurricular activities, and good SAT scores help to get a student to college.
