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Senior Class

Junior Sponsor

The Junior Class of '73 will kick off their elections after the seniors as tradition has it.

However, plans are in the making to make this holiday extend for five days, with some students receiving a day off on the previous Wednesday or following Monday, depending where the student lives.

If you live in Yokohama, you will be required to attend school on the Wednesday before the recess. When you arrive at school at 7:30, you will be assigned a teacher with whom you will stick all day to sort out and pack all supplies, books, and the like. Meanwhile, Yokosuka students will either be bumming around or sleeping in. During Friday, Saturday, and Monday, all heavy equipment, such as desks, closets, and the tons of neatly(?) packed supplies will be hauled to the new school down South. However, the following Monday all Yokosuka students will be required to attend school, and will follow the same procedure as the Yokohama students, except

they will do all the unpacking.

But never fear, YO-HI will resume on Tuesday, with growling, sleepy-eyed Yokohama kiddies and grateful Yokosuka kiddies.

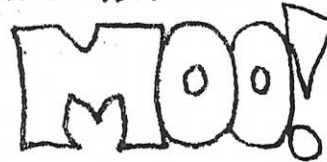
JEANS?

New grading system!

The following information, obtained in a talk with Mr. Hurst, will quiet some of the rumors about a change in our grading system. First of all it is true that the powers at the top are changing the system. Now instead of receiving a letter grade for the quarter, you will get a percentage mark. The following table explains the system. The total possible for one semester will be 100% divided as follows:

90-100--"A"
80-89--"B"
70-79--"C"
60-69--"D"
Below 60--"F"

This semester grade will be the average of the two quarter grades, both based on 100%.

Under the old system a lazy student could do "C" work the first quarter and not come to class the second quarter and still receive a passing "D" for the semester. But with the percentage system, if the student got a 70% (C) the first quarter and 0% (F) the second quarter, his semester grade would be 35% or an "F".

When asked why the switch was made, Mr. Hurst stated it was a step to get the students to work consistently hard. It is directed towards the student who doesn't want to work. Although many students dislike the new grading system, the majority of the teachers are in favor of it.

Another change discussed at the teachers' meeting was to do away with exams. (Yes, you read right!) This rule was passed, but not without a few objections. Now instead of semester final exams, the classroom days will extend to fill in the days previously used for testing. With this information, hopefully, you will be able to decode your report card without trouble.

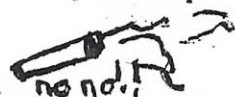
