To help insure that your Christmas mail reaches its Stateside destination in time, the U.S. Army Postal Service Center at Yokohama has provided deadline mailing dates for U.S. personnel.

The latest date one should mail letters and parcels will depend upon the type of article. The earliest deadline is November 12, for surface mail. This is parcel post, items too large to be sent as space available mail or parcel air lift. Maximum weight for surface mail is 70 pounds, while maximum

combined length and girth is 100 inches.

Space Available Mail (SAM) and Parcel Air Lift (PAL) items should be sent by December 1. SAM items are small parcels under five pounds in weight and 60 inches in length and girth. PAL parcels may weigh up to 30 pounds with 60 inches length and girth. PAL parcels cost a dollar more than SAM items because they are flown to the nearest air mail terminal in the United States, whereas SAM articles are flown only as far as Seattle

or San Francisco.

During the Navy Day Weekend a lot of things will be going on, but highlighting the whole thing will be the Navy Day Ball scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 14 beginning at 9:00pm. Entertainment will be Peggy March accompanied by the New Breed Orchestra. Later in the evening Japanese Western singer Tomi Fujiyama accompanied by the Hometowners will be performing.

The rumor going around that there will be a cafeteria on the third floor is just that—a rumor. Many people have been told that there will be one, but due to health regulations it will not open. The only time anyone will be able to get "munchies" will be when the classes have their bake sales, and when the Student Lounge opens.

The grand total of books in our library is 6,857. We're hoping that none of these books will be missing at the end of the year.


