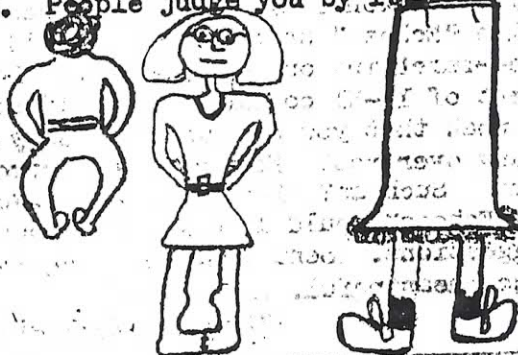

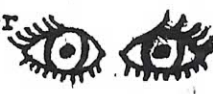

FRESHMAN FEATURE

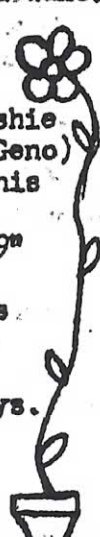

Why do things like that happen? I think that the administration should be more careful when they send out notices, whether they are for being absent, or not attending a certain resource center.

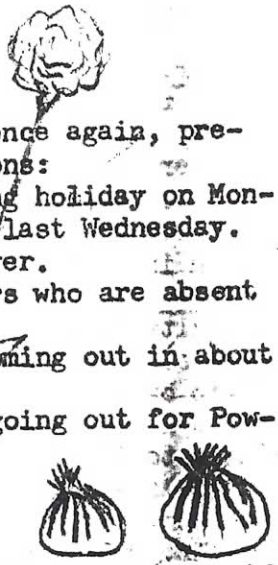

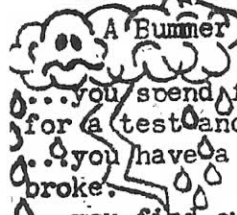
This person, although he has already graduated, has left a tradition for all of us to remember and follow. Not only was he a brilliant student, but a hard worker and a good baseball player.

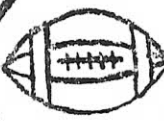

FRANCES' FASHION CORNER

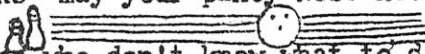

SNACK BAR

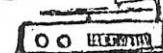
