China Voted In- Taiwan Out!

Last week, Communist China was voted into the United Nations winning admission by a vote of 76-35. Taiwan has been supported by the United States for 21 years. A resolution by the U.S. which required a two-thirds majority if Nationalist China was to be expelled lost by a vote of 59-55.

The United States' failure to keep Taiwan in the U.N. was considered to be the worst defeat in the U.N. history for the U.S. Japan, the Philippines, and Liberia were all for the two-China U.S. resolution. Congress is now urging a cut in some of the U.S. contribution to the U.N. and some Senators want to do worse. Others agreed to keep the contributions going as it could be the only hope to keep world peace.

Chow Shu-kai of Nationalist China has predicted that this would be the start of WW III. Tanzanians wearing Mao Tse-Tung outfits are said to have jumped up and down with joy, dancing a jig at the U.S. defeat. Syrians, Indians and several other countries stood up laughing and throwing arms in the air with jubilation.

Racial Prejudice?

Two weeks ago, the students joyfully took a half day of school off because the teachers had a meeting to explore the amount of prejudice existing in this school. They were shown film strips and given a talk by Mr. Lacey. The teachers tried to establish whether or not racial antagonisms were present in our school and if so where the root of the problem lies and what should be done about it. However, no conclusions were arrived at.

This investigation can be traced back further than just the administration of this school. Apparently, the idea to examine the existing prejudices in the military originated at the Pentagon in Washington. They are very concerned about this growing problem; so much so, in fact, that they have appointed several human relations councils throughout the Japan area to deal directly with the situation.

The Trident is presently conducting a survey in an attempt to form a generalization about the prejudices in this school. The Trident staff is grouping students into three main categories -- those with both parents Caucasian, those with one or both parents Japanese, and those with both parents Black. The students are asked to give opinions on a number of different statements.

Once it is established just what prejudices exist at Yo-Hi and where they stem from, we can get together and concentrate on solving any problems that might exist.

Plans For the Move!

Wednesday the teachers went to Yokosuka to observe the new school. The target date is December 1. Tentatively the school will be open December 1.

The Yokohama transportation office is working on a new bus schedule for Yokohama students, since now Yokohama students must commute to Yokosuka.

The Language Lab has already moved to Yokosuka. Three containers, which you've probably noticed outside, have been packed with books and school supplies. The library here in Yokohama is in the process of transferring materials to Yokosuka.

Students in the chemistry lab are wrapping chemistry equipment in newspapers to prevent breakage. Home economics cabinets and kitchen units were moved to the school building three weeks ago.

Many teachers and other administrators connected with the school are looking for housing near Yokosuka.

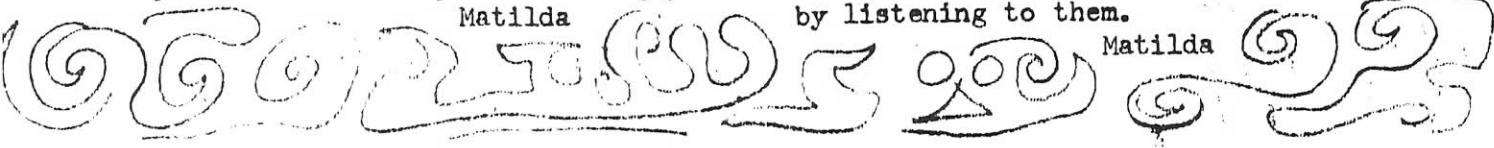

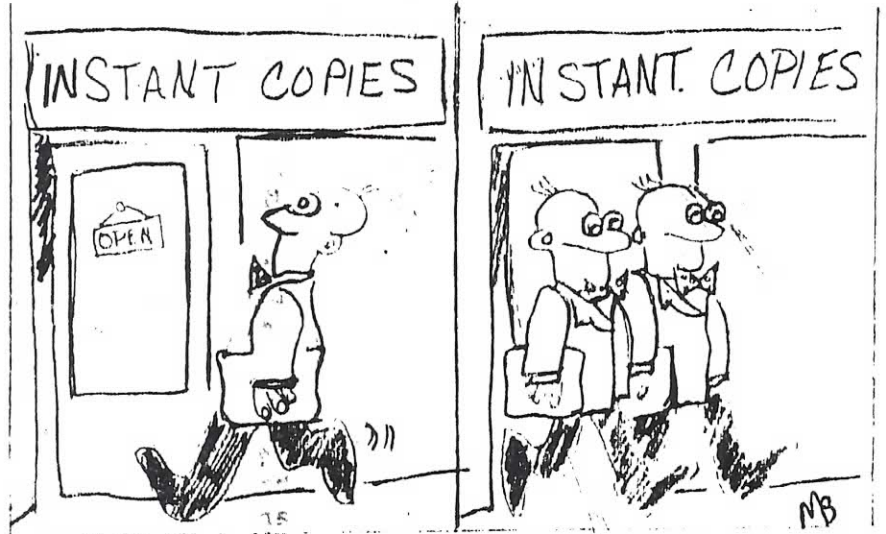

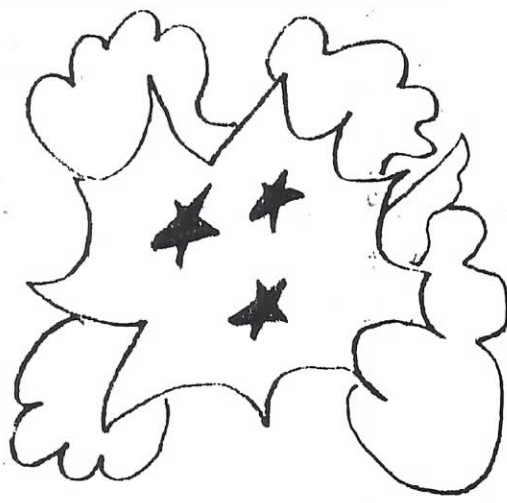

TAIWAN EXPELLED: VICTORY OR DEFEAT?

Much happened last week in the United Nations building in New York. Many heated debates were going on, mainly arguing two proposals. The Albanian proposal was to oust Taiwan from the UN and invite Communist China into the UN and the Security Council. The American proposal was to include both Taiwan and Communist China in the general assembly, but to have Taiwan yield its chair in the Security Council to Communist China.

In a way, the American proposal was dead from the beginning. Communist China said that it would have nothing to do with the world assembly if the government of Taiwan was in. Taiwan would not yield anything to Communist China, arguing that the government of Chiang Kai-Shek was the only and legitimate government of the Chinese people. Perhaps to the Chinese of Taiwan, this might be true, but to one-third of the population of the world, or the population of Communist China, it was not true. Taiwan threatened to walk out if Communist China was allowed entrance.

The United States and a few other countries co-sponsored the American proposal that a two-thirds majority be required to oust Taiwan. In other words, two-thirds majority vote be required to invite in Communist China. But this proposal was bitterly defeated. The picture looked bleak to the representatives of Taiwan, the United States, and co-sponsors. Then last week, the vote took place. The United States believed that it would be able to keep a slim majority and succeed in its proposal, but the results were different. The Albanian proposal was accepted, and the American proposal defeated. The representatives from Taiwan gave a threatening speech saying that what had just happened was the beginning of another world war. Then they walked out of the assembly.

Communist China has reportedly accepted the UN's invitation and is readying its delegation. They will become part of the permanent members of the United Nations Security Council, presently composed of delegations from the US, USSR, France, Great Britain, and soon, Communist China. With the ouster of Taiwan, the United States lost 22 years of support for freedom and yet won the chance to make a truly lasting peace through closer relations with Communist China.

The author of Thieves' Carnival is Jean Anouilh. This is his most successful work in the US. It is loaded with humorous whims (if they come off) romance and masquerades.

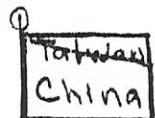
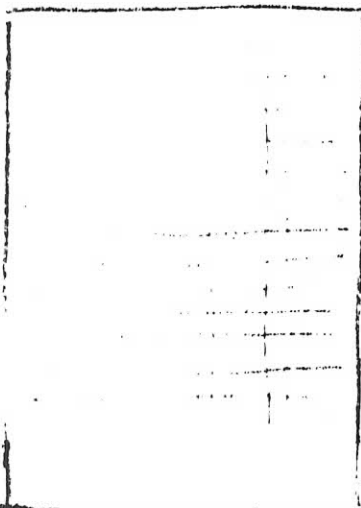
