Air pollution is so serious in Japan that the effect of living in this contaminated environment has even caused death in canines.

Living in Japan -- the only place where U.S. astronauts could visibly see pollution-- we should be even more interested in new techniques and advancements in pollution control.

Several weeks ago a new apparatus was installed in many European cities. This new French invention acts like a huge vacuum cleaner as it takes in polluted air, filters it, and blows it back into the atmosphere.

In New York, an environmental committee continues to research the causes of the world "environment crisis" we are experiencing.

The committee insists that modern technology is to blame. These scientists say that most pollution problems made their first appearance in the years following WW II. The reason for this was due to the fact that new types of products were being produced. Nitrogen fertilizers replaced natural fertilizers, detergents replaced soap, synthetic fibers replaced cotton and wool, and the list could go on and on. All of these synthetic and chemical products are non-biodegradable meaning they cannot decompose, an important step in nature's balance cycle.

A final report made by the committee suggests the use of more machines like those being tested in Europe and the creation of biodegradable products to replace those endangering the ecological balance of our environment at this time.

FRANCES' FASHION CORNER

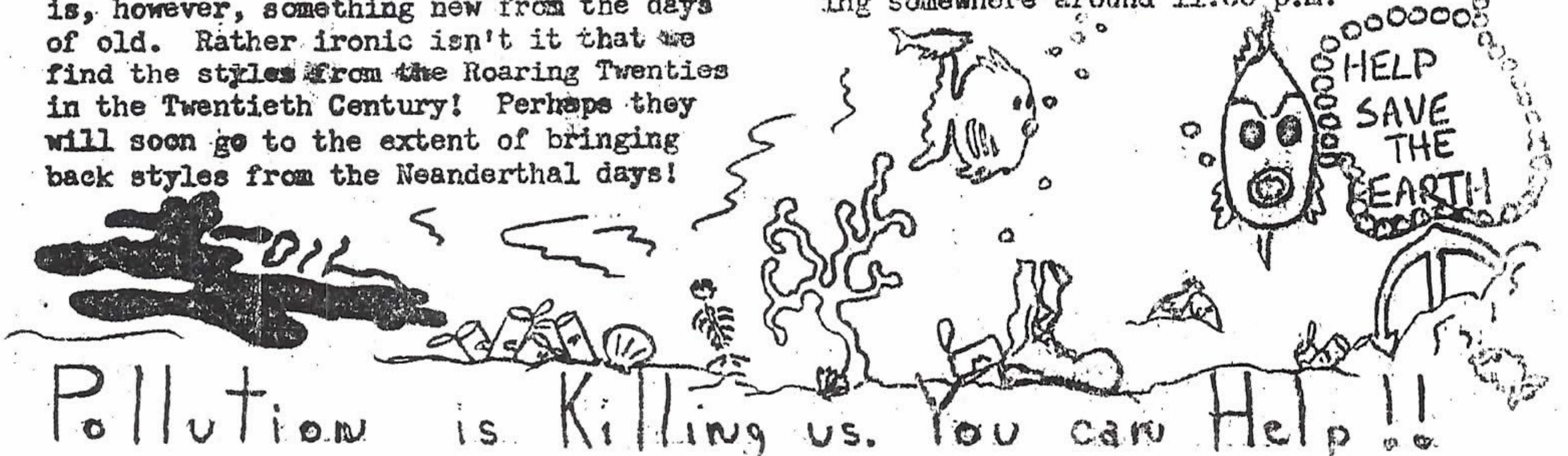
Roaring 20's

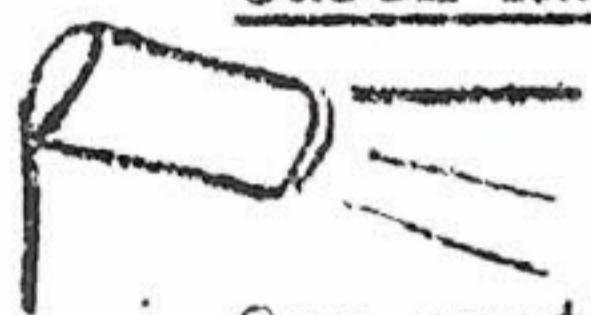

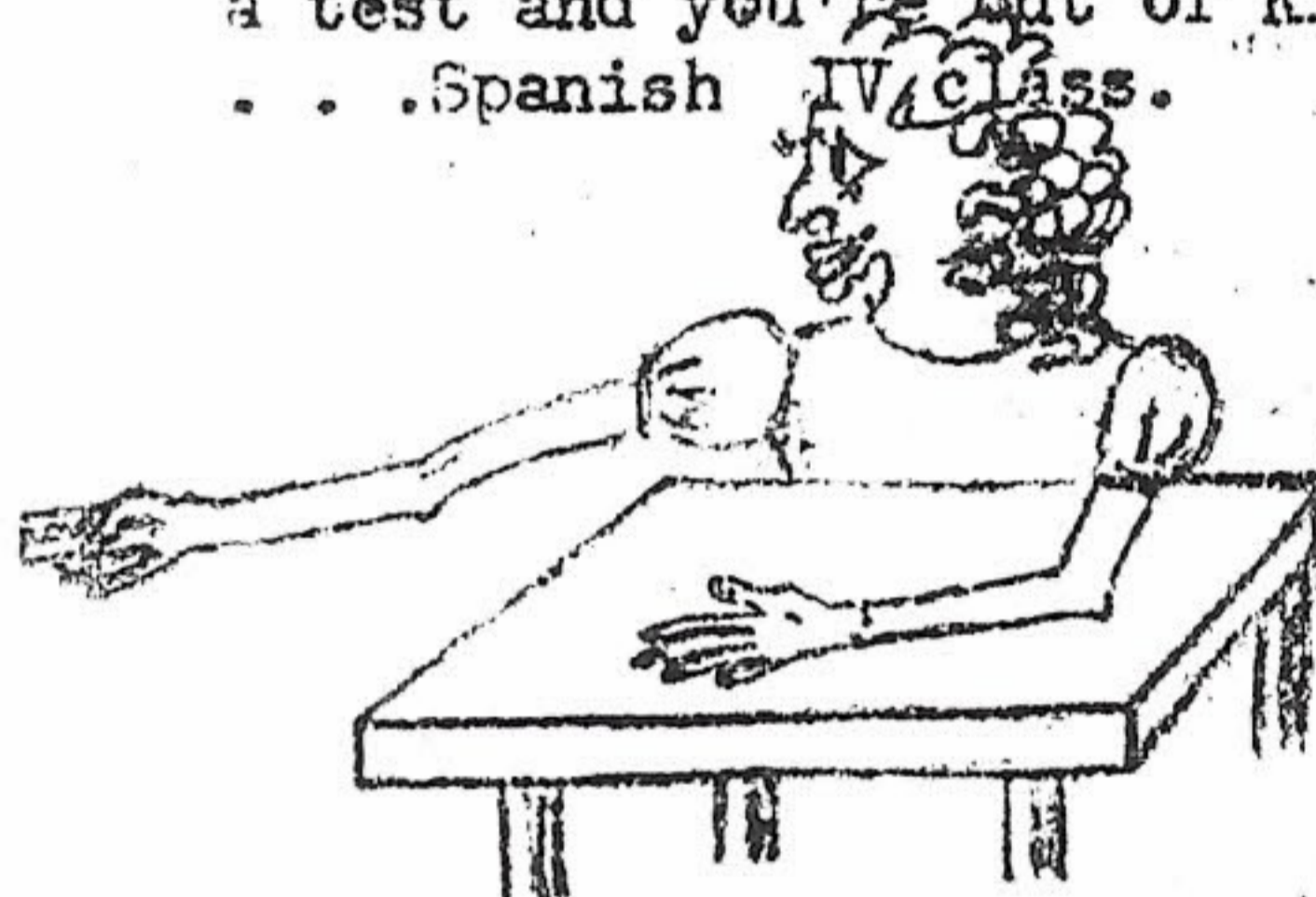

SPOTLIGHT

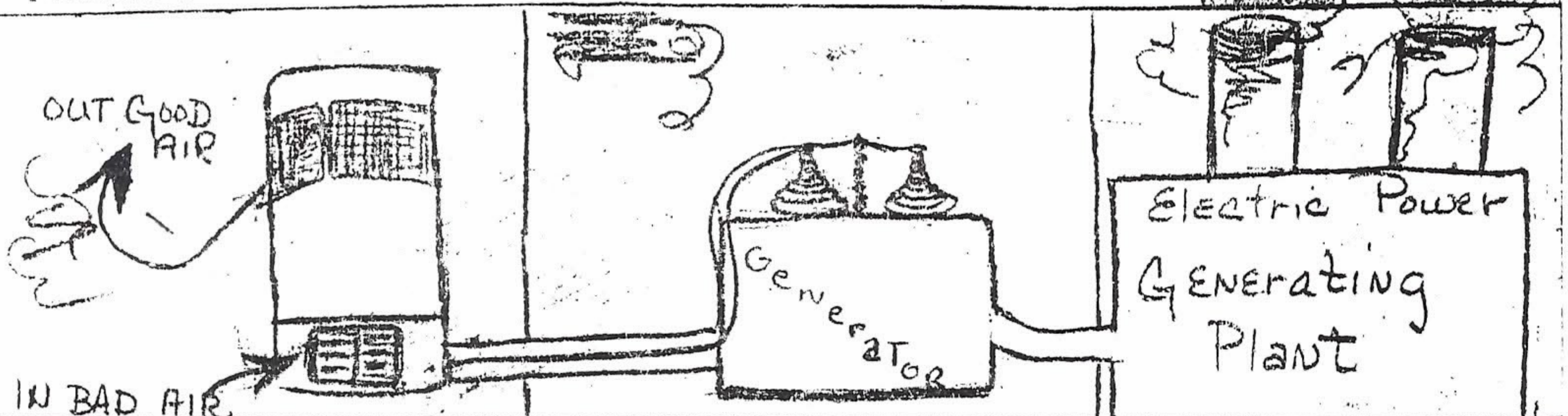
