There are still many people who have not filled out a Language Arts-Social Studies schedule sheet or turned out for their schedule conflict conference. These people should hurry in to talk to Mr. or Mrs. Tucker no later than next Thursday. If they will not, their courses will be picked by the teachers for them. The list of classes and the corres-

ponding periods will be posted next week.

The three that were chosen the most in Language Arts were Word Power, Expository Writing, and English Fundamentals. Word Power and English Fundamentals both have two classes each with about sixty students total. An overwhelming number of students chose English Fundamentals regardless of their test scores on the English Fundamentals Test. Humanities (7th period) is the smallest class, not because the students did not choose it, but because of conflicts with 7th period classes, or with other solids being taken. Expository Writing classes will be relatively small in order to reach individual students. Drama is not offered second semester because of classroom construction problems. AN OPEN LETTER TO THE STUDENTS OF YO-HI

I would like to take this opportunity to make a few comments and observations on the relationship between the students of YO-HI and the Yokosuka Shore Patrol in the interest of betterment of these relations.

Contrary to the belief of a few of the students, the Shore Patrol was not instituted at Yokosuka solely for the harassment of students. The Shore Patrol is strictly a law enforcement agency and consequently our primary function is the enforcement of all laws set down by higher authority, as pertains to all military, DOD civilian personnel, and dependent personnel. Occasionally in the enforcement of these laws, where dependents are

concerned, an immediate hue and cry is raised that the teenagers are being picked on. This is definitely not the case. teenager violates a law then he must expect to suffer the consequences just as adults that violate laws do.

In the case of foul weather gear and pea-coats, we are governed by Title 10 U.S. Code-Armed Forces, Section 771, which is a federal statute controlled by the Congress of the United States. This code goes into the laws pertaining to uniforms and the unauthorized wearing of these articles of clothing. This law is quite specific about parts of the uniform. It also says that if you purchase a pea-coat or foul weather or flight jacket from a surplus store, it's perfectly legal to wear these items as long as there are no distinctive marks, insignias, or Navy buttons thereon. If you have any of these articles, then make sure identifying marks are properly inked out, or, in the case of pea-coats, just have the buttons changed to non-Navy.

Let me reassure you that there is no more emphasis placed on your peer group than

on any other group in the Yokosuka Area.

There are many lines of communication open and you have as much recourse as your adult counterparts in legitimately complaining of harassment tactics. Let me emphasize "legitimately." If you truly feel you have been wronged by the Shore Patrol, don't complain amongst yourselves as this never does any good, regardless of age groups. Take you complaints to Mr. Spaulding or contact me and corrective measures will be taken.

I am available at any time to discuss alleged wrongs, and certainly will do all that I can to enhance the student-law enforcement relationship. If you bear in mind that cooperation and communication, rather than defiance, are the tools needed to eliminate confrontations with law enforcement personnel, there will definitely be a better understanding and enhancement between students and Shore Patrol.





High scorer was David Louk with a creditable 22 points. Scott Peterson played best where the team lacked most-rebounding. Getting rebounds seemed to be the main problem for our


