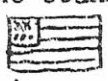
# SPORTS PAGE YO-HI WRESTLERS STOMP

## WHAT'S LACROSSE?

This week we're going to give you a little background on the game LaCrosse.

LaCrosse is an outdoor game played by two 10-man teams, in which players using special sticks, called "crosse," attempt to move a ball through the opposing team's goal.

The Iroquois Indians were playing LaCrosse when the first French explorers arrived in Canada and the Northeastern United States. The Indians called it "bagataway"; the French called it LaCrosse, because the stick resembled the crosse carried by a bishop. White men first began playing LaCrosse about 1840.

It has become the national game of Canada and has achieved great popularity in the Eastern United States, Great Britain and Australia. Since LaCrosse is a fast, rough game, the players wear padded helmets, wire face masks, heavily padded gloves, and hip and shoulder pads beneath their uniforms.

Each team must at all times have at least four men in the half of the field in which its own goal is located and at least three offensive men in the opponent's half of the field.

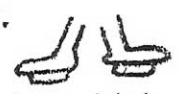

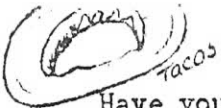
## JANET LYNN !!

As you can see by the name, it features an assortment of Mexican foods. The first floor is a counter-style eating place while upstairs is a more private atmosphere with tables and candle light.

It opens at 6:00 p.m. and closes at 4:00 a.m. They have one specialty which is a complete steak dinner with all the trimmings. ### Bobsledding

Bobsledding was one of the major events of the first Winter Olympic Games held in 1924 in France. There is still a lot of excitement in bobsledding as the crowds watch the daring teams go around the dangerous curves.

The teams compete in two-man and four-man events. The maximum weight limits are 825 pounds and 1386 pounds for the two-man and four-man respectively. Additional lead weights are legally put on to give the best possible running times.

The course is about a mile long with walls of concrete and a little over five inches of ice. The course in Sapporo, located on the slopes of Mt. Teine, has 14 bends through which the teams pass at an average speed of about 40 to 50 miles per hour, going to a maximum of about 70 miles per hour.

Bobsledding is dangerous. No wonder that in 1968 one man died while his three teammates

were seriously injured.

Even with the dangers involved, bobsledding is an exciting sport to watch. In the Sapporo Olympics, earlier this week, the results were as follows: In the two-man event, West Germany took both first and second place while Switzerland took third. The four-man event gave the gold medal to Switzerland, the silver medal to Italy, and the bronze medal to West Germany.

Don't miss the coming Summer Olympics in Munich, Germany, and remember to watch the 1976 Winter Olympics in Denver, Colorado.

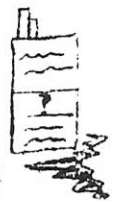

# JAPANESE CULTURE CORNER

Rock, as a medium, offers a variety of emotions expressed and expressible. Because of a stereotype that has developed among rock worshipers, classical music has lost its chance to be expressive among rock fans. Actually, a lot has been done with today's music, but there also is a lot that can be done. The Supremes made an instant hit back in the mid-sixties with their "Lover's Concerto" which is an almost identical, note-for-note reproduction of Bach's minuet number ten from his Clavier-works for Anna Magdalena Bach. Jimi Hendrix used many of the classical styles, especially those of Bach and Mendelssohn, for his characteristic improvisations. You have been exposed to classical music without even knowing it, and you have felt its emotions, which are in themselves full of many human feelings. If one would listen to a classical reproduction instead of shrugging it off like an old stereotype, one could find a new set of emotions and maybe even the right set for you. For example, the rock opera Jesus Christ Superstar is a good example of how the classical styles are used in creating emotions. If Jesus Christ Superstar appeals to you, you will find some very similar expressed in many of the classical works, if you are willing to listen to a new set of sounds and effects.

A great place to visit during a weekend is the Kabuki theater. It has had its existence in Japan for over 600 years. It is popular in Japan now, as it was before. The price of Kabuki ranges from ¥1,000 to ¥3,000 depending on the seat.

There are two types of Kabuki--the older Noh and just plain Kabuki. The only thing different between Noh and Kabuki is that the Noh actors wear masks, while Kabuki actors paint their faces. The costumes of the two types are about the same. Both Noh and Kabuki are presented in a long series of contrasted scenes on a revolving stage. The scenery is beautiful and varied. The most interesting thing about Kabuki is that the actor does not recite anything; he just acts. There are seven narrators to narrate the story. The Noh actor recites phrases in rhythm that only experts can understand. Both use men playing flutes and drums as instrumental background.

The Kabuki puts farce and tragedy in the play so it isn't boring as you might think it is. The play is on for about three hours with intermissions between stories. Noh involves nearly the same thing but has less tragic scenes in it.

There are no Kabuki theaters in Yokohama or Yokosuka, but there are a few in Tokyo. Try Kabuki on one of your "not-knowing-what-to-do days" or if you have the culture bug. Use it as experience.



Contemporary music offers something only to those who are willing to let their minds travel through the midst of the music. It challenges the mind's ability to comprehend sounds as emotion. The artist's incomplete expression of emotion leads the music to be more humanized because a human doesn't express a complete thought in anything at a given place and time; we speak and think in fragments of a given thought because we take for granted certain aspects of that thought. And the reason for our not being able to understand it is because we do not know which aspects in the music are left out, being taken for granted by the musician. Since this music is performed by another human who also thinks in terms of human emotion, one could understand it if he could let the music into his mind as emotion instead of a literal conglomeration of notes. This is almost impossible for those who think notes and for those who are even below this status--the musically uneducated. This music is complete emotion which, if discovered and even partially understood, could give the listener an experience which would make the drug scene seem dead.

It is difficult to locate a contemporary-modern musician or a set of recordings because of lack of popularity. It is not simple and it is difficult to experience because one has to "feel" it instead of applying logic to it, which is against the linear way of thinking of recent generations (ref. Marshall McLuhan). It is so similar to rock because it involves emotions through the expression of one's self through music, only freer and more complex.

Moral: Try to listen to a given piece of music; give it a chance!

Other companies, Suzuki and the Kawasaki don't produce as many mini-bikes as the Honda.
