ME SCHEDULI

Next year a new program called Minimal Class Scheduling will go into effect. Forty semester units of credit will be required for graduation from Kinnick High School. All courses will give credit on a semester basis. A student who has carried a full schedule of six courses a semester for three school years should have completed thirty-six units. Variations might occur, depending on factors such as transfer from another school, failure, extra credit for seminars or correspondence courses, and summer school. Some junior students would be classified as seniors. (This means that most seniors mill have accumulated nearly the required number of units

for graduation by their junior year. This does not necessarily mean that the student has taken all re-

quired courses for graduation.)

The high school administration and the guidance office have requested and received permission from the DOD Schools Area I Superintendant's Office for a senior to attend, in certain conditions, only the minimum schedule of classes that he needs to full-

fill graduation requirements. After presenting a written request form and attending a conference with his aponsor(s) and counselor, a senior may be able to take advantage of a minimum schedule. This conference will determine the need, practically, and implications of any minimal-

ly modified schedule.

Another program which will go into effect next year is Pass-Pail Grading. A student student will be allowed to take one course a semester in his schedule that will be given a grade exaltration of pass or fail. This grade will not be given for any classes that are required for graduation or prerequisites to go on to a next progressive level.

A maximum of eight semester courses with this grade evaluation max be used to meet the forty units graduation requirement. REPORTATION Written parental arrangements for fine arts, prac-FRENCH 80 tical arts, and physical education will be made with the respective teachers. Only those teachers with MATH

bhis completed form on file in the guidance office will be able to give such a grade. Arrangments for such a mark in language arts, social studies, science, and math must be in a student, parent, and counselor conference.

(Such class marks will not be used in determining class rank. Also, students planning on college will find a variety of attitudes on the part of colleges in accepting such courses for admission.)

Musical-14 loce m In the entire musical world, there is probably no instrument so beautiful and so easy to learn as the plano. The tonal properties are already roughly determined by the action of the piano so the student doesn't have to worry about getting a good tone the first time. The only major difficulty about learning the piano is the fact that it requires quick fingers, a memory for patterns, and common sense. It is an excellent means of providing musical hack-ground for those who go on to other instruments, because the student can see how the tonal combinations are produced and the relationship between them.

Because of its simplicity, tho piano lets the musician really dive into the technicalities of music and improve at a great rate. Unlike other instruments such as brass and woodwinde, the piano can play more than one note (depending on the imagination and

at a time, and sometimes up to 40 notes at a time (depending on the imagination and ability of the performer) thereby making the piano adaptable for solo work as well as

ensemble. Unfortunately, like all other instruments, the piano has its limitations. faster one plays, the more co-ordination is required. There is a relatively low limit as to the physical limit of speed a pianist can play, just as for a runner on the track term. There are also limits on the loudness of the instrument. But its peak loudness is not as difficult to obtain as its optimum softness. Precise control of the lingers is manditory for extremely low passages.

In comparing a band to a piano, the band can play a very wide range of tones producing chords and runs in the entire music spectrum, whereas the piano performer, having only ten fingers, two arms, and two elbows, can not control what he is playing when attempting to play the same notes as the band. Other disadvantages include the inability to physically differentiate between voices (which can be done on a multi-keyboard organ), short durations of tone, and others more easily detected.

But all in all, the piano provides an excellent source of music to any student who wishes to try it, and is an all-around excellent source of music -- good sounding and
