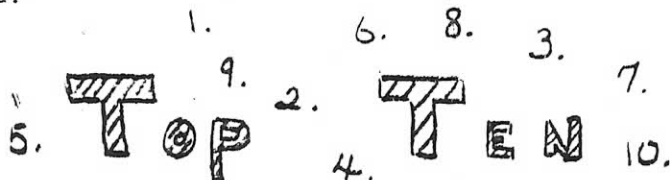
The following questions were asked of Mr. Spaulding by the "Echoes" staff:

Yo-Hi v.s. R. G. H.

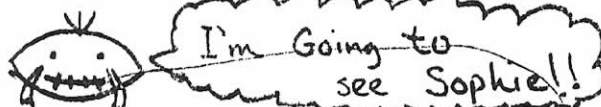

YO-HI DROPS FINALE

The Yo-Hi Devils lost their last two games of the season against Zama here at Yokosuka last Saturday. It rained all day but they managed to get two games in with a large supply of balls and a lot of patience. There was a one-and-a-half hour break in the middle of the first game due to the rain.

Greg Bettencourt pitched the first game but lost it by a 7-1 score. The first two innings were played on schedule but then it started to rain hard, so the teams went to the Cafe for a break. They later returned, checked the field, and continued the game. The score was close for the first four innings, 3-1, but Zama loaded the bases and a grand slam homer was hit by their number four batter.

The second game started out with Greg Bettencourt hitting a two run homer to make the score 2-0. But Dave Louk (the losing pitcher) just couldn't get the ball over the plate. The Trojans scored 8 runs the first two innings and Louk gave way to Watabayashi who pitched the rest of the game. Zama also managed to hit another home-run the second game and in all, three home-runs were hit on that day.

The Devils ended their season with 4 wins and 9 losses. They will not play the make-up game scheduled with Johnson for reasons unknown. But they play one more game with Yokosuka Technical High School on Sunday for Armed Forces Day.

Track & Field *Yea Yo-Hi!*

In the track meet last Saturday at Zama Yo-Hi came through with some strong individual performances, but still placed behind Chofu and Zama. Again the team showed good strength in all running events but could collect only 10 points total in the field events. **Cheng-Yu Huang's** two firsts--in the broad jump (20' 10") breaking the old Yo-Hi record set by Jeff Sparrow in 1967 and the high jump. Cheng also came through with a first in the low hurdles to give him an unbelievable 15 points for the day, almost half of the Yo-Hi total of 37.5 points.

Mark Ellis got a first in the 440, a fourth (tie) in the 220, and helped boost the mile relay team to a second place finish.

Yo-Hi's Frosh-Soph team gave an outstanding performance in their competition. Earl Boots and Jimbo Gabriel were the big guns capturing the 100, 880, and 120 yards low hurdles.

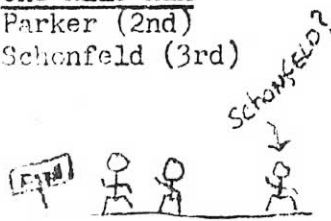
Surfing (Cont'd)

If you have got the urge to go surfing and need to acquire a board there are surf shops around the Kamakure-Chigasaki area. Kenzo and Joji's right on the beach road by Inamuragasaki (sell Maganumas), a Tanaka shop in Chigasaki, a brand new D & S shop in Kamakurakokomae also on the beach road, and a Goddess shop in Chigasaki. Plus many Japanese department stores, etc. sell them. Some other brand names are Malibu, Ted, Surf Jet, Micro, etc. The boards are in good shape. Quality is not that of the U.S. boards but neither is the price. The best thing to do is find a used board.

A beginner buying a board should look for something a little longer than an advanced surfer who is riding with soft egg rails and a full tail. There are many places to go once you have got your board, wax, and baggies. Kamakura, Chigasaki, Chiba, Shimoda, and Enoshima are the better known places, but a surfer's dream is a secret spot which you have to look for. If you find it only tell a few selected friends or it won't be a secret for long.
