According to Mr. Rickmers that is our first and last serious assembly so we look forward to our next one.

# Football Game at Nichidai



Mr. Richardson--I taught music in Tachikawa, High School, and met my wife.

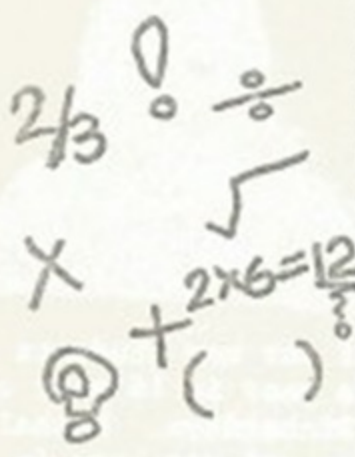
Echoes--How do you like Yo-Hi?

Mr. Davidson

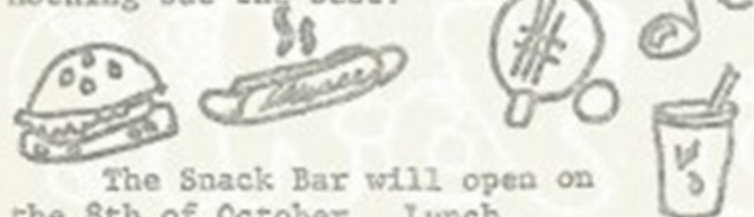

# A TALK With The Coach:

ECHOES: Briefly, can you describe your team to us this year?

Coach C.: We are fortunate this year as we have quite a few returning lettermen and a good turnout of new ballplayers. The Yo-Hi football team for this season will be physically larger than it has in the past few years and that fact combined with the speed and quickness our players have shown should make us tough.

ECHOES: What kind of strategy are you planning to use?

Coach C.: Strategy has several meanings but the one that applies to football is skill in management. Speaking as a coach, we try to put the right players in the best positions, drill them into a smooth functioning team and on game days expect them to execute the plays to the best of their ability. If all of that is successful we will have an outstanding year.

ECHOES: Compared to last year, what do you think of your team this year?

Coach C.: Last year Yo-Hi was developing into a team that the conference had to watch out for when we lost several key seniors and junior to injuries.

ECHOES: What is your biggest weak point if any, and your strong point?

Coach C.: Our biggest weak point right now is probably defense. We only have 3 returning starters. However we have some excellent looking young men moving into the other positions and it will be ready prior to the conference schedule. Our strong point will be offense. We have 6 returning starters and quite a bit of experience. We expect to be able to move the football at least 80% of the time.

ECHOES: Who do you predict to be the "Power House" in the conference?

Coach C.: The power house of the league should be ASIJ. However every team is tough and we must play them one at a time.

ECHOES: What do you lack this year that you had last year & visa-versa?

Coach C.: The one thing we lack this year that we had last year is the trip to Misawa. Seriously the football team this year will be better than last year if we stay healthy.

ECHOES: How is the coaching staff different from last year?

Coach C.: We have some new faces on the coaching staff this year. Ms. Lane is the sponsor, of course. I am back as head coach. Mr. Jerry Kahn is the offensive backfield coach. Mr. Dick Williams is the offensive line coach.

# Yo-Hi IN Focus

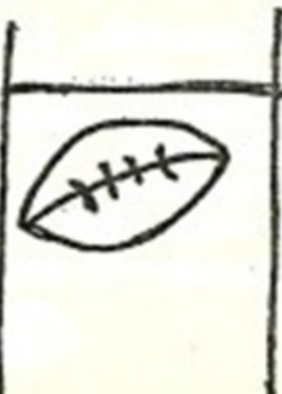
