Honor Society 3; Pep Club 2; J.V. Basketball 2.

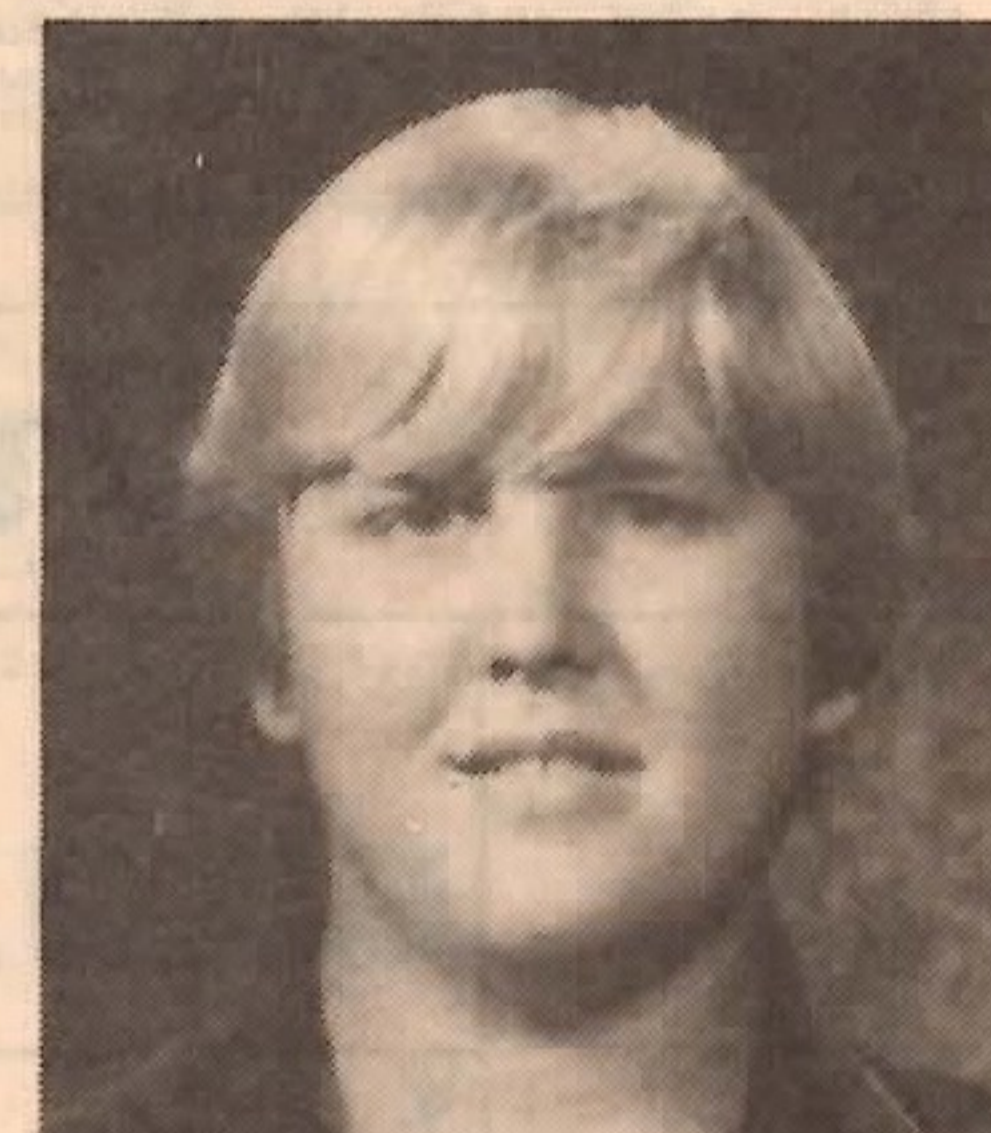

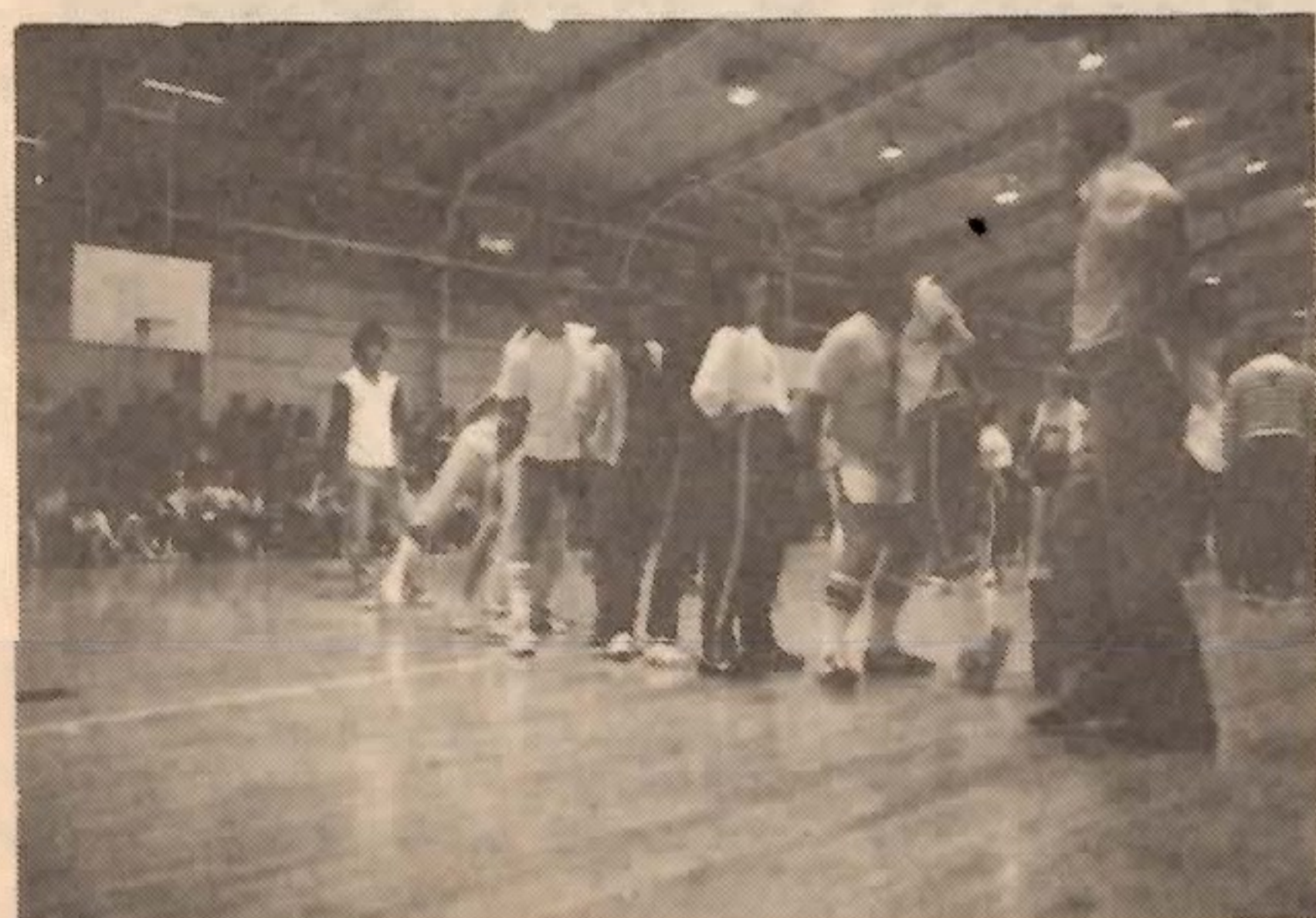

Yo-Hi Day Announced For June 1

June 1 will be the annual Yo-Hi Day at Kinnick. Classes will compete for the final points going towards the end of the year picnic. Each student who is able to will compete in one of the events out of ten. The number of points for each place will be as follows: First place — five points; second place — three points; and third place — one point. Points will be added up at the end of the day to determine the winning class. The following are this year's Yo-Hi Day events. Consult your class representative for more information on the event you will be competing in.

One of the funniest events may be the "Tennis Ball Necking." Five guys and five girls from each class will try to pass a tennis ball through their line using only their necks. If a team member drops his or her ball, they must start that ball over again. During a time limit, they must pass as many balls through the line as possible.

Another event will be the traditional "Pyramid" in which five boys, five girls and an extra person will be used from each class. Sixteen people will first stand in line with legs spread apart. The first person in line passes a basketball over his head and to the person behind him. This is done down the line until the last person gets the ball. Then the last person, still holding the ball crawls under the legs of the other team members to the front of the line. The ball is started back down the line until the original person at the front is at the front again. They are then required to make a pyramid and the top person tries to make a basket. The first team to make a basket, wins.

"Dragon" is also an interesting event. Eight guys and eight girls from each class will participate. Two teams will make a line by each person putting his arms around the person in front of him. Each dragon will be divided into two runs. In the first run, the first person in the upper class links on to the last person of the lower class chain and the dragon's tail is tied around the last person of the entire chain. The last person must keep the tail turned so that it is at his back. The first person to grab the last person's tail wins. After the first run, the teams change places and start again. If the chain breaks, the other team wins that round.

The "Pillow Fight" is another event at Yo-Hi Day. Five people from each team will try to knock the other team off a balance beam. Each team gets a point for each person of the other team they knock off the balance beam.

The "Lock Stand-Up" might be one of the most difficult events. Five girls and five boys from each class will stand back to back, lock arms and try to stand up without using their hands. The first team to have all five couples standing, wins.

"Mummy Wrapping" might be one of the more embarrassing events. One guy and one girl will participate. One person will be the mummy, and the other will be the wrapper. The wrapper wraps the mummy, and the other will be the wrapper. The wrapper wraps the mummy totally in toilet paper so that no part of him or her is showing. The first class that finishes will win.

The "Licorice contest" needs two volunteers (a boy and a girl) from each class that do not totally hate each other. Each person gets on each end of a piece of licorice and eats his way to the middle. The winning couple is the pair who first finishes their licorice.

"Tug-o-war" will require sixteen people for senior high and eighteen for junior high. Each team gets on opposite ends of the rope and pulls. The team that pulls the other team over to their side wins.

"Musical chairs" is also a new event for this year's Day. Three guys and three girls from each class will compete till the end for the last chair.

Archery Featured At Kamakura

Sunday, April 15 was the Archery contest at Hachiman Shrine in Kamakura. Archery on horseback as in samurai times is displayed by men trained for the sport. I say "Men" because only men are used for the sport. Men fill the roles of grooms, exercise boys and riders.

These men are picked from the best riders at stables all over this side of Japan. The best horses, also, ranging from thoroughbreds to Clydesdales are picked from stables in Miura, Yokohama, and other places.

At the present time, women have no hope of being allowed into the sport, but foreigners are just beginning to take part. Last September, a foreigner was a rider, and in April, there was an American groom, who is working toward being a rider next year.

One of the main attractions at Yabusame this year was rider Toshiro Mifune. Mifune was the star of the T.V. mini-series SHOGUN. He played the Lord Taranaga in the show. He is also known throughout Japan as the star of countless samurai movies.

The object of the archery on horseback is for a rider to keep his horse under perfect control using dressage (a French method of riding using the rider's weight to control the horse instead of the reins). While holding a bow and arrow, the rider then gallops his horse down a narrow path with the bow and arrow still in his hands, and shoots the arrow at a target as he goes by, still at a gallop.

On April 15, nine horses, and their grooms, exercise boys, and riders were shipped to Kamakura early in the morning. The horses were tacked

up before lunch in their "Samurai" tack, and riders went off to dress in their "Samurai" dress.

After lunch, riders and their horses went from the edge of Hachiman grounds, where they were being stalled, to the main shrine where they were met by a procession of priests. They were then blessed by the priests, and were allowed to mount their horses. For the rest of the time they showed the thousands of people in the audience their skills in Dressage and Archery.

These riders and their horses are known throughout Japan and even the world for their skills. They, and other archers around Japan ride at Hachiman Miura, and when President Reagan came to visit Japan, they performed for him and his wife. Toshiro Mifune was not able to ride for President Reagan because of a bad back, so he has been permitted by

the end. Final score: Yo-Hi 13 — Yokota 11.

The second game was more of a carbon copy of the first with an exception of the score which was 4-3. Tabo Lee started on the mound and kept Yokota to three points.

Yo-Hi stayed silent until the fifth inning once again where they then scored two runs on a two-run homerun by Bill Nicely. Jimmy came in and held Yokota in the top of the sixth and in the bottom of the sixth, Yo-Hi's Danny Dennehy, John

Bargsley, Mike King, unleashed and scored two more runs to push the Devils to the lead.

Jimmy Frazier closed the game and the Devils took two to end their season at eight wins and two losses.

Yo-Hi Takes Second At Tourney

Frazier worked the mound after St. Joseph scored three on errors and shut them down. At the bottom of the fifth, Jimmy Frazier cracked a solo home run to end Yo-Hi's scoring spree, then pitched a perfect three up, three down last inning to finish 7-5.

Danny Dennehy started off the second game against ASIJ which was a deadlock until the third inning where the game went haywire. Yo-Hi placed different pitchers but to no avail. Yo-Hi had sporadic hits that happened at inopportune times which were no help to the Devils. The Devils were soundly defeated 14-0 placing second in the tournament.
