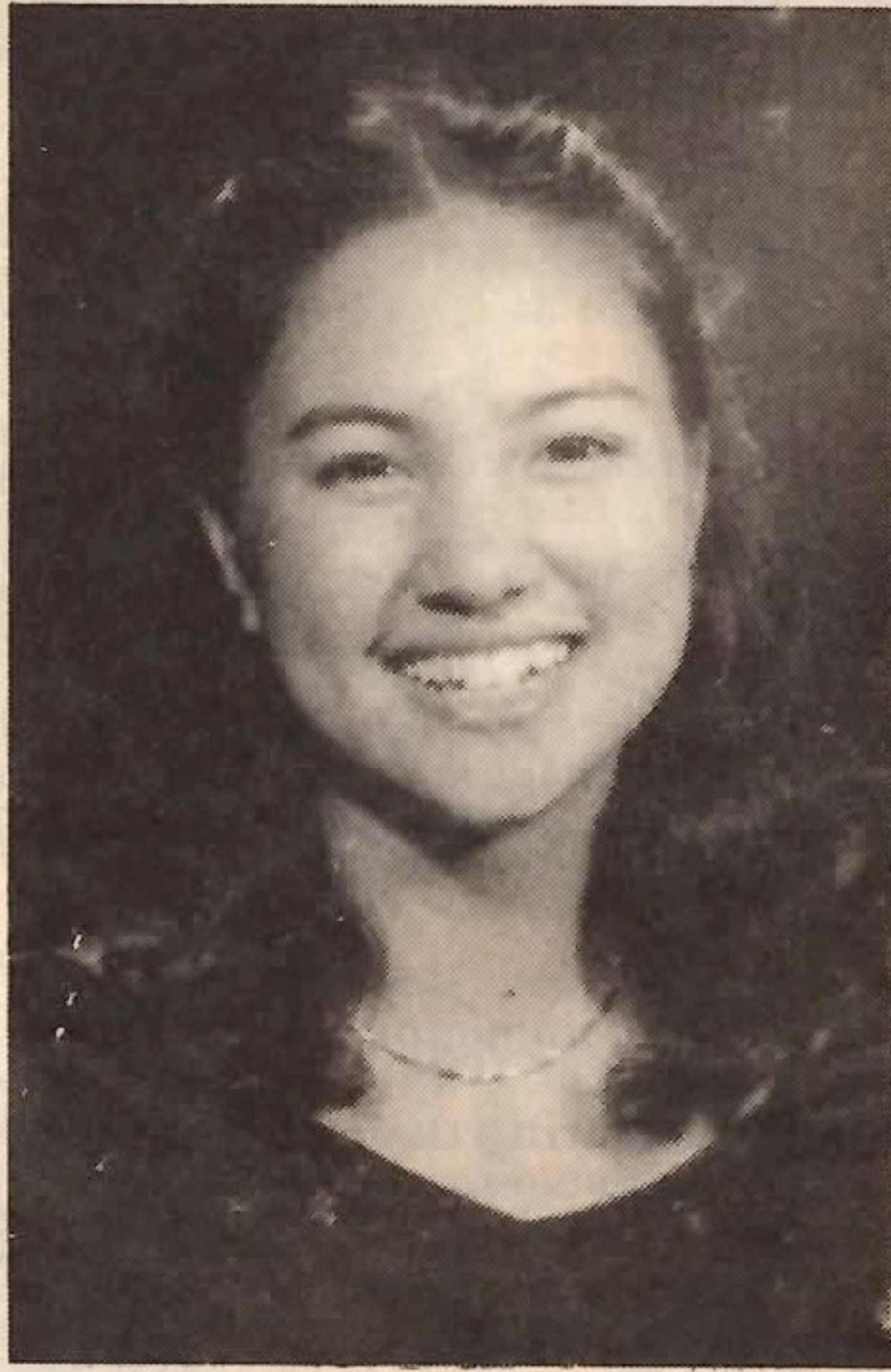

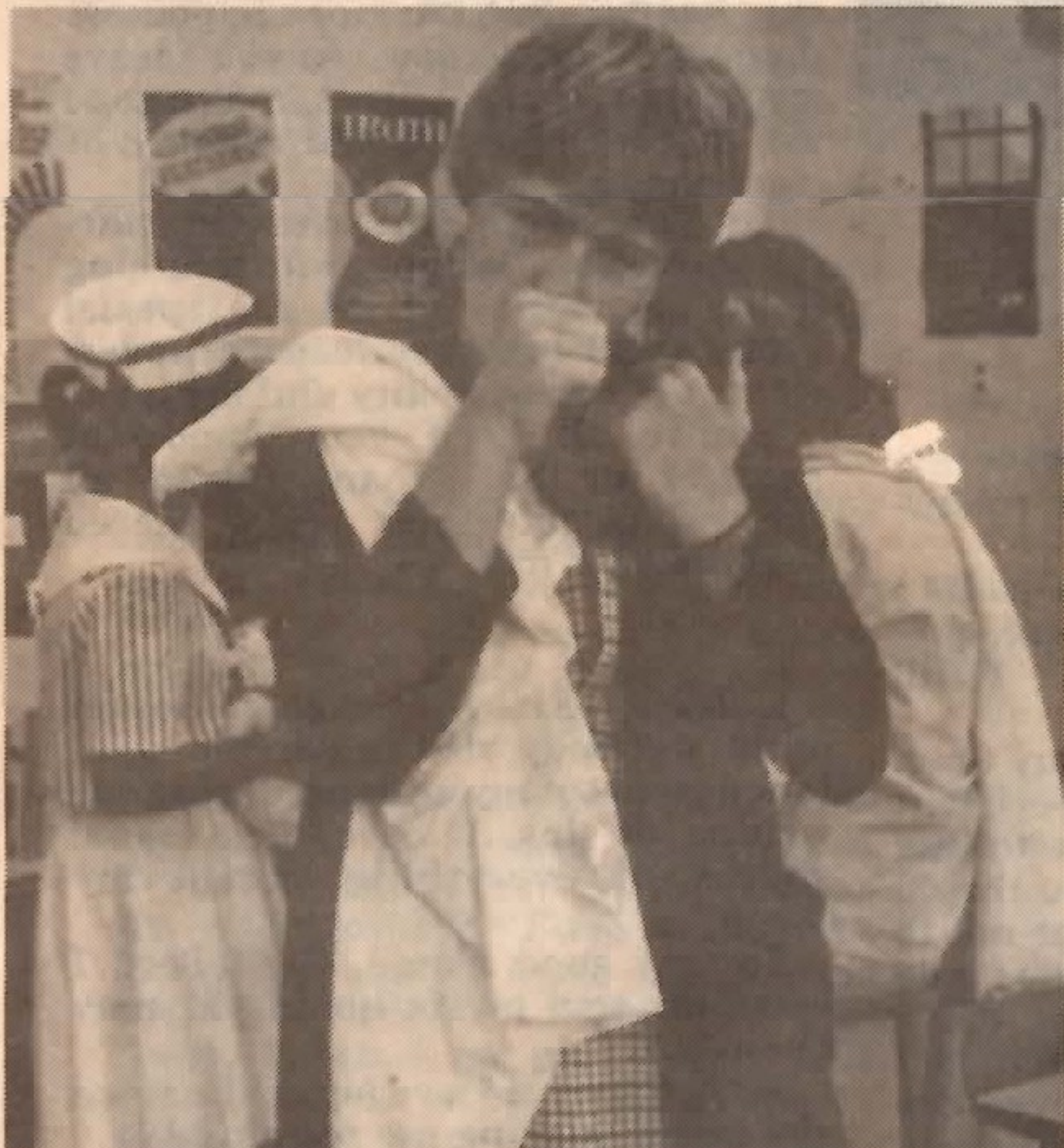
The next day brought a lot of wild looking outfits as students dressed accordingly for Punk Day. An assembly was also held to judge the best punk

Boys Basketball

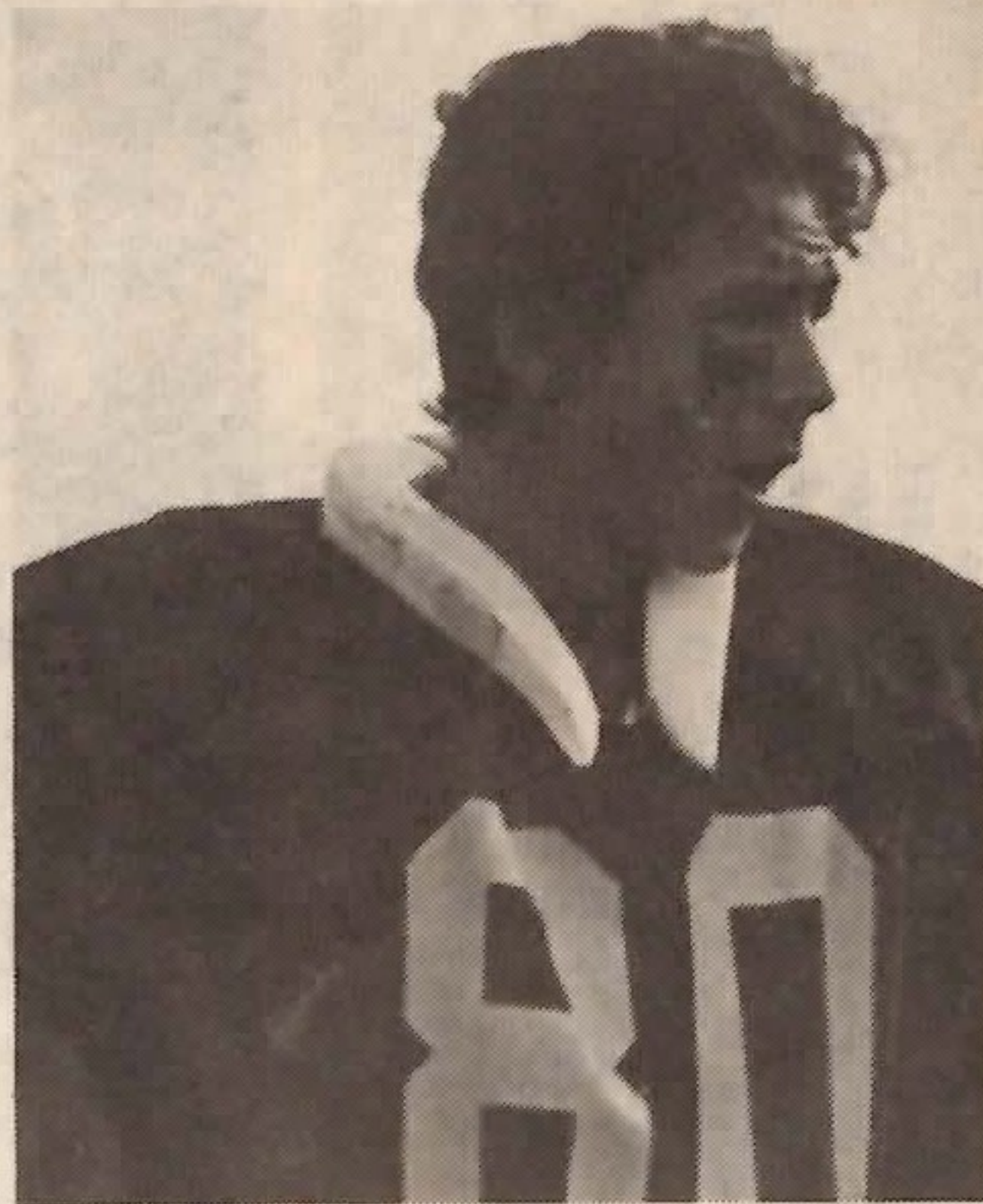

Girls' Basketball

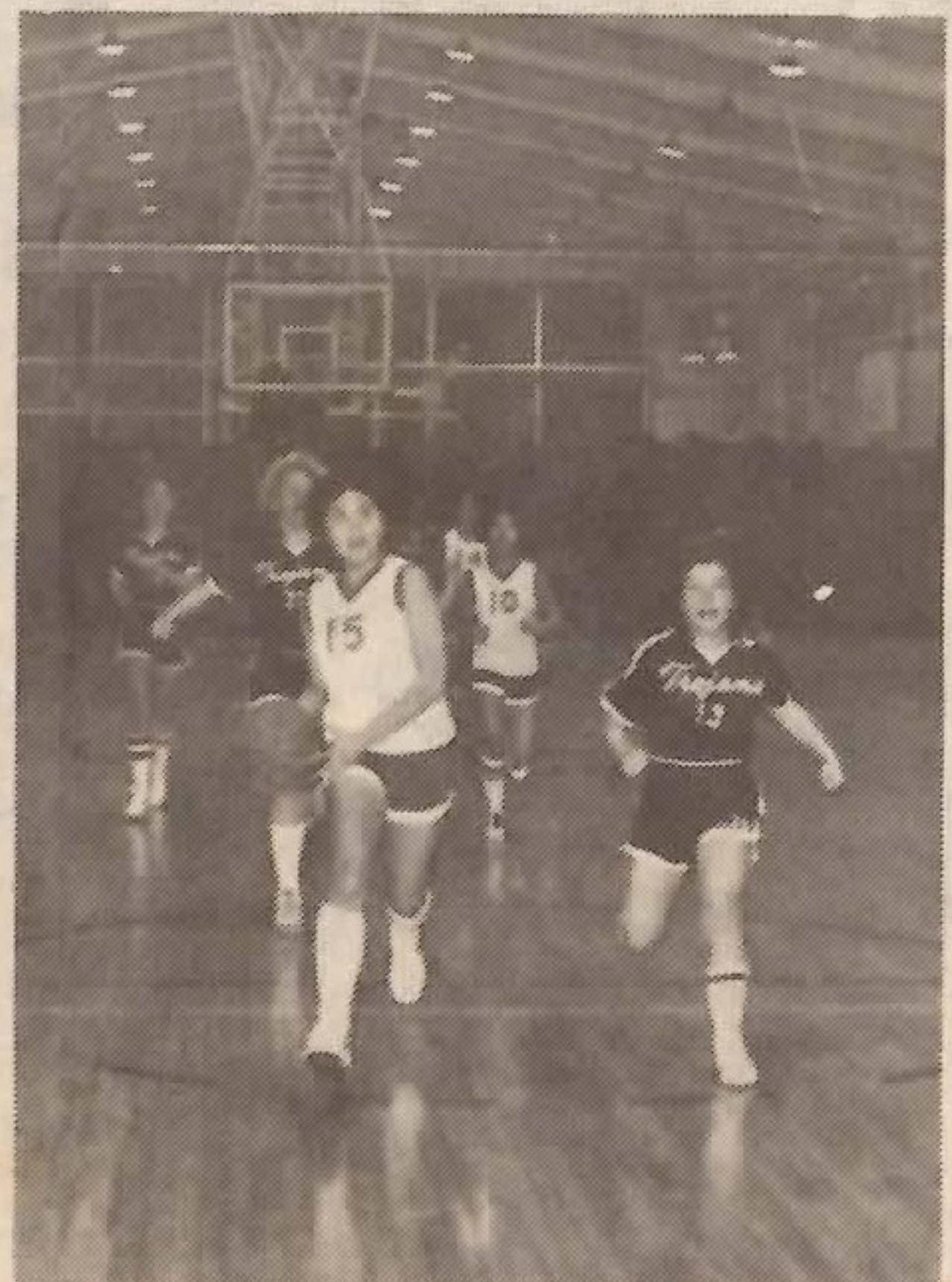
The Girls' Basketball team maintained a half and half season with a record of 6-6.

Tennis Team

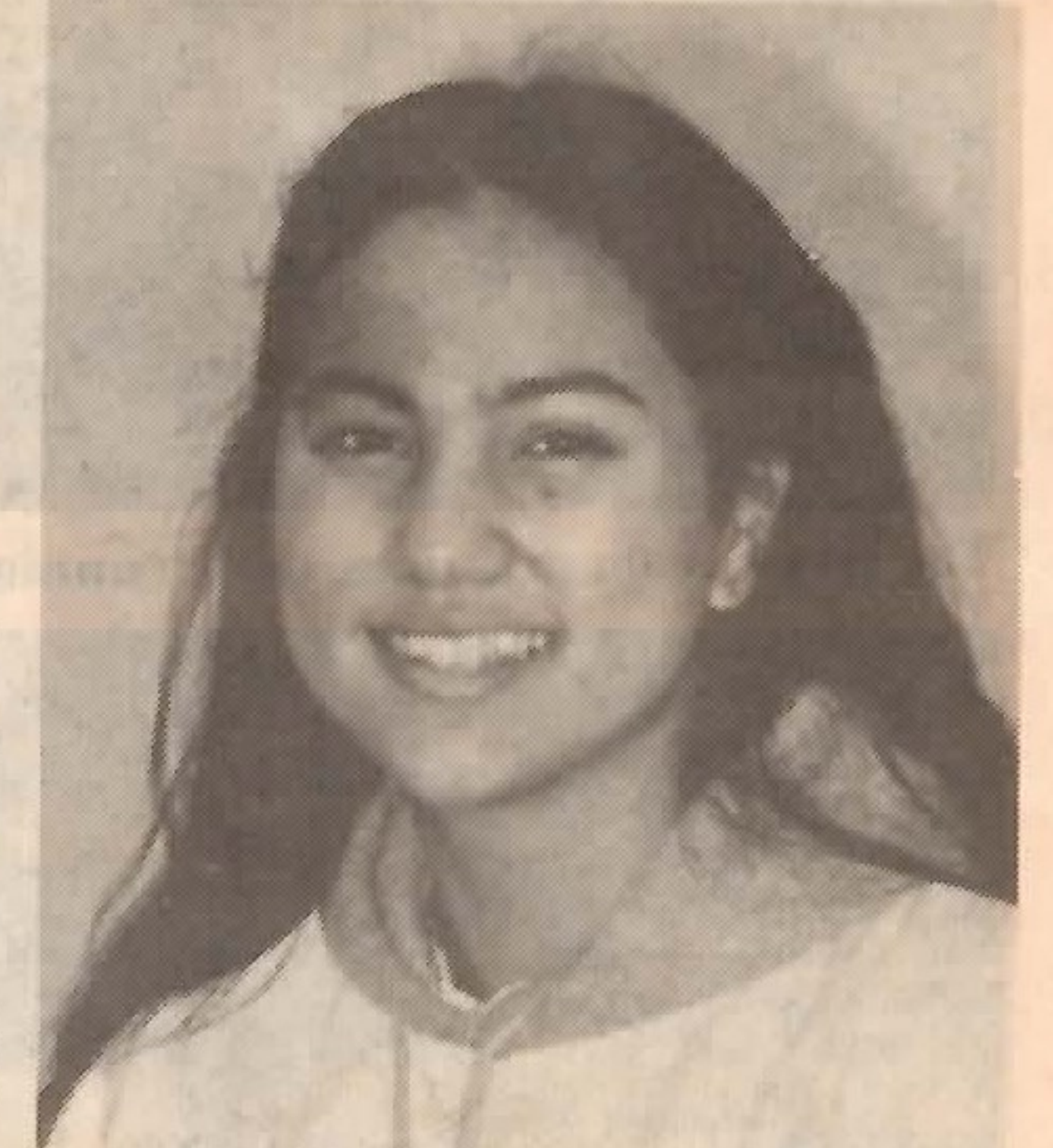

In the Far East Tournament, Beth Brant went all the way to the semi-finals in the consolations.



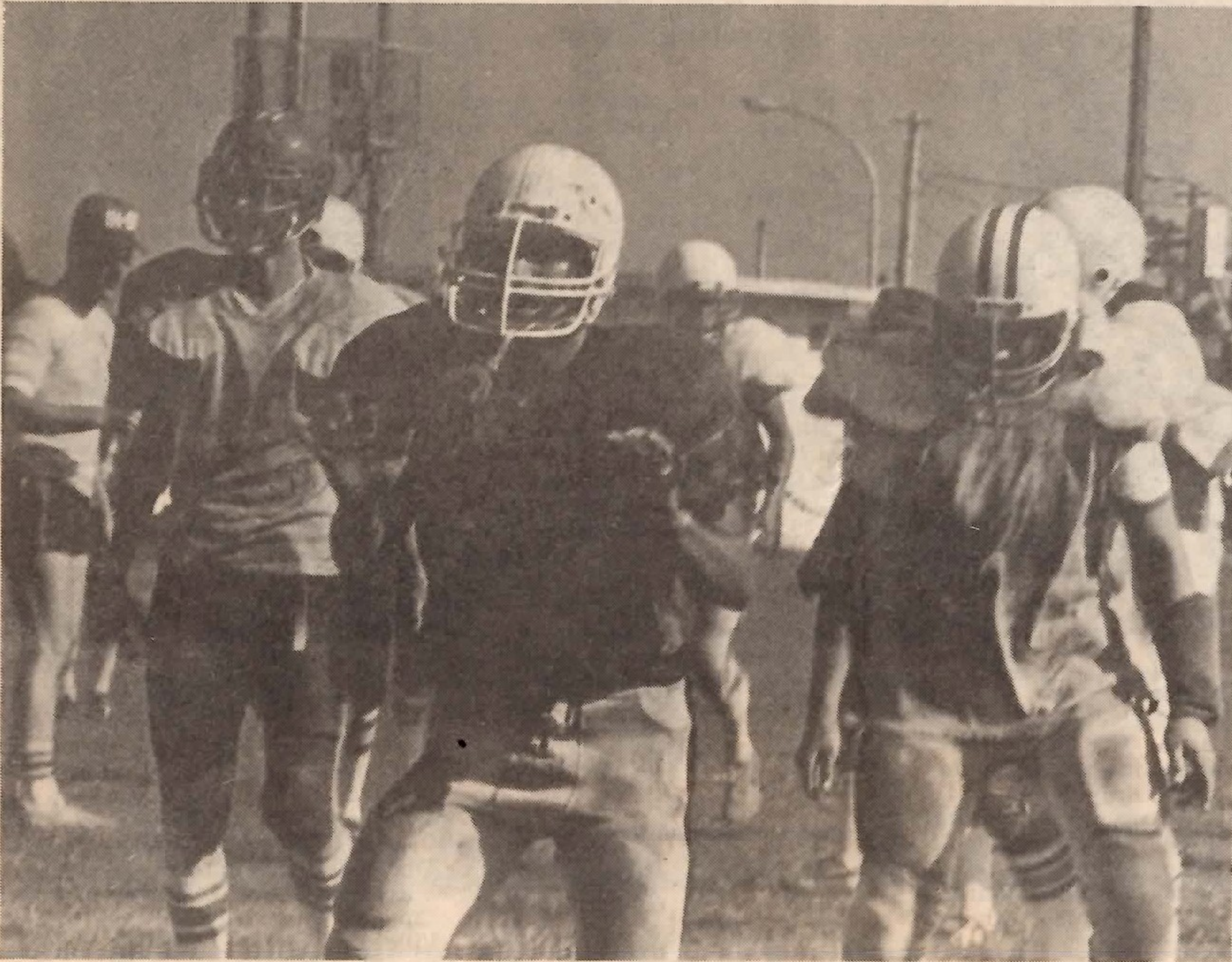

Volleyball

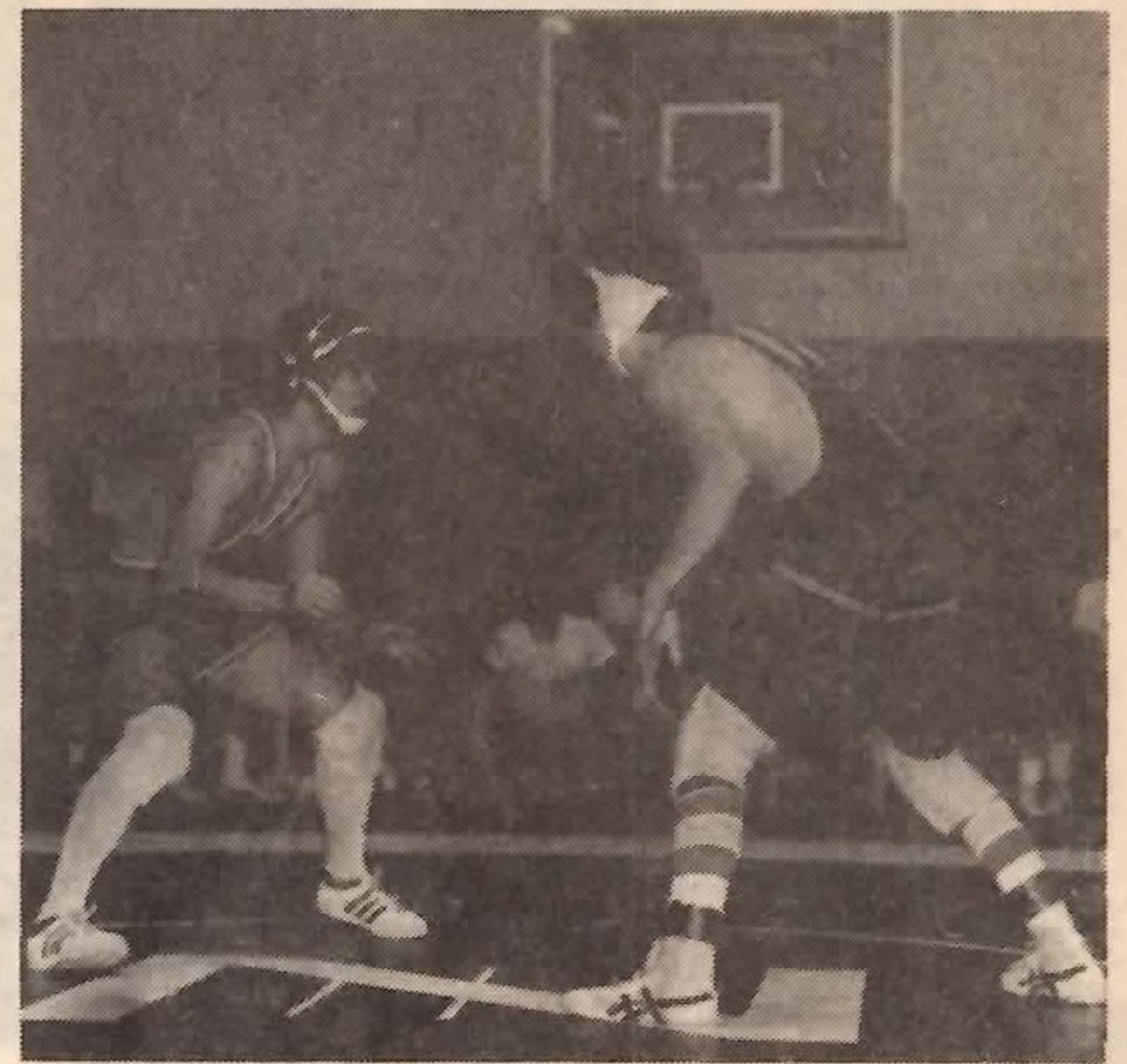
