### Majority votes to keep mascot

Students, teachers and parents were polled by the school administration on whether they felt that Red Devil was an appropriate mascot due to concerns voiced at the Schools' Advisory Committee meeting. Changing a mascot is not an easy matter. First of all, our mascot is on just about everything relating to the school. The Red Devil is pictured on our patches, sweatshirts, tee shirts, uniforms, lettermen's jackets and class rings as well as many other forms of advertisement. The Red Devil has been a form of motivation and school pride for its entire 47 year history. I personally have never thought about the devil as the opposite truth, a belief in sickness, sin and death, the leader of evil, or the like as this is only one definition of the word. As defined in Webster's New Collegiate Dictionary the devil also means a person of notable energy, recklessness and dashing spirit. ## **Forever A Devil**

Some people think that as a senior, I should have no voice in the decision on this issue. The initial request of some parents who objected to the use of the Red Devil as the school mascot was to let the sixth graders at Sullivan's School vote and exclude the seniors at Kinnick graduating in June. If our mascot were changed, it would not be possible to remove it from all uniforms, jackets, rings, annuals, etc...for at least four years. Since this is the case, why not let the whole elementary school vote? They'll be here eventually. Or send ballots to transferring students in the states? I think as a senior I earned the right to vote. Five years of practicing, sweating, and screaming at sports events, both as a participant and as a spectator for the Nile C. Kinnick Red Devils, and yet to some I have not earned the right to vote for a school mascot that has been near and dear to my heart. However, this request was not honored and the school administration did allow us to express our opinion in the poll. This entire controversy is based on the beliefs concerning the "devil" in some Christian religions. I am not a Christian myself nor do I have anti-Christian beliefs. I have always respected others beliefs and religious practices, but the Red Devil was chosen as the school mascot depict a strong, fierce figure to encourage school spirit, unity, and pride. It is not the school mascot that causes teens or parents problems, it is merely a harmless symbol to encourage school spirit and pride. In conclusion, even if the vote had gone the other way and the Red Devil

had been dropped as the school mascot, it would still always remain the mascot in the minds of us, the students. All our memories would still be us hand-in-hand in the Homecoming Parade where our Red Devil was prominently displayed on our floats, at the bonfires where we burned other schools' mascots while we viewed ours with pride, our smiles, hugs, and tears as we shouted Red Devils are number one when we took the football championship, our chillbumps, and pride as we watched the Red Devil band march on to the field at halftimes, our thrill as we put on our Red Devil Lettermens' jackets for the first time, our joy when we received our class ring, and, in my particular case at least, how honored I have felt as a soccer, volleyball, and basketball player when I heard my fellow students, parents, and the community yell, "GO DEVILS!" as I run on the court or field. As a senior, I thank you fellow Red Devils, for the wonderful times at this school, my memories that can never be taken away. They have proved by allowing us to vote on this issue that they are indeed training us to be members of a democracy, where the majority rules.

# Yo-Hi DICTIONARY OF SLANG

## Second Edition

Mr. Grosser's first period English IV-A class played a game called "Let's be Yo-Hi slang-usage lexicographers" and discovered that it was more difficult than they had originally imagined.

As a beginning, each student compiled ten slang words, together with parts of speech, definitions, and usage. Next, the class divided itself into four groups. After much discussion, each group drew up a list of the twenty-five most frequently submitted words. The words in these groups' lists, in turn, were considered by the entire class on the following qualifications: (1) Is the word or phrase slang, or is it colloquial English? (2) What is its present definition? (3) Is the word current? (4) Is the word understood and used by the majority or Yo-Hi students? Finally, this dictionary of Yo-Hi slang was arrived at.

Upon comparing this dictionary to the one featured in the September and October issues of the 1967 **Trident**, many interesting discoveries can be made. For instance, words such as "babe," "bug," "bod," "chug it," "hang it up," "hairy," "jazz," "make your creep," and "tough" have faded into oblivion in the short space of one year. Other slang expressions are still used somewhat frequently, but were ruled out on the grounds of their not being absolutely "current." These include "bitchen," "bombed," "brownie," "broad," "has (or) shows class," "come off it," "cool," "creep," "crack-up," "crud," "decent," "ditch," "five finger discount," "gross," "hurtin'," "queer," and "what's his/her face."

Other words, following the pattern of words in any developing language, have changed somewhat in meaning from the last edition of the dictionary—**sosh**, for example, was previously defined as "A person who does no wrong, works only for school and becomes friends with teachers." Currently the word has more the meaning of one who "tries to get in with the 'in' crowd."

Only a very few words—"drag," "dude," "maintain," "pot," and "squid"—have been recorded in both editions of the dictionary. It is somewhat amazing to note the short-duration of slang existence—and maybe this indicates that now is the time to begin learning some standard English words for stand-bys when those slang expressions lose their meaning!

**Bag**; noun; the thing (art, drugs, studies, athletics, etc.) that's yours, the thing in which you excel; use: "His **bag** was smoking **pot**."

**Blew it, Blow it**; verb; make a mistake, ruin it; use: "John **blew it** and left his fingerprints at the scene of the crime."

**Bummer**; noun; something which didn't go off as it should have; use: "That party was a **bummer**!"

**Busted**; verb; apprehended by authorities doing something they considered wrong; use: "The cops **busted** me last night coming out of Kirin Beer Hall."

**Check-it-out**; verb phrase; look and see what you think of something or someone; use: "You know that new girl? Did you **check her out** yet?"

**Cut**; verb; to downgrade someone; use: "Because everyone dislikes Tom, they are always **cutting** him down."

**Dig-it**; verb phrase; used to express the idea of liking something or understanding something; use: "Can you **dig-it**, baby?"

**Drag**; adjective: bore; noun: puff off a cigarette; use: (adj.) "Boy this dance is a **drag**." or (noun) "Can I have a **drag**?"

**Dude**; noun; a person; a man; use: "That **dude** is the one."

**Fag**; noun; an unliked person; a "fairy" or weird person; use: "He is a **fag**."

**Funky**; adjective; used to describe something which one doesn't like; use: "That is really **funky**."

**Grass**; noun; marijuana; use: "Last night we went out and smoked some **grass**."

**Grunt**; noun; a marine; use: "Look at all the **grunts** by the main gate."

**Gunky**; noun; useless person; use: "That guy's really a **gunky**!"

**High**; verb; affected by drugs; use: "She was **high** on **grass**."

**Horny**; adjective; sexually inclined to extremes; use: "What a **horny** movie I, a **Woman** is!"

**Hung-up**; adjective; has a lot of problems; use: "He is a pretty **hung-up** individual."

**Jam**; verb; dance and have a good time or get together and play musical instruments; use: "We are going out tonight and **jam** hard."

**Lifer**; noun; one who chooses the military as his profession; use: "That old man is a **lifer**."

**Maintain**; verb; to keep calm; use: "**Maintain**, kid!"

**Plastic**; adjective; unreal, artificial, phoney; use: "The hippies are getting so **plastic** in Haight these days."

**Pot**; noun; marijuana; use: "The police raided one place and confiscated over two million dollars in **pot**."

**Sosh**; noun; a person who is trying to get in with the "in" crowd; usually a phoney; use: "Mary's such a **sosh**; it's hard to remember what she used to act like."

**Soul**; noun; depth; feeling; use: "**The Temptations** and Aretha Franklin have **soul**."

**Squid**; noun; a sailor; use: "That **squid** has only been in the Navy two months"

## Boy's Baseball

For people who just look at scores and records they see that the Red Devils baseball team are at the bottom of the barrel. But if we compare the stats at the beginning of the season to those now the team looks like champs. Some of the main skills the team has worked on are the defense and the pitching. The stats now show that the hard work has paid off. The pitching has improved from 5-10 wild pitches a game and 10-15 walks to 3 wild pitches and 5 walks per game.
