States Lt. Glaab, "This team composed of school boy dependents of occupational personnel will play an eight game schedule made up of service teams in and around Yokohama.

Arrangements have been made to open the season Friday night, October 1, in Lou Gehrig stadium against the Second Medium Port eleven.

It would be sad to eliminate the name of a Naval aviator. When I ran for board of education here in western PA, Nile C Kinnick HS in Yokohama, Japan, was included in my bio. People remembered me because of that, and one man even approached me and said he was a University of Iowa grad. Nile C Kinnick had caught his attention as their stadium is named after Nile C Kinnick. In addition, those of us who graduated prior to the move to Yokosuka, have only the name that ties us to the original school. The building for us is long gone. Now it'll happen again with the new building.

Featured Student Biography – Barbara Arnn 65 (61-63)



Anthropology scholar, artist, author, gardener/farmer, homemaker. She retained her birth name after marriage. Barbara was known for her intelligence, her wit, her unsentimental but caring nature, her serious playfulness, infectious sense of humor and raucous laugh, her old soul. She was always modest in spite of her many talents and dedicated herself to seeing clearly the world around her. She was a careful, deep listener.

Accompanied by family and a few close friends, she died in hospice from complications due to cancer. She was born in Klamath Falls, Oregon to John O. and Mary (Scott) Arnn. After going to high schools in Japan and other places in the U.S., she graduated from Carmel High in California. A National Merit Scholar, Barbara began her studies in Anthropology at Brandeis University. She met her first husband, Gary Stanton, at an archeological dig in Arizona.

Barbara's was a storied sort of life. Her mother went to work on a ranch after college and married the cowboy-son of the ranch owner. When she was 9, they moved to Japan. Major Arnn thought it would be beneficial for her to go and live in an orphanage, so she spent two summers with the children at Hikari no Sono. ToHo Studios later released "The Walking Major" a film that portrayed her father's many miles walking to benefit orphans. No surprise that studying Japanese at U. Cal Santa Barbara and then medieval Japanese war chronicles at Indiana University would lead to a PhD from the University of Indiana University in 1984. Her doctoral dissertation was titled "Medieval Fiction and History in the Heike Monogatari Story Tradition." She was a brilliant teacher at the University of Oklahoma, at Wittenberg (Ohio), and at Fairfield (Connecticut). The patriarchy convinced her she'd be happier out of academics, so she became the editor of a trade magazine.

A dirt girl is how she viewed herself since from a young age she wanted to have her hands in the soil and study what she picked up or found: trinkets, seeds, shells, shards, stuffed animals, little boxes, fountain pens, and so on. She volunteered on a CSA farm, grew saffron here in PT, supported local farmers, tended the Colinwood farmers market booth, and helped with clean-up at the uptown Farmers Market. She particularly prized working at the Jefferson Land Trust, where she edited documents and managed the database, was the "database

queen." She really treasured all the good friends she made while at JLT.

Barbara dedicated her life to art and ethics, farming / gardening, and marriage. She wrote a novel, a memoir, and several little books about dogs, a fact that brought out her beautiful smile because she fancied cats.

After working so long with words, she returned to an early practice of sketching and drawing, because those activities were for her the best way to see clearly the real objects around her. She didn't much care to display her work publically, but she did illustrate a few books of poetry, and recently, a chapbook, *De Paso en Oaxaca*, that came out of time she spent in that Mexican city.

Barbara is survived by her husband, W. Nick Hill, brother James E. Arnn, both of Port Townsend; by her step-children: Nicole Hill (Fox Lake, Illinois), and her children Mason, Gabriela, and Alexandra; Andrew Hill, his spouse, Ashley Powers Clark, and their daughter, Asa Hillpowers (Sacramento, California).

David Edwards 58(56-58)

David C. Edwards, rock 'n' roll entertainer

The funeral for David Chester Edwards of Lawrenceville, a popular rock 'n' roll entertainer during the '50s and '60s, was today at St. John Neumann Catholic Church with burial in the White Chapel Memorial Gardens, Duluth.

Mr. Edwards, 57, died Thursday of cancer at his home.

Raised in Japan after World War II, Mr. Edwards discovered his love of music while attending Yokohama Dependent High School. "He would skip school to go to Tokyo to visit recording sessions," said his wife, Elizabeth Edwards.

In the early '50s, Mr. Edwards and his mother moved to Honolulu, where he found success and eventually became Hawaii's top recording star. Mr. Edwards had several gold records, including "Sweet Sue" and "Searching."

During the '50s, Mr. Edwards performed with Chubby Checker in a nationwide tour. He also toured the South Pacific and the Orient with his band, The Juniors.

In 1961, Mr. Edwards had a small part in the Elvis Presley film "Blue Hawaii." His wife said the two became fast friends and years later, Mr. Edwards "would often go to Graceland and do jam sessions." He also was an invited guest at Presley's funeral.

Mr. Edwards loved R&B and classic rock 'n' roll. "He got out of show business in the late '60s when the music changed," his wife said.

During the '70s, Mr. Edwards joined Travel World, where he led trips to Africa, Cambodia and India. He eventually moved to Lawrenceville, where he worked in sales for A&P grocery stores.

Surviving in addition to his wife are two children, Amanda Edwards and David C. Edwards, both of Lawrenceville.

Biography for Yo-Hi teacher Solveig Sattre who taught from 52-88

High school teacher. Daughter of Alfred M. and Nellie N. (nee Boe) Sattre of Spokane, Washington.

She graduated from Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota. In 1937 Sattre began her career as a home economics teacher at Annandale High School in Saint Cloud, Minnesota. In 1943 she was hired by the US Corps of Engineers to work for a construction company on the Alaskan Highway near Whitehorse, Yukon Territory. A year later she was transferred as a clerk for the Corps of Engineers Task Force Williwaw that had major construction projects throughout Alaska.

In early 1946 Sattre spent four months in the lower 48 states where she received attractive offers to resume her teaching profession. Sattre decided she like Alaska better for the time being. Later she received an attractive job offer to teach in the Department of Defense Dependent Schools system in Japan, which she eventually accepted.

After two years in Tokyo, she began her lengthy educational career in Japan as a high school home economics teacher at Yokohama American High School. The school was later renamed Nile C. Kinnick High School. She remained with the school as it changed locations three times: from the original Yokohama Bluff site to another Yokohama site, then to two other locations at Yokosuka Naval Base, where it still operates. She remained with that school until she retired in 1988, having taught there for 38 years.

Sattre returned to live in Florida, and died in University General Hospital in Seminole, Florida. She was a Lutheran, and was buried alongside her parents in Moorhead, Minnesota. Sattre was survived by her three elder sisters: Alfreda Torgerson (1910-1989; Lt Col Edel V. Sattre, a retired Army WAC (1912-2004); and Ruth Agnes Butoric (1916-1998).

Miss Sattre never married, but she can count on the devoted affection of the thousands of young women she trained in skills that lasted a lifetime.
