Free Tour of the Museum of Flight





The Museum of Flight (TMOF) in Tukwila, at Boeing Field, is the fifth largest air museum in the world and the largest private museum. It features 150 planes and other aircraft from the slowest human-powered Gossamer Albatross II to the fastest Blackbird MD21, all in very well-done exhibits. The TMOF has military, commercial, private aircraft, ands spacecraft. Alan Werner, co-host, is a Docent at the TMOF, and will lead a free tour of the Museum. He will show, describe, and offer stories of the aircraft, their operations, and the people who designed, produced, and used them. Following the tour, guests will be able to self-tour with four aircraft to go inside including a Concore, the first jet Air Force one, the first 747, and a 787 along with other large

bombers, commercial planes, and Navy fighters. Other galleries include the Great Gallery, the Apollo Gallery, the Red Barn (Boeing's original aircraft plant), World Wars I and II, and the Space Shuttle Simonyi Gallery. Carpools will be organized to travel to the TMOF.

Alan is capping off free admissions at a 64 count as this is the limit of his guests and guest passes. Anyone beyond this count can still take the tour but will need to pay the admission price with discounts for AAA members (and affiliates), active military and veterans, and employees of any airline, Boeing, Port of Seattle, and Microsoft Passport Holder. Seniors are \$26 and adults \$28.



History of Negishi Forest Park

The first western-style horse racing in Japan took place here (formerly Negishi Racet Track) in 1867. Horse racing had been held here until June 1943. Shortly after the Second World War. The Horse Racing Track was requisitioned by the Occupation Forces and was used as a motor pool and a golf course.

In 1969, most of the racetrack area, which had been mainly used as a golf course, was returned to the Japanese Government. Later in 1972, the City of Yokohama initiated to return the site into a park. In October 1977, Yokohama officially opened the Negishi Forest Park at the same time that the Japan Central Horse Race Association inaugurated the Race Horse Museum.

The Little-Known Role of Jimmy Doolittle in Nagasaki Atomic Bombing

Lt. Col. James H. "Jimmy" Doolittle famously led the first U.S. strike against the Japanese homeland during World War II, and Doolittle as a lieutenant general also had a little-known role by happenstance in the last strike in the form of the atomic bombing that destroyed Nagasaki on Aug. 9, 1945.

Doolittle became involved when a distraught Navy Cmdr. Frederick L. "Dick" Ashworth came to his tent on just-liberated Okinawa to give a report on what he then thought was a failed mission to bomb Nagasaki with the second atomic weapon used in warfare, resulting in the bomber missing the target and ending up with a "Mayday" landing on Okinawa. Ashworth, who had been the "weaponeer" aboard the B-29 Superfortress in charge of arming the bomb, had just come from a harrowing landing in which two engines conked out for lack of fuel. He could have expected the chewing out of the century for bursting into the general's tent unannounced to give a failed mission report, but Doolittle settled on hearing out Ashworth after his initial "Who the hell are you?" greeting.

"Commander Frederick L. Ashworth, U. S. Navy, reporting, sir. We've just dropped the second atomic bomb over Nagasaki. We need to send a report back to Guam, but your communications people aren't cooperating," Ashworth would later recall in a 1958 article for the U.S. Naval Institute.

"Well, son, sit down and tell me about it," Doolittle said.

Ashworth, a 1933 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy who had earned a Distinguished Flying Cross for his service on torpedo bombers in the Solomon Islands, told of a mission plagued by mishaps before the B-29 carrying the 10,000-pound plutonium bomb dubbed "Fatman" got off the ground from Tinian island for the 1,500-mile flight to Japan.

A pump on a reserve fuel tank had failed, meaning that the mission would have to proceed without a hitch for the bomber to make it back to Tinian, but there were several hitches to come.

The B-29 was dubbed "Bockscar," for its usual pilot Frederick Carl Bock, but the pilot of Bockscar for the Nagasaki mission was Maj. Charles Sweeney. Bock instead flew a B-29 called "The Great Artiste" that carried scientific instruments and photography to measure and record the effects of the nuclear weapon.

A third B-29 carrying special cameras

missed a rendezvous point, forcing Bockscar to waste fuel waiting for the third plane to show up before the decision was made to proceed to the primary target of the city of Kokura without it. 'So, we headed for Kokura, our primary target," Ashworth wrote. "However, at 30,000 feet over Kokura, we looked down at a heavy concentration of haze and smoke, apparently resulting from a bombing attack the night before on Yawata, just across the river. That place was still burning. The Bockscar crew was under strict orders from Gen. George C. Marshall to make a visual sighting of the target and not bomb by radar. The B-29 made three passes over the city, burning more fuel, but could not find a hole in the clouds for bombardier Capt. Kermit Beahan. It was said of Beahan that he could drop a bomb on a pickle barrel from 30,000 feet.

"After the third pass over Kokura, ground anti-aircraft fire opened up on us," Ashworth wrote. "Shortly after, we saw about 20 fighters on their way up. The decision to get out of there and head for our secondary target of Nagasaki was not difficult to make."

Ashworth continued: "At this point, we broke radio silence to notify air-sea rescue teams that we might have to ditch south of Japan. As we approached Nagasaki, the weather appeared to have deteriorated to almost solid overcast. That left us in a real pickle. Here we were supposed to drop an atomic bomb on Nagasaki under visual conditions, and we couldn't even see Nagasaki!"

"At the last minute -- actually about the last 20 seconds -- the bombardier, who had been following very closely the radar run, and who had been receiving dropping angles from the radar operator, detected what he thought was the aiming point, a bend in the river flowing through the middle of Nagasaki. He yelled that he had his bomb sight on the target and let go visually."

The air burst of the Fatman bomb exploded at an altitude of about 1,650 feet with a force of about 22 kilotons of TNT, compared to the 12.5-kiloton "Little Boy" uranium bomb that destroyed Hiroshima three days earlier on Aug. 6, 1945, according to initial estimates.

The initial estimates also were that 60,000 to 80,000 people were killed in the Nagasaki bombing, compared to the 90,000 to 166,000 killed at Hiroshima, but many thousands more were to die of the aftereffects.

"Our gas shortage restricted us to one turn around the atomic [mushroom] cloud, after which we picked up a heading for Okinawa. On."

the way, I pulled out my target chart. A prolonged examination produced a gnawing uncertainty," Ashworth wrote. "I knew we had hit Nagasaki, but did we hit our target?" Doolittle interrupted: "What do you think? Did you hit the target?"

Ashworth replied: "No, sir, I don't think we did." He pointed to a spot on the map that was about a mile and a half northeast of the main target. Doolittle then leaned over "and took a closer look at the map. A smile played upon his lips. Then, he stood up and put his arm around my shoulders."

"Well, son, I wouldn't worry a bit about that mission," Doolittle said. "I'm sure that General Spaatz [Gen. Carl Spaatz, commander of Strategic Forces] will be much happier to know that the bomb went off up there in the industrial area instead of over the city of Nagasaki."

Six days after the Nagasaki bombing, Emperor Hirohito announced the unconditional surrender of Japan on Aug. 15, 1945. The formal surrender documents were signed aboard the battleship Missouri in Tokyo Bay on Sept. 2, 1945.

In his radio address to the nation announcing the surrender, Hirohito, whose voice was being heard by much of the Japanese public for the first time, said, "We must bear the unbearable and endure the unendurable in order to pave the way for peace for all future generations."

"Furthermore, the enemy has begun to employ a new and cruel bomb, causing immense and indiscriminate destruction, the extent of which is beyond all estimation," Hirohito said. "Should we continue to fight, not only would it result in the ultimate collapse and obliteration of the Japanese nation, but it would also lead to the total extinction of human civilization."

BRATS RECALL OVERSEAS STUDIES

Head injury victim seeks lost memories

Most of us enjoy going to reunions and reminiscing about the "good times," but for Vikki Weinberg, reunions are a time to find out who she used

In 1982, Weinberg, of Titusville, was hit by a truck on Hopkins Avenue. The near-fatal accident resulted in a severe head injury, 10 days in a comatose state and a loss of most of her memory.

She has found a way to cope with the amnesia, though, through her participation in Overseas Brats Inc., an organization of Americans who went to high school overseas.

"Digging up my past led me to Overseas Brats," said Weinberg. "I went to Yokohama High School (Japan) from 1957 through 1960 ... but learned that no 'Yo-Hiers' participated (in Overseas Brats). But in June 1993, I flew to San Bernandino, Calif., to join 107 other Yo-Hiers at a reunion."

Weinberg was frustrated, as she was hable to remember any of the events that were remembered by her schoolmates throughout the reunion. But she didn't give up.

Instead, she spent a unique weekend in Atlanta, Ga., in October at a combination workshop-seminar-reunion on overseas alumni affairs. At the convention, Weinberg joined more than 100 people representing 40 overseas high schools, to learn how to find classmates and friends, organize alumni groups, and plan reunions.

"I'm a member (of Overseas Brats)," said Weinberg. "I try to hunt up any overseas brat. We're trying to locate as many as possible, mostly through publicity. When they are found, they are invited to join the organization."

The "brats" are students whose fathers were overseas military or civilian personnel, said Weinberg. At reunions, Weinberg listens to everyone talk about their years overseas.

"Even though we went to different schools, we have a lot in common," she said.

"We missed out on a lot of the newest music and clothes. I rode the bus an hour to school (at Yokohama high School, in Japan) - none of us had cars. We had to stay on base.

But Weinberg said that everyone is glad that they grew up the way they

"My kids ask me what I was like in high school, and I can't remember. I'm doing this for my kids," said Weinberg.

"I can remember bits and pieces, I remember some faces, but I can't remember incidences."

In July 1996, the Overseas Brats will hold "A Grand Reunion" in the Washington, D.C., area. It is planned as a three-day event for all students and their teachers from any overseas school worldwide, according to Weinberg. They will plan to meet with congressmen and senators, as well.

Being involved, said Weinberg, helps her show other people with head injuries that they can still accomplish

things. Weinberg writes for both Overseas Brats Inc. and the Florida Head Injury Foundation Inc.

"Life is full of challenges," said Weinberg.

Overseas Brats Inc. provides free referral services to all Americans who went to school abroad concerning their respective reunion activities. Tom Hanks remained in his chair long after the courtroom scene in Philadelphia (1993) had officially ended. The cameras were off, and the crew had begun resetting the stage, yet he sat motionless, shoulders heavy, hands pressed tightly together as if holding onto something unseen. A stagehand noticed him quietly wiping tears from his face—unmasked, unposed. This was not a moment designed for anyone to see; it was Hanks alone, consumed by the grief and exhaustion demanded by the scene.

The trial sequence stood as one of the film's emotional centers, with Andrew Beckett, Hanks's character, confronting the cruelty of discrimination while battling the final stages of AIDS. The dialogue carried raw, piercing honesty, but what struck the set most profoundly was Hanks's surrender to it. Even after director Jonathan Demme called cut, the room was heavy with silence, as if the air itself had been drained, and crew members instinctively gave him space.

A backstage assistant happened to have a small camcorder running, capturing Hanks alone in his chair. The footage revealed him breaking character in a way that showed profound vulnerability—rubbing his eyes, pressing palms to his face, and breathing in shallow gasps, as if recovering from a physical blow. When the images surfaced years later,

audiences were stunned, realizing that Hanks had lived inside Andrew Beckett's suffering far beyond the frame.

Co-star Denzel Washington reflected on the experience in interviews, noting that working with Hanks was unlike anything he had witnessed. Hanks had prepared tirelessly, speaking with people living with AIDS and internalizing their stories until the weight of them became almost tangible. Washington realized after that courtroom scene that Hanks wasn't "acting" in the traditional sense; he was inhabiting Andrew's pain so completely that returning to himself seemed nearly impossible.

Crew members whispered that they had never seen him break down in such a private, unguarded way. This was not the controlled performance often required for a camera—it was genuine anguish. That authenticity translated directly to the screen, giving viewers a haunting, hollowed-out intensity in his eyes that was not dramatized but profoundly real.

The emotional toll of Philadelphia was widely acknowledged. At a time when AIDS carried stigma and fear, Hanks bore the weight of countless real-life stories, internalizing them until they overflowed. The leaked footage revealed not just an actor overwhelmed by his role, but a human being fully invested in the lives and struggles of those he portrayed.

That single moment on the courtroom set became part of the film's whispered legend. While Hanks won the Academy Award for Best Actor in 1994, no trophy could capture the private struggle behind his performance. Alone in that chair, he proved that the most unforgettable performances arise when the barrier between actor and character disappears, leaving only raw, undeniable truth.
